1. Overview:

Multnomah County is a general purpose municipal corporation. Administrative functions are organized as follows:

1. **Community/Family Services** (19% of total operating budget)
-mental health, alcohol and drug, community action, community development and developmental disabilities related programs.
2. **Health** (22%)
-regulatory health, primary care, specialty care, dental services, HIV and sexually transmitted disease, and CareOregon (the Oregon Health Plan) operations.
3. **Sheriff** (11%)
-law enforcement, corrections, and the functions that support the rest of the justice system in Multnomah County.
4. **Library** (4%)
-operation of the region's major research library, a net of branch libraries in Multnomah County and targeted services to specific populations.
5. **Environmental Services** (18%)
-land use planning, animal control, real property assessment and tax collection, elections, and a number of internal support functions for the County.
6. **Aging Services** (3%)
-services to the elderly: community access, long term care, adult care home regulation, and public guardian.

Commissioners

7. District Attorney (3%)

- criminal prosecution, civil forfeitures of property, involved in drug related crimes, family justice services (child support enforcement, victims' assistance, child and domestic abuse teams).

8. Community Corrections (5%)

- supervision of offenders outside of prison, evaluation supporting sentencing decisions and substance abuse and mental health treatments, sanctions that provide structured alternatives to prison.

9. Juvenile Justice Services - (3%)

- court process support and other court services, probation counseling, detention, residential programs, alternatives to detention for youth in Multnomah County.

10. Non-Departmental (12%)

- functions which are outside the scope of the direct program areas including management support services, independent boards and commissions, and the Board of County Commissioners and County Auditor.

The fiscal 96/97 approved budget reflects:

1. Newly approved enhanced public safety and library operating levies -increases of approx. \$7m
2. Newly approved library and public safety general obligation bonds -and related capital improvements -approx. \$109m
3. Additional General fund discretionary dollars of approx. \$10m -split roughly evenly between ongoing and one-time expenditures -as a result of exceptional business income tax revenue growth (up \$5.8m or 21% over prior year budget) and other more moderate income growth (tax base revenue up \$7m) as well as higher than anticipated beginning fund balance.
4. New SB 1145 (M-11 enabling legislation) resources and requirements of \$43.4m are to be used for capital. Approx. \$3m of related operating \$ is budgeted in non-departmental until use plans are finalized.
5. Children's mental health capitation project (medicaid \$). Amounts used to flow direct from state to providers.
6. Increase general fund subsidy to grant fund (from \$45m to \$55m)
7. Various other capital projects (roads/bridges/new health clinic const/Edgefield childrens center/ finalization of Central and Midland libraries, juvenile justice 192 bed expansion, current courthouse renovation for D/A and info services enhancements). New debt issues planned total approx. \$113m -vast majority of which are the library and p/s go bonds.

What's not in the budget -the county's \$10m commitment to area public schools - is probably the most talked about issue this year. Plans to increase the business income tax have been shelved - at least temporarily. The support, therefore, will come from other areas including:

- Drawdown of budgeted Gfund reserves and contingency
- Increase in certain budgeted revenues (business income tax / beginning fund balance)
- Delay in budgeted enhancement implementation (from full to partial year)
- Reduction in estimated labor cost increases (COLA from 3.1 to 2.8)

Total employee (fte) numbers increased approx. 190 -or approx. 5%.

The budget document is extremely comprehensive, very well written, and evidence of extremely competent staff as well as lots of hard work.

Other items of note:

Library

-Midland and Central libraries to open next fiscal year. Services expanded with levy passage. Construction to begin on new projects.

Sheriff Office

-Certain expansions budgeted due to levy passage. However, most new personnel deferred until additional jail space comes on line. Construction to begin on new projects.

Health

-Two clinics closed in 95/96. Oregon Health plan enrollment not what expected / hoped. State / Federal funding declining; rather than raise the line of services to be funded-charging premium of \$3 /month. This will drive down enrollment; county considering paying premium for enrollees.

Community Corrections

-Have unallocated SB 1145 dollars in budget (actually in non-departmental). Will re-budget once plan is established. Some \$ may flow back to state if they take responsibility in interim.

Community and Family Services

-Children's mental health capitation program started. \$2m from HUD for transitional housing. Backfill \$1.2 m in expiring school grants.

2. *Local Budget Law Compliance:*

The budget is in substantial compliance with local budget law. As noted in Bob Muir's letter -there is some exposure on contribution to public schools. Adjustments to tax levies will be effected before adoption to offset debt service fund paying agent /registrar fees and contingency - which will be removed. Also, different discount and delinquency %'s used. This will be adjusted as well. And, the notice of budget committee meeting was published 7 days before the meeting rather than 8-14 days. A second notice was published to compensate and we believe the spirit of the law was met. Assumed savings from personal services (due mainly to vacancies) is aggressive -though it seems to be working OK in current year. They're basically budgeting with very little slack which may result in more contingency transfers. Prior year overexpenditures could possibly be mitigated by appropriating by department rather than dept and major exp. category. Also, they will need to cut back public safety levy (below rate authorized) once assessed values are known. Use of certain dedicated revenues (bond proceeds / road funds /tax title /forfeitures) needs to be closely documented. Increases to budgeted resources to partially fund school contribution are hopefully based on updated forecast. Need to budget transfer from p/s bond fund to juv justice debt service fund to effect debt reimbursement. Reprogram of natural areas \$ to different purpose need board resolution.

Possible Questions:

Local Budget Law

-See notes above under local budget law compliance

Program specific

1. Lots of recent publicity over bridge deferred maintenance and needed funding. The capital plan identifies a need of \$193m over the next 20 years. It appears that tolls analysis isn't going to happen. What are county's options to deal with this need? Could more gas taxes be programmed over from Road fund?
2. Certain Health clinics have been closed in recent months due to lower than anticipated program revenues. General fund contribution has increased as result. Current Oregon Health Plan capitation income could also decline if premium is assessed as condition of enrollment. Is budgeted program revenue / expenditures realistic in light of these anticipated changes?
3. Change in Community Corrections state funding formula (from all caseload to caseload and population) is planned to become effective in FY 97/98. This would hurt them significantly. How likely is this?
4. Children's mental health schedule to switch to capitation system. Payments to providers will also be on capitated basis -so it seems like risk is minimized. Citizen advisory committee mentioned risk in their report. Is the county at risk if provider cannot meet costs under capitated system?
5. What's latest on plans for new county courthouse? I noted that D/A has budgeted floor renovation of existing structure. Does this imply they plan be there for quite some time? Has Hatfield secured funding for federal courthouse?

Financial Policy

1. Citizen advisory committee recommended decreased reliance on short term revenues -and how current structure leads to planning by "fits and starts." Congrats on passing serial levies. What's plan to convert these into new tax base -possibly in 98?
2. It seems like federal government is headed towards a balanced budget over seven year time frame. Thus, it's very likely that support to State / Local jurisdictions will be reduced. Do they agree that cuts are likely? Is it possible to plan for these? It seems like lots of expiring grants were funded in current budget. What's policy on backfills?

3. County actually reached 5% general fund goal ahead of schedule (in current fiscal year due to revenue growth). Draw-down to fund schools will take them below this amount -though probably still on original timetable. "Cut and Cap" initiative scheduled for November vote. Other grant related uncertainties also are out there. Do they understand risks of drawdowns in light of these contingencies?
4. They continue to refine their internal costing mechanism -and are more accurately estimating grant fund expenditures. Partly as a result, the General fund subsidy to the Grant fund is growing. Are there cases where the county will not accept grant \$ due to required subsidy (i.e. inability to cover indirect costs), or does ability to leverage other resources outweigh this obligation?

Other

1. County currently collects Hotel/Motel tax -which is then essentially transferred over to Metro. Status of negotiations to allow Metro to collect this tax direct?
2. Possible de-annexation of Mid county area is still kind of a wild card. If this occurred, it's possible the county's existing law enforcement budget would not be adequate. Any thoughts on this?
3. Benchmarks -Looking at things simplistically, it seems like budget should respond to benchmark performance -i.e. fewer \$ for those which are doing better than anticipated, and more for those declining. This assumes there's a threshold of tolerance for certain statistics, or at least a point of diminishing returns. How does budget respond to decrease in domestic violence index and increased poverty statistics?
4. Has the County come any closer to determining the amount it will give to the school districts to help them out with budget shortfalls? Where will the money come from? What County services will be cut back to accommodate this expenditure?
5. We understood from the hearing on the Library and Jail G. O. Bonds that all the bonds would not be issued at once. Is there any estimate at this time on how much of each of these two authorizations will be issued in 1996?
