



## NHPI and AA are the second and third fastest growing ethnic communities in Oregon





- A 40% increase in business ownership from 2002-2007
- Of these, 26% were small businesses (<20 employees)

# Challenges

- “After years of declining numbers, hate crimes against Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders are rising exponentially.” NPR, February 17, 2017
- On Saturday, April 29<sup>th</sup>, Trump supporters marched through the Jade District, some of whom shouted to API shop owners, “Go back to your country.”
- At a recent APANO community forum, our members overwhelmingly cited hate crimes as being one of the biggest challenges of living in Portland today. Some parents spoke of incidents of anti-Asian bullying within public schools.
