SUBJECT: Review of Proposed 1996-1999 Public Safety Levy

I. Recommendation / Action Requested:

Review levy budget and ballot language, give direction about process and content.

II. Background / Analysis:

The County proposes to levy \$0.7796 per thousand of assessed value for three years beginning July 1, 1996 for operations of County public safety services. This rate based levy will replace the \$0.5288 per thousand rate based levy that expires on June 30, 1996.

The levy is proposed to be on the May 21, 1996 ballot.

The measure funds the current level of operations at Inverness Jail, provides for staffing increased jail spaces at MCRC, Inverness Jail, and a new jail, adds money for secure alcohol and drug facility.

The attached summary "Base and Adds" shows the annual costs of these components.

III. Financial Impact:

The ballot measure will show the estimated annual receipts from this rate based levy as:

1996-97	24,415,328
1997-98	30,715,043
1998-99	33,744,107

Attachment A is a three year financial summary showing estimated revenues and expenditures in the Jail Levy Fund. It shows the estimated revenues and expenditures of the fund for the next three years.

IV. Legal Issues:

The Board must decide what to include in this levy by March 21, 1996 to place the measure on the May Primary ballot.

The attached ballot measure is a draft which the Board should review. Changes may be suggested at the February 15, 1996 Board meeting, or communicated to Sheriff Noelle or Rhys Scholes.

V. Controversial Issues:

The expansion of services may cause public discussion.

VI. Link to Current County Policies:

The County's current policy is to consider whether to replace the expiring levies with an expanded tax base.

VII. Citizen Participation:

The topics covered by the levy have been reviewed by many groups, including the Public Safety Facility Task Force, and the Sheriff CBAC

VIII. Other Government Participation:

The City of Portland has expressed a level of discomfort with the combined effects on property taxes of this levy, the library levy (which was before the Board in January), and potential bond measures. The combination of the proposed levies and the County tax base will increase the County percentage of total local government property taxes collected. This will require discussion with the cities in the county in accordance with the 1993 resolution agreeing not to increase our share of the property taxes without approval by the cities.

The base budget covers the operation of Inverness Jail (including the 50 space annex), 80 contractual alcohol and drug treatment spaces, the transport functions to move prisoners through the system, and all the support costs directly attributable to Inverness Jail (such as Corrections Health, food costs, work crew supervision, etc.).

This will increase the capacity of the Multnomah County Restitution Center to 160 beds. MCRC is operated as an adult residential work release center. Construction is anticipated to be the same type as the Inverness Jail and is anticipated to be ready for occupancy by January 1998.

Three centers, each with a 75 bed capacity, are planned. Two of the three centers are expected to be funded with SB 1145 revenue. The costs of the remaining 75 beds, which are to be funded by the levy, are shown here. The 1997-98 cost assumes the levy funded center will be operational by October 1997.

Most of the beds will be dedicated to residential treatment because data indicates that a significant percentage of local offenders are drug-involved and unable to make positive changes in their lives without intensive intervention. A limited number of spaces will be reserved for a structured work release program focusing on pre-employment training and job development

Impact of the Proposal

The proposed changes in the level of funding are directed at increasing the number of jail spaces. The number of people arrested exceeds the space available to detain them until trial. The following table shows estimates of how many individuals the additional spaces will house during the year.

THREE YEAR SERIAL LEVY FOR JAIL OPERATIONS *[7 words, 10 permitted]*

QUESTION:

Shall Multnomah County operate jails with three-year levy of \$0.7796 per \$1,000 assessed valuation, outside tax base, beginning 1996-97? *[20 words, 20 words allowed]*

SUMMARY:

This measure continues the existing justice levy, increasing the rate. The county would collect approximately 78 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value, about \$117 per year on a home assessed at \$150,000.

Approval of the levy would allow the county to:

- Continue to operate the 560 jail space Inverness Jail
- Operate 120 additional jail spaces at Inverness Jail
- Operate 210 jail spaces in a new jail
- Pay for 155 residential drug and alcohol treatment spaces for offenders, an increase of 75
- Expand the adult work release Restitution Center by 40 jail spaces

If the county is not able to operate Inverness jail, about 40 percent of the county's total jail spaces, additional offenders will have to be released without supervision. Estimated releases would total nearly 1,000 (?) offenders per month.

This serial levy is estimated to provide \$24,415,000 in 1996-97, \$30,715,000 in 1997-98, and \$33,744,000 in 1998-99 of revenue dedicated to justice operations. *[151 words, 175 allowed]*

The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of the estimate.

The levy is subject to the \$10 local government limit in Section 11b, Article XI, Oregon Constitution, (1990 Measure 5). This Measure might reduce property tax collections for some other units of local government due to the \$10 rate limitation of the Oregon Constitution.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Measure __ will renew the justice levy at an increased rate to pay for additional services. The levy will be dedicated to justice programs including operation and expanding of the Inverness Jail, community restitution work release programs, alcohol and drug treatment beds for prisoners, and street supervision of defendants released pending trial.

Multnomah County currently operates 1,455 (?) beds. These beds are used to house newly booked offenders as well as unsentenced and sentenced inmates. Nine out of ten Multnomah County inmates are being held on felony charges.

This levy supports the Inverness Jail, currently about 40% of Multnomah County jail space. It will pay for operating 120 more beds at that jail and for operating an additional 210 beds at a new facility.

Residential facilities for supervised alcohol and drug intervention and work programs will be supported by the levy. These programs will work in conjunction with jail time before inmates are admitted to the programs and supervision after release.

This levy also supports the work release Restitution Center, expanding that program by 40 beds.

The existing three-year levy for jails expires June 30, 1996. This measure will provide continued support to keep all the current County jail beds operating, and to increase the number available.

The justice levy will cost the owner of a \$150,000 home \$116.94 per year. *[221 words, I do not know of any statutory limit]*
