Outputs

320 youth served

51% students of color

77% identified as being "at risk of academic failure"

67% qualified for free and reduced lunch

55 adults served

2070 people served in non-enrollment events

(family educational nights, cultural fairs, etc.)

Outcomes

78% of students increased benchmark scores in Reading

84% of students increased benchmark scores in Math

Average daily attendance of SUN CS students was **96%**

According to teachers, of students who regularly attended SUN CS:

78% improved **classroom academic performance**

74% improved getting **homework** in on time

73% **participated** in class more

67% improved **behavior**

71% came to school more **motivated to learn**

As told by a SUN Instructor:

When you realize how many small, separate abilities need to combine to make a successful reader and writer, you see daily victories all around you in SUN summer school. One child masters putting a finger-wide space between words, and lights up as he sees his story take shape. Another, who couldn't sit still to finish a sentence, now will enter 2nd grade as a serial short story writer. She has developed a super-powered girls series that she looks forward to creating and writing about each day. We can't wait to read her next installment!
