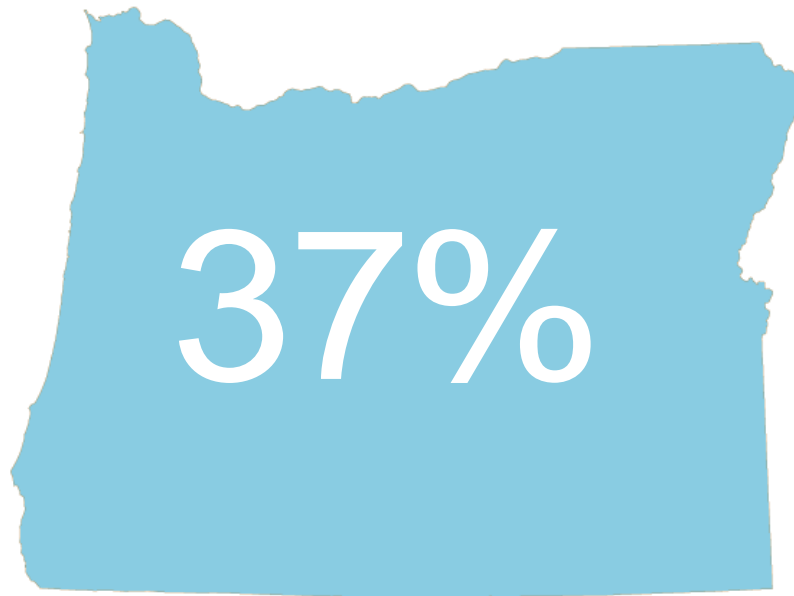

Over a third of Oregon's women—nearly 700,000 individuals—have experienced intimate partner violence



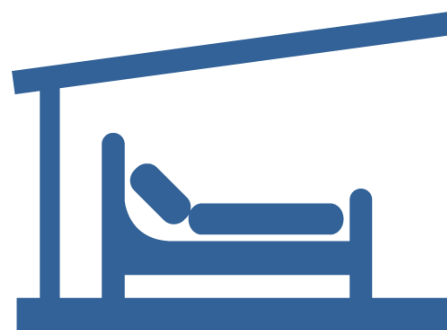

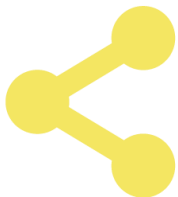

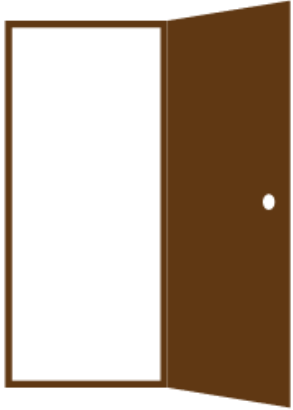

Improving access to services for survivors with physical disabilities.

Women with disabilities have a 40% greater risk of violence than women without disabilities

Community-based sexual assault services

Mobile outreach to homeless and culturally specific populations.

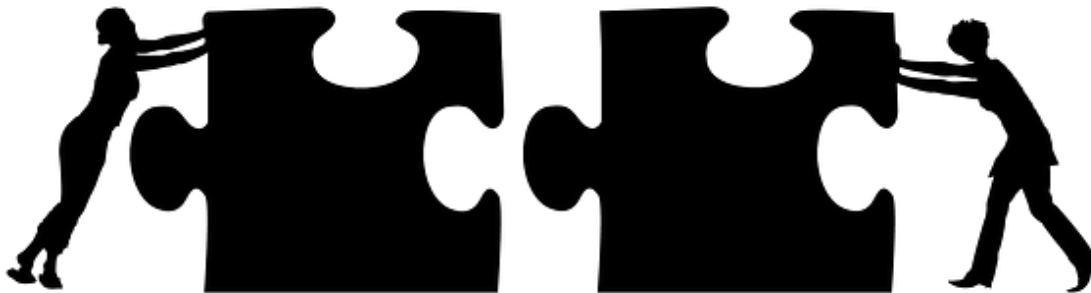


Housing stability for survivors

Resource Coordination Team (RCT)

A collaborative service ensuring the best resource at best time.

In FY16, **94%** of participants moved into permanent housing



Culturally specific services

Access to culturally specific services increases the efficacy of domestic violence services.

Services that are developed and delivered by specific communities better match the needs and values of the survivors they are intended to serve.

Targeted populations include:

African American, Latino, Native American, Slavic/Russian immigrants, African immigrants, LGBTQ, seniors and people with disabilities.



In coming year our strategic plan focuses on:

- Reducing sexual assault
- Providing LGBTQ services
- Increasing economic empowerment
- Collaborating with other service systems
