▶▶ Longitudinal follow-up

The Research Triangle Institute of North Carolina, an outside objective evaluation firm, did a follow-up study of alcohol clients 12 to 18 months after discharge of clients who received alcohol treatment in publicly-supported programs. The following is a summary of the outcomes from the study:

**Data demonstrate clear reduction in overall level of abuse.**

**Abstinence rates from alcohol are impressive.**

**Data indicate substantial reduction in arrests for all crimes and DUII offenses, 12 to 18 months after discharge.**

**Data on education indicates substantial improvement in enrollment in school or training and level of education.**

**Full-time employment status one year after compared to one year before increased greatly for residential clients (10% before, 37% after); CIRT clients (8% before, 46% after); and outpatient clients 41% before, 62% after).**

## TREATMENT WORKS!

■ The evidence of more than 15 years of research on the effectiveness of alcohol and other drug abuse treatment decisively demonstrates that treatment is effective.

Drug treatment:

- reduces drug abuse
- increases employment
- increases academic achievement
- improves psychological adjustment
- decreases crime as well as other negative behaviors.

■ The evidence shows that public expenditures for alcohol and other drug abuse treatment are wise and prudent investments, even though alcoholism and drug dependence are chronic conditions which may require multiple treatment episodes.

■ Publicly supported services range from efforts to help rehabilitate clients with skills that have eroded from alcohol and other drug abuse to basic efforts to habilitate clients with little formal training. To reduce the probability of relapse, once the course of treatment is completed, the client in recovery needs to maintain contact with treatment programs and

become engaged in a support system for months or years.

■ Recovery requires the resolution of family, work and social problems created by the addiction. Recovery involves new and meaningful social networks. Roles, rules, and rituals of the family must be redefined and restructured. A life that includes relearned communication skills, wholesome living, uplifting relationships, a commitment to values outside of one's self, and spiritual growth supports long-term health and sobriety.

■ The major goal of Oregon's publicly supported treatment programs is to eliminate alcohol and other drug use among abusers and addicts who seek treatment each year in programs across the state. Additionally, publicly funded programs concentrate on increasing or maintaining employment with their clients, reducing criminal justice involvement, increasing academic achievement and generally restoring clients to productive lives and developing self-sufficiency among the client and his/her family.

**COMMUNITY ROUNDTABLE:  
PARTNERS FOR A CARING COMMUNITY  
December 12 - 13, 1991**

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The Leaders Roundtable is a team of civic leaders, educators, business executives, entrepreneurs and community activists committed to making a difference for the good of the youth of Multnomah County, Oregon. Roundtable members have recently adopted a new and ambitious goal:

**To assure that by 1996, 100 percent of Multnomah County youths will complete high school with employability skills.**

To accomplish this, the Leaders Roundtable members have adopted an action plan focused on that outcome. The action plan requires an intensive effort that transcends jurisdictional and institutional barriers, and Roundtable members have committed themselves to the task.

Staff in programs supported by the Roundtable and others have identified five key elements in programs that effectively deliver near-100 percent high school completion for "at-risk" youth:

1. Family involvement in support of the child's success.
2. Family-centered, collaborative agency and community environments that support families.
3. Clear, consistent expectations for youth -- expectations that cross time, agencies, programs and work places.
4. Youth and family accountability, program accountability and system accountability.
5. Continuity of a caring adult for each young person.

The members of the Leaders Roundtable believe that it is time to incorporate these key elements into all service delivery systems. Employers, churches, educators, organized providers of human services and others in the community will collaborate to assist every family in this county to raise self-reliant and productive children.

The strategy is to begin action in the Roosevelt, Jefferson, Marshall and Centennial high school attendance areas, followed by implementation throughout Multnomah County. A "Community Roundtable" is planned for December 12-13, 1991 to form community-based action teams in each of those high school attendance areas.

Each action team will solidify participant commitments and articulate a common vision and joint work plan for the period through August 1992. These teams will build on the collaborative activities already underway in their area and will carry those initiatives even further, to institutionalize changes benefitting families and children in comprehensive ways.

The basic premise is that all sectors of the community can more effectively support youth and their families by collaborating to implement a single consistent strategy that utilizes existing resources in innovative, interagency ways to deliver a seamless system of services for families and children. This premise can be visualized as a circle of support enfolding the family for the sake of the child.

This strategy will constantly reinforce two points:

1. That the entire community believes each child can and will become a healthy, productive adult; and
2. That the entire community cares enough to support each family in the pursuit of this aim by providing the necessary support system and environment conducive to the development of each child.

**LEADERS ROUNDTABLE ACTION PLAN  
FOR 1991-92 (ADOPTED 9/25/91)  
Implementing The Portland Investment**

The Leaders Roundtable is a team of civic leaders, educators, business executives, entrepreneurs and community activists committed to making a difference for the good of the youth of Multnomah County, Oregon. The primary goal of the Portland Leaders Roundtable is to assure that 100 percent of youth county-wide will complete high school with employability skills. To accomplish this, the Roundtable members have adopted an action plan to stimulate an intensive effort to focus on that outcome across jurisdictions and institutions. The following six objectives have been adopted as priority actions to accomplish the "100% high school completion" goal.

**1: Demonstrate active political leadership on behalf of children and youth.**

- 1.1 \* Conduct a "summit" for major providers and funders of programs for children and youth to agree on common outcomes for children, and how all agencies can deliver key elements for children's success (see 3.2 below). NOTE: This activity is now called the Community Roundtable, scheduled for December 12-13, 1991.
- 1.2 \* Involve youth in all Roundtable-related activities in as many innovative ways as possible. Invite youth leaders to participate in Roundtable discussions and on project committees.
- 1.3 \* Implement a community awareness campaign to build momentum/commitment to youth, to let youth know how valued they are and to let the public know what's being done to address youths' needs. (Stress the value of all children and the needs of the targeted children.)
- 1.4 Integrate the work of the Leaders Roundtable with the statewide policy framework set by the Oregon Progress Board's Human Investment Strategy and carried through in the Oregon Workforce Quality Act and the Oregon Educational Act for the 21st Century. Demonstrate the articulation of these policies in Multnomah County, relate the local agenda to statewide initiatives, and position The Portland Investment activities as an attractive option for state and federal investment.

**2: Provide information on the targeted children and their progress through school and into the workforce and further education and training.**

- 2.1 Clarify what information is needed and how it will be used.
- 2.2 Promote policy changes to facilitate the needed data collection, both within systems and between and among systems.
- 2.3 Collect data. Identify and resolve procedural barriers.
- 2.4 Utilize data in various leadership activities (Objective 1 above).

**3: Implement key elements in core systems.**

- 3.1 Conduct Roundtable discussion of the elements (September 25 meeting).
- 3.2 \* Conduct agencies' "summit" (see 1.1 above).
- 3.3 \* Regenerate services in a selected area or areas (high school/feeder schools; within Portland School District; within East Co. school districts) to deliver

the key elements for the maximum benefit of children and families. This is The Portland Investment Phase Two: Implementing the recommendations of the original Roundtable work groups in a comprehensive package that impacts literally every system in Multnomah County.

**4: Implement employability competencies.**

- 4.1 \* Conduct a forum bringing current Oregon competencies efforts together.
- 4.2 Review and critique plans (How are they addressing targeted youths' needs and workforce needs?)
- 4.3 Develop and manage Roundtable actions to implement competencies.

**5: Improve teacher preparation in workforce and diversity issues.**

- 5.1 \* Implement summer internships and employment for teachers in business and industry.
- 5.2 \* Develop and implement pilot PSU preservice teacher education on workforce and diversity issues.
- 5.3 \* Develop and implement inservice for teachers on factors that affect student success.
- 5.4 \* Develop and implement inservice for teachers and counselors on links between students' work/career interests and postsecondary education.
- 5.5 \* Evaluate and influence the development of revised teacher preparation and certification in light of new competencies that will be needed for successful implementation of the initiatives now specified in the Oregon Educational Act for the 21st Century.

**6: Increase and strengthen employer involvement in education and employment training programs.**

- 6.1 Create training opportunities for school administrators on the application of business management techniques and practices.
- 6.2 \* Implement ways to make school curriculum more effective in preparing students for work. Schools and business/industry work together on this. Apprenticeships and professional/technical program development will be a subset of this. Utilize student/parent/employee/teacher focus groups as a technique for input.
- 6.3 \* Develop a menu of ways businesses can be involved in grades K-12. Actively market and implement various business involvements.
- 6.4 \* Gain business commitment to adopt employer policies that promote participation in school and family activities.
- 6.5 Implement community recognition for employees and employers who are involved in schools (part of 1.3 above).
- 6.6 Design and implement work site parenting programs.

\* These actions will implement or contribute to actions included in the Portland Future Focus plan.

**NOTE: Objective 3 is now called the "Partners for a Caring Community" project. These actions are intended to support and assist existing efforts at neighborhood, county and state levels to deliver a seamless system of services for families and children.**
