

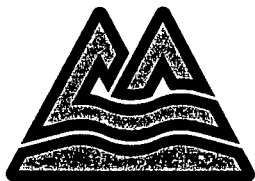

MAYOR BUD CLARK AND COUNTY CHAIR GLADYS MCCOY JOINTLY APPOINT
METROPOLITAN HUMAN RIGHTS COMMISSION

Mayor Bud Clark and Multnomah County Chair Gladys McCoy will appoint fifteen (15) volunteer community members to head the newly organized Metropolitan Human Rights Commission (MHRC). Appointments are expected to be confirmed at the respective City Council and County Commission meetings next week.

The joint appointment for Chairperson of the Metropolitan Human Rights Commission is Iris M.D. Bell, a management consultant with extensive experience in human resources management and human rights advocacy. Her work as a consultant with federal, state and local service agencies ranges from providing direction and leadership on issues impacting women and minorities to working with community-based organizations involved in urban renewal and economic development issues. Bell's knowledge of the work of MHRC includes two years as a human relations specialist for the Commission in the early 1980's, and more recently as a consultant to MHRC. Past volunteer activities include chair of the Child Care Allocations Committee for United Way, member of the Multnomah County Children and Youth Work Group, and member of the Governor's Community Corrections Advisory Board.

In May, 1992, the Portland City Council and Multnomah County Board of Commissioners adopted a new City-County intergovernmental agreement and organizational bylaws to restructure the MHRC Commission. After careful consideration of the MHRC Task Force recommendations and report of March, 1992 and the City of Portland's Future Focus Diversity Plan, both local governments agreed to create a stronger and more effective MHRC commission to respond to the community's need to promote and advocate for the acceptance of diversity and protection of the rights of all people in the metropolitan area.

Additional members of the Commission include Greg Asher, an instructor of Psychology at Chemeketa Community College and active volunteer on AIDS education and sexual minority youth issues; Elizabeth Baxter, Director of the Medicare Alzheimer's Project for Good Samaritan Hospital; Catherine Collier, Director of Diversity and Multicultural Affairs at Portland State University; David Farber, Vice-President of Credit and Operations at First Portland Leasing Corporation and member of the board of the Jewish Federation of Portland; Minje Ghim, President of the Korean Society of Oregon; Nadia Kahl, Chapter Director of the American-Arab Anti-Discrimination Committee; and Ken Klepper, Project Coordinator for the International Refugee Center.

Other members are Charu Manchanda, Director of Marketing and Membership for the World Trade Center Portland and Chair of the Portland Chamber of Commerce's Investment Committee; Claudia McDuffie, Integration Services Coordinator and Alcohol and Drug Program Coordinator at Cleveland High School; Samuel Pierce, Executive Director of Minority Youth Concerns Action Program; Laurie Sitton, Chair of the City/County Advisory Committee on the Disabled and Steering Committee member for Portland Future Focus; Frances Portillo- Denhart, an educational consultant specializing in cross-cultural communication and doctoral student at Oregon State University; Malgorzata Sobieraj, case manager for Lutheran Family Services Refugee Program and Rev. Donald Frazier, pastor of the Mt. Sinai Baptist Church and member of the Board of directors of Albina Ministerial Alliance.

The commission, which includes a diverse membership based on gender, race, age, ethnic and geographic countywide representation, is expected to convene it's first official meeting in September. In the interim, a new Executive Director of the MHRC will be hired and staff/Commission board and cultural diversity trainings will occur.

To encourage broader community involvement in the Commission's work, three issues committees have been created in the following areas: hate crime monitoring and active community response to such incidents within the community; implementation of Portland's Future Focus Diversity Action Plan; and monitoring of local government's policies in civil rights, affirmative action hiring practices and the City/County Disability Project. Recruitment and outreach for participation of additional community members in issues committee work will begin in September.

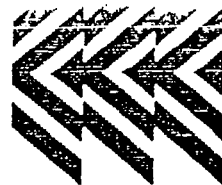

OF STICKS, STONES, & SWASTIKAS

On a sweet, sunny day in early July, I went to pick up my daughter at her daycare center and found a swastika hanging on the wall. When I asked the teacher to explain the presence of this hate-filled symbol in a pre-school, her response seemed initially reasonable: as part of a July 4th flag project, one five-year-old boy had made this Nazi flag based on his memory of a movie about Nazi Germany.

When I expressed my discomfort in seeing this symbol, which had once represented (and still does in some quarters) the "final solution" to the "Jewish problem," the teacher's face remained neutral, without expression. She said, in a matter of fact way, that she had spoken with the boy about his creation, and that he had told her what he knew of Nazis, hatred and genocide. "Once there was a bad man who wanted all the Germans to be the same. He is gone now." Transcribed by the teacher, these comments were printed beneath the flag, which was surrounded by four versions of the Stars and Stripes, garbled and fractured by youthful interpretation.

My initial response to the swastika was intellectual. After all, this was not Nazi Germany and this child was no storm trooper. I had thought, initially, "Oh, it's just a symbol, a doodle, created from a child's innocence and displayed by the teacher to prevent hurt feelings." However, as I thought about it hanging in my daughter's school, my detachment turned to annoyance to anger to outrage. Fifty years ago, this same broken cross had been displayed reverently in schools throughout eastern Europe as storm troopers goose-stepped outside. That this symbol of mass slaughter of my people was hanging where young children could see it in 1991 became intolerable to me.

Equally unacceptable, though, was the idea of ordering the school to remove it. Me, a writer, acting like a book burner, trying to squash expression of an idea just because I found it obscene? No!

I did not even ask the school to remove the flag, but I did tell the teacher that this symbol was an affront to me and my people, and I found its presence disturbing. The flag---a crudely drawn, black, twisted cross in a field of red construction paper---was removed in response to my comments four days later.

However, my feelings of outrage, confusion, doubt, and suspicion still linger, like the sting and redness on the skin after a slap to the face. I am also left with questions about what separates ignorance and prejudice, about whether I over-reacted to an innocent educational exercise or under-reacted to a subtle display of anti-semitism.

At issue is not the teacher's explanation; it is reasonable and I accept it. Rather than malice, I see only the innocence of a five-year-old boy who was unaware of the meaning of his ugly creation. Nor do I see evidence of institutionalized anti-semitism at this school, the director of which is African-American, and where there has not been the slightest inkling of racial, cultural, or religious bias, or personally in this particular

teacher, whom my daughter loves.

Yet, yet....

There are subtle inconsistencies though, discernable only by careful examination, that just cannot be explained away. Why was the flag displayed at all, when the child who made it had stopped attending school on July 3rd? Even if the child had been present, why did the teacher, who had chosen to hang only five of the more than 10 flags made, choose it at all? Is it possible that the teacher, a blonde woman in her 20's, was just as ignorant of the swastika's message as her five-year-old student? If this is so, why then did she attach to this Nazi flag the boy's own explanation of his work, an element not assigned to any of the other flags?

I cannot answer any of these questions, and I will never learn the answers. Because of the ambiguity of the incident and because, in real terms, nothing happened and no one was hurt, I can no longer raise the issue without risking bad feelings on all sides, possibly placing my daughter in the middle of a tense situation. If this were a case of naked prejudice, there would be no problem and no need for soul searching. Clearly shown hatred or prejudice, has the subtlety of a jack hammer; it leaves no ambiguity. In such a case, there is no question but that we would withdraw my daughter from the school.

But this is worse---a situation where the person offended is caused to question his or her own perceptions. It is quicksand and leaves no solid ground on which to make a stand.

So the question remains: was it, or wasn't it?

I don't know.

Among my own family members, opinion varied. My father's friend was shocked and wanted to know why I did not demand to have the flag removed. However, she did believe that I was taking this too personally as a Jew. As she pointed out, not only did the Nazis murder millions of Jews, but also millions of other "undesirables" such as Gypsies, Catholics, homosexuals, and the physically and mentally impaired. It is not just an anti-Jewish symbol, but an anti-humanity symbol as well, she said. She also pointed out that anyone who had fought for the Allies in WW II would react to the swastika as a symbol of one of America's most vicious enemies.

My father preached rationalism. He said I had used appropriate restraint and assertiveness and that ultimately, the flag had been removed. "You can't draw your sword at every slight," he said. He also indicated that I was wasting my outrage. This was not a case of seemingly deliberate anti-semitism. Besides, the swastika is only a symbol after all; it hurts us to the extent that we let it.

My wife, who, as an African-American woman, has spent her life coping with racism, initially could not understand my anger because she had never seen anti-semitism. To her, it had been previously only an abstract concern, but not now. What stays with me now is my discovery of an irreparable hole in what I thought was a solid wall of my values---a double bind that cannot be resolved, only tolerated and accepted. In the foundation of my personal philosophy, at its core, is the belief that in a free, open society, all ideas

should be expressed openly, without fear of violence. And if the idea is abhorrent, hateful, or twisted, then hold it up to the light and expose it for what it is. Yet I must acknowledge that there are some symbols and words, expressions of such twisted ideas, that are so deliberately hateful and hurtful that their presence is intolerable to people of conscience. Does free speech guarantee the right for some people to verbally abuse and discriminate against others?

These divergent views cannot be reconciled. The only rational voice within me says that the swastika is only a doodle, without any inherent meaning or symbolism, that I provide the meaning and internalize it. Were I a Zen master, I might be able to see it as only a harmless doodle. However, for me, its meaning is inherent, etched into it with the blood of more than eight million people slaughtered in concentration camps. It is a symbol of an idea so vile that, to me, it has taken on a life of its own. The Nazis were crushed, but the symbol lives on in a continuing resurrection---spray-painted on synagogues, on Neo-Nazi arm bands, and now, in my daughter's school.

It does not matter that the boy drew this symbol of hatred in total innocence. The intent is irrelevant. Whether a fire is set intentionally or accidentally, it still burns and destroys. You see, it is a secret that children know and that adults have forgotten: names can hurt you, every bit as much as sticks and stones.

superficial people who possess typical television values. It's derived from the white-floured bread first mass produced in the 50's; the nutrients and fiber (the substance) are lost during processing. Darker foods are usually more healthful because of the presence of vitamins and minerals, which often have color.

The awareness of these stereotypic meanings can then be either skillfully manipulated to elicit specific responses from a certain audience, or they can be carefully avoided in order to prevent the arousal of certain responses. Color associations, as described above, are deep-seated and therefore quite powerful.

Color symbolism can be particularly offensive when applied to various ethnic groups. Europeans and European-Americans have felt a particular need to color-code most peoples. Africans were black, Native Americans were red, Asians were yellow, Hispanics were brown, and they were white. African-Americans have been the only group to use the color label given them in a positive way, as in the 60's when "black" became "beautiful". This was a statement of pride in who they were as a people, and a way of rebelling against the dominant cultural system. Because of this usage, "black" is still an acceptable term for describing African-Americans. However, even though black was asserted as a positive, the dominant negative symbolism still takes its toll on children and adults, and creates considerable confusion.

Geographical terms are now becoming more popular, more "politically correct", but they have the result of

hyphenating all Americans and they can be unwieldy in essays because of their length: African-American, European-American, Asian-American, Hispanic-American, Native-American---the repetition of these words becomes tedious. It's still somehow easier to talk about blacks and whites. The main problem is that the color terms, as well as the geographical terms, make broad generalizations about people that distort the specific micro-cultures from which people emerge. These terms somehow suggest a commonality where there may be none, and thus usefulness is lost. Overall, it's better to refer to the specific culture: the Hmong, the Navajo, the Yugoslavians, the Latvians, the Sikhs, the Han, the Vietnamese, the British, the Yanomamo. This way the unique cultural identities are not swallowed up in either the color term or the geographical term. Specificity is a virtue here.

Another popular term in use today is "people of color". This term is used primarily to identify non-white or non-European peoples for the purpose of addressing social inequities, but it has the unfortunate consequence of implying that European peoples are colorless. Just like "black" and "white", people "of color" presents false generalizations about skin pigmentation. Adults may understand the reasoning behind the creation of this new term, but it complicates racial issues for children by perpetuating a color mythology that is neither accurate nor true. One of the solutions is to de-stereotype and de-symbolize colors wherever we can. Another solution is to help children and adults develop better critical thinking skills in order to decipher the stereotypes of colors and labels applied to humans. Different versions of stereotypical sentences with alternative descriptors need to be shared and discussed with children so they can better understand the unfairness of negative color symbolism. So much is presently unconscious that an effort needs to be made to bring the usage of color terms into the realm of awareness. It takes practice to overcome old habits.

We need to recognize the diversity of peoples without lumping them into color-coded or geographical groups. The best rule of thumb is to use the name that the specific people or culture uses for themselves. This would guarantee the most respect and would prevent the root cause of racism, over-generalization, which leads to stereotyping. This means we need to talk with people, read, and generally be aware. It's better to make friends first before asking about a person's culture or heritage. The desire to label or pigeon-hole people into ready-made categories is a strong, culturally ingrained impulse. Resistance to this impulse has nothing to do with "political correctness", which implies an "authoritative" or "correct" way of communicating, but rather springs from the basic desire to be fair to all people, to be "politically aware."

Multnomah County/TB Clinic is currently purchasing padded mailing envelopes. Two sizes are currently being purchased, large and small. Padded envelopes are heavier thus more costly for postage and they are also more cumbersome to handle thus hampering efficiency in processing time. Because of the thickness of the padding they hold less in contents therefore making it necessary to use two envelopes instead of one to mail TB medicine.

During the period March, 1991 - February, 1992, 4,350 small padded envelopes were purchased at a cost of .52¢ per envelope(2) for a total cost of \$4,524.00. During the same period 1,050 large padded envelopes were used at a cost of .98¢ per envelope for a total cost of \$1,029.

Bubble mailing envelopes can be purchased at a cost of .39¢ per small and .52¢ per large in postage fees. 4,350 small bubble envelopes at at cost of .39¢ for a total of \$1,696.50 and large bubble envelopes at .52¢ for a total of \$546.00.

As well as the dollar savings in postage, the lighter envelopes would would speed up the mailing process and hold more medications thus using less smaller envelopes.

For the record, I first made this proposal in August, 1990 and for a time were receiving bubble envelopes but now find that padded envelopes are again being purchased.

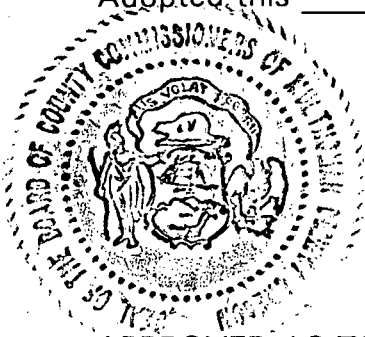

Animal Control

Ordinance Goals:

1. Establish the use of a "Notice of Civil Violation" as the primary procedure for addressing violations of the animal control ordinance.
2. Create one Administrative Hearings procedure to accommodate appeals to the chapter.
 - Combines the three existing procedures: District Court; Potentially Dangerous Dog hearings; and Facility revocations.
3. Establish a three-tiered schedule of reasonable Civil fines that are commensurate to the seriousness of the violation.
4. Establish a procedure to turnover late payment and non-payment of civil fines to a collection agency; and, refer failure to comply with corrective actions that affect public safety and animal welfare to District Court.
5. Increase revenue through civil fines to help off-set operating costs for providing animal control services throughout all jurisdictions in Multnomah County.
6. Reduce the burden currently placed on the criminal justice system to adjudicate animal control violations in District Court.
 - Reduce the District Attorney's office case preparation and prosecution workload.
 - Reduce the need to take up District Court time for animal ordinance arraignments and trials.
7. Enable the Division to use "problem solving" methods to resolve the community's animal related problems.

(M) "Owner" means any person or legal entity having a possessory right in the animal. ~~{or legal entity who harbors, cares for, exercises control over, or knowingly permits any animal to remain on premises occupied by that person.}~~

(Y) "Keeper" means any person or legal entity who harbors, cares for, exercises control over, or knowingly permits any animal to remain on premises occupied by that person.

AGREEMENT NO.

An Agreement between the City of Portland (City) and Multnomah County (County) for \$100,000 to provide Sanctions Treatment Opportunity Progress (STOP) Diversion Program.

RECITALS:

1. The State of Oregon, Criminal Justice Services Division has awarded \$300,000 to Multnomah County, Department of Community Corrections, to provide a Diversion Program.
2. The Sanctions Treatment Opportunity Progress (STOP) Diversion Program has a budget of \$400,000 and needs a match of \$100,000 from the City of Portland General Fund. The projected budget is attached hereto as Attachment A.
3. The City wishes to participate in STOP and City Council has authorized \$100,000 General Fund appropriation in the Bureau of Community Development in the approved 1992-93 budget.
4. The City and Multnomah County desire to enter into an agreement for \$100,000 for match for the State grant.

AGREED:

I. Scope of Services

Multnomah County, Department of Community Corrections, will provide the services described below for the STOP Diversion Program.

- A. Conduct a process to select a treatment agency to provide the acupuncture and counseling services for the STOP Diversion Program. The County will enter into a contract with the agency selected to provide, at a minimum, the following services:
 1. Upon notification of the County, enroll clients into the STOP Diversion Program who have been interviewed by the Multnomah County Circuit Court, have agreed to Diversion and have signed a Diversion agreement.
 2. Transport STOP participants from the court to the location where treatment will be provided.
 3. Provide acupuncture clinics in the forenoon and afternoon and evenings, and a morning clinic on Saturdays that are barrier free for Diversion participants.
 4. Provide chemical dependency treatment services for each STOP participant.
 - a. Assess, evaluate and develop an individual treatment plan.

- b. Provide chemical dependency orientation, education, treatment and recovery activities including group counseling sessions.
 - c. Provide an initial and ongoing urinalysis services and report to the Community Corrections staff the results of such tests.
 - d. Provide periodic individual progress reports to the Department of Community Corrections.
 - e. Monitor participant compliance with client's treatment plan and with program requirements. When participants are non-compliant, recommend to the Department of Community Corrections termination from the program and revocation of the Diversion agreement.
 - f. Collect individual client fees based on a sliding scale. No person will be denied services because of inability to pay. All participants are expected to pay a minimal amount for their treatment.
 - g. Participate in an evaluation of the effectiveness of the program.
- B. The County will provide a data base for the program, including client tracking.
 - C. The County will be responsible for managing the State grant, for implementing the agreement with the treatment agency, for providing quality assurance and for coordinating management for the STOP program.
 - D. The County will provide a parole/probation officer to work with the clients and to serve as a liaison to the treatment agency and the Court.
 - E. Evaluate program goals on an on-going basis issuing reports to County Circuit Court, State Criminal Justices Services Division and the Bureau of Community Development.
 - F. Any changes in the scope of services or grant period must be requested in writing by Contractor and approved in writing by the Bureau of Community Development.

II. Compensation and Method of Payment

Multnomah County will be compensated for the above described services by the City of Portland through the Bureau of Community Development General Fund.

- A. Payments to the County will be made monthly upon submission of a statement of expenditures to the State and the City and notification of payment by the State. The County will retain vendor receipts for materials

and services and evidence of payment for personnel costs. The City's share is 25% of the total grant amount awarded by the State. It is agreed that total compensation under this agreement shall not exceed ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$100,000).

III. Project Manager

- A. The City Project Manager shall be Barbara Madigan, or such other person as shall be designated in writing by the Director of the Bureau of Community Development.
- B. The Project Manager is authorized to approve work and billings hereunder, to give notices referred to herein, to terminate this agreement, as provided herein, and to carry out all other city actions referred to herein.

IV. Reporting Requirements

The contractor will prepare and submit the following reports to the Bureau of Community Development:

Copies of all reports, monthly, quarterly and/or annual which are submitted to the State, to the County Circuit Court.

V. Maintenance of Records

The County is to maintain fiscal and billing related records as required under General Contract Provisions. In addition, the contractor also is to maintain all records relating to the STOP Diversion Program. All records regarding the program, as well as general organization and administrative information, will be made available to the City Project Manager or other designated persons upon request. At a minimum, records will be reviewed as part of the annual monitoring process.

VI. Schedule and Performance Measures

Workload Indicators:

# of clients served	600
# UA's client minimum/month	2

Performance Measures:

65% retention of clients successfully complete diversion

75% of those who complete diversion will be crime free for an additional 12 months

VII. Evaluation

The contractor will participate in the development of an evaluation process and in the gathering of data and reporting requirements established in the evaluation process.

VIII. General Contract Provisions

- A. TERMINATION FOR CAUSE. If, through any cause, the County shall fail to fulfill in timely and proper manner his/her obligations under this Contract, or if the County shall violate any of the covenants, agreements, or stipulations of this Contract, the City shall have the right to terminate this Contract by giving written notice to the County of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof at least 30 days before the effective date of such termination. In such event, all finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, and reports prepared by the County under this Contract shall, at the option of the City, become the property of the City and the County shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation for any satisfactory work completed on such documents.

Notwithstanding the above, the County shall not be relieved of liability to the City for damages sustained by the City by virtue of any breach of the Contract by the County, and the City may withhold any payments to the County for the purpose of setoff until such time as the exact amount of damages due the City from the County is determined.

- B. TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE. The City and County may terminate this Contract at any time by mutual written agreement. If the Contract is terminated by the City as provided herein, the County will be paid an amount which bears the same ratio to the total compensation as the services actually performed bear to the total services of the County covered by this Contract less payments of compensation previously made.

The City, on thirty (30) days written notice to the County, may terminate this Agreement for any reason deemed appropriate at its sole discretion.

- C. REMEDIES. In the event of termination under Section A hereof by the City due to a breach by the County, then the City may complete the work either itself or by agreement with another contractor, or by a combination thereof. In the event the cost of completing the work exceeds the amount actually paid to the County hereunder plus the remaining unpaid balance of the compensation provided herein, then the County shall pay to the City the amount of excess.

The remedies provided to the City under sections A and C hereof for a breach by the County shall not be exclusive. The City also shall be entitled to any other equitable and legal remedies that are available.

In the event of breach of this contract by the City, then the County's remedy shall be limited to termination of the contract and receipt of payment as provided in section B hereof.

In the event of termination under Section A, the City shall provide the County an opportunity for an administrative appeal.

- D. CHANGES. The City or Contractor may, from time to time, request changes in writing in the scope of services or terms and conditions hereunder. Such changes, including any increase or decrease in the amount of the Contractor's compensation, shall be incorporated in written amendments to this contract. Minor changes to the scope of work, budget line items, timing, reporting, or performance measures may be approved by the Project Manager.

Significant changes to the scope of work, performance measures, or compensation, unless the total contract after amendment is less than \$10,000, must be approved by ordinance of the City Council. Compensation changes in which the total contract is less than \$10,000 may be approved by the Bureau Director.

- E. NON-DISCRIMINATION. In carrying out activities under this contract, the County shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, familial status or national origin. The County shall take affirmative actions to insure that applicants for employment are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, familial status or national origin. Such action shall include but not be limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The County shall post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices provided by the City setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause. The County shall state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. The County shall incorporate the foregoing requirements of this paragraph in all of its contracts for work funded under this contract, except contracts governed by Section 104 of Executive Order 11246.

- F. ACCESS TO RECORDS. The City, or their duly authorized representatives, shall have access to any books, general organizational and administrative information, documents, papers, and records of the County which are directly pertinent to this contract, for the purpose of making audit examination, excerpts, and transcriptions. All required records must be maintained by the County for three years after the City makes final payment and all other pending matters are closed.

G. MAINTENANCE OF RECORDS. The County shall maintain records on a current basis to support its billings to the City. The City or its authorized representative shall have the authority to inspect, audit, and copy on reasonable notice and from time to time any records of the County regarding its billings or its work hereunder. The County shall retain these records for inspection, audit, and copying for 3 years from the date of completion or termination of this contract.

H. AUDIT OF PAYMENTS. The City, either directly or through a designated representative, may audit the records of the County at any time during the 3 year period established by Section G above.

If an audit discloses that payments to the County were in excess of the amount to which the County was entitled, then the County shall repay the amount of the excess to the City.

I. INDEMNIFICATION. The County shall hold harmless, defend, and indemnify the City and the City's officers, agents, and employees against all claims, demands, actions, and suits (including all attorney fees and costs) brought against any of them arising from the County's work or any subcontractor's work under this contract.

J. WORKERS' COMPENSATION INSURANCE.

1. The County, its subcontractors, if any, and all employers working under this Agreement, are subject employers under the Oregon Workers' Compensation law and shall comply with ORS 656.017, which requires them to provide workers' compensation coverage for all their subject workers. A certificate of insurance, or copy thereof, shall be attached to this Agreement as Exhibit A, if applicable, and shall be incorporated herein and made a term and part of this Agreement. The County further agrees to maintain workers' compensation insurance coverage for the duration of this Agreement.
2. In the event the County's workers' compensation insurance coverage is due to expire during the term of this Agreement, the County agrees to timely renew its insurance, either as a carrier-insured employer or a self-insured employer as provided by Chapter 656 of the Oregon Revised Statutes, before its expiration, and the County agrees to provide the City of Portland such further certification of workers' compensation insurance a renewals of said insurance occur.
3. The County agrees to accurately complete the City of Portland's Questionnaire for Workers' Compensation Insurance and Qualification as an

Independent County prior to commencing work under this Agreement. Questionnaire is attached to this Agreement as Exhibit B and shall remain attached to this Agreement and become a part thereof as if fully copied herein. Any misrepresentation of information on the Questionnaire by the County shall constitute a breach pursuant to this subsection, City may terminate this Agreement immediately and the notice requirement contained in the subsection entitled, TERMINATION FOR CAUSE, hereof shall not apply.

- K. LIABILITY INSURANCE. The County is self-insured as provided by Oregon law.
- L. SUBCONTRACTING AND ASSIGNMENT. The County shall not subcontract its work under this contract, in whole or in part, without the written approval of the City. The County shall require any approved subcontractor to agree, as to the portion subcontracted, to fulfill all obligations of the Contract as specified in this contract. Notwithstanding City approval of a subcontractor, the County shall remain obligated for full performance hereunder, and the City shall incur no obligation other than its obligations to the County hereunder. The County agrees that if subcontractors are employed in the performance of this contract, the County and its subcontractors are subject to the requirements and sanctions of ORS Chapter 656, Workers' Compensation. The County shall not assign this contract in whole or in part or any right or obligation hereunder, without prior written approval of the City. Subcontractors shall be responsible for adhering to all regulations cited within this contract.
- M. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR STATUS. The County is engaged as an independent contractor and will be responsible for any federal, state, or local taxes and fees applicable to payments hereunder.

The County and its subcontractors and employees are not employees of the City and are not eligible for any benefits through the City, including without limitation, federal social security, health benefits, workers' compensation, unemployment compensation, and retirement benefits.
- N. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS. The County shall report on its activities in a format and by such times as prescribed by the City.
- O. CONFLICTS OF INTEREST. No City officer or employee, during his or her tenure or for one year thereafter, shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in this contract or the proceeds thereof.

No City officer or employees who participated in the award of this contract shall be employed by the County

during the period of the contract.

- P. OREGON LAW AND FORUM. This contract shall be construed according to the law of the State of Oregon.

Any litigation between the City and the County arising under this contract or out of work performed under this contract shall occur, if in the state courts, in the Multnomah County court having jurisdiction thereof, and if in the federal courts, in the United States District Court for the State of Oregon.

- Q. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS. In connection with its activities under this contract, the County shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations.

In the event that the County provides goods or services to the City in the aggregate in excess of \$2,500.00 per fiscal year, the County agrees it has certified with the City's Equal Employment Opportunity certification process.

- R. BUSINESS LICENSE. County shall obtain a City of Portland business license as required by PCC 7.06.010 prior to beginning work under this Agreement. County shall provide a business license number in the space provided at the end of this Agreement.

- S. MONITORING. The City through the Bureau of Community Development shall monitor at least once each year that portion of the County's project funded with the City's General Funds. Such monitoring shall ensure that the operation of the project conforms to the provisions of this contract.

IX. Period of Agreement

The terms of this Agreement shall be effective as of July 1, 1992 and shall remain in effect during any period the County has control over Federal funds, including program income. The Agreement shall terminate as of June 30, 1993.



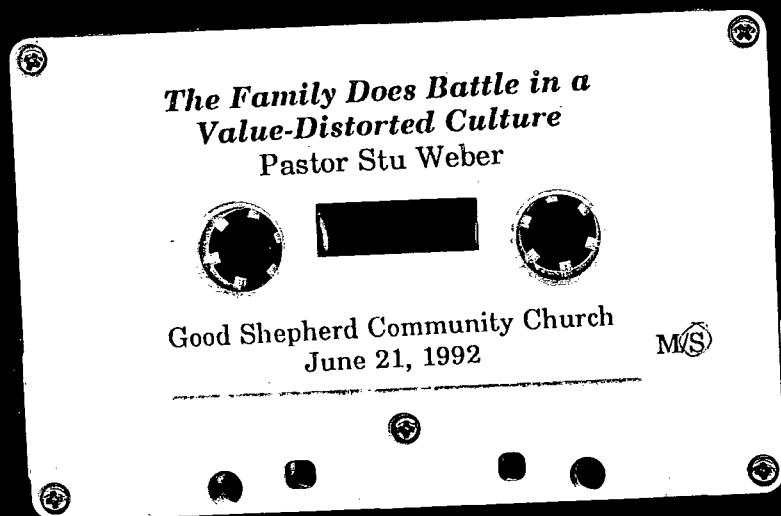
