A 7.6% reduction is possible. However, other reports indicate that Medicaid is exempt from reductions.</p>

Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) 25119 – Energy Assistance	\$866,000 (20%)	More than 2,500 households living on a low income will not receive energy bill payment assistance.

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<p>State Mental Health Grant – Problem Gambling Treatment</p> <p>25085 - Addiction Services Gambling Treatment and Prevention</p>	\$26,000 (3.5%)	<p>This reduction means that 13 problem gamblers will not be able to access treatment each year.</p> <p>State funding to the county for problem gambling treatment is reduced because lottery revenue projections from early last biennium were not met.</p>
<p>State Mental Health Grant – Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness (PATH) grant</p> <p>25060A - Mental Health Residential Services</p>	\$110,000 (37%)	<p>Reduction of 37% in grant funding for Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness (PATH). PATH funding supports a rental assistance program and the Bridgeview Transitional Supported Housing Program.</p> <p>Housing provider Luke-Dorf will be forced to terminate two staff for the Bridgeview program which serves 48 people with severe mental illness. The program will not be able to treat individuals with severe active symptoms discharging from State and local hospitals.</p> <p>Rental assistance program will be terminated.</p>
<p>Emergency Services</p> <p>25111A – Homeless Families’ Shelter & Emergency Services</p>	\$5,456 (5.3%)	Two households will not receive rent assistance.

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<p>OCCF – Youth Investment 25149B – Social & Support Services for Educational Success</p>	<p>\$302,582 (100%)</p>	<p>Still uncertain about former Commission on Children and Families funds. If not funded at current level, would eliminate services for 300 high-risk youth (ages 6-17) and their families to help ensure that youth remain in or return to school. An overall program reduction of 17%.</p>
<p>OCCF – Great Start 25151B - Parent Child Development Services</p>	<p>\$105,189 (100%)</p>	<p>Still uncertain about former Commission on Children and Families funds. If not funded at current level, would eliminate services for 55 children participating in the program to provide opportunities for parents to interact with their children in a mentored setting with child development specialists. An overall program reduction of 7%.</p>
<p>OCCF – Youth Investment 25138B – Runaway Youth Services</p>	<p>\$161,132 (100%)</p>	<p>Still uncertain about former Commission on Children and Families funds. If not funded at current level, would reduce capacity for the 24/7 Reception Center, crisis line, shelter, support services, family counseling and reunification services, and gender-specific transitional housing services for 1600 youth and their families. An overall program reduction of 16%.</p>
