General Information

1. What action are you requesting from the Board?

Authorization for the Director of the Health Department to submit an application for up to \$750,000 to the Department of Housing and Urban Development Healthy Homes Technical Studies Program.

2. Please provide sufficient background information for the Board and the public to understand this issue. Please note which Program Offer this action affects and how it impacts the results.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Healthy Homes Technical Studies (HHTS) program aims to improve HUD's and the public's knowledge of housing-related health and safety hazards, and to improve or develop new hazard assessment and control methods, with a focus on key residential health and safety hazards. HUD is especially interested in projects which will advance our knowledge on key healthy homes issues by addressing important gaps in the science related to the accurate and efficient identification of hazards and cost effective hazard mitigation.

The overall goals and objectives of the Healthy Homes Program are to: (1) Mobilize public and private resources, involving cooperation among all levels of government, the private sector, grassroots community-based organizations, including faith-based organizations, and other non-profit organizations, to develop and implement the most promising, cost-effective methods for identifying and controlling housing-related hazards; and, (2) Build local capacity to operate sustainable programs.

To meet the goals and objectives of the HUD Healthy Homes Program, Multnomah County Health Department Environmental Health Services (EHS) is proposing a technical study focused on low income households occupied by persons over age 55 and persons who identify as having a disability. EHS will partner with the City of Portland Housing Bureau (PHB), REACH Community Development, and Multnomah County Weatherization to perform a study to evaluate the impacts of standardized education on hazards in the home and client knowledge/behavior, enabling the partners to discern the most effective and impactful way to provide and coordinate local health and housing services. This partnership will further enable local coordination of healthy housing services and leverages rehabilitation funding from PHB/REACH and Weatherization (e.g., monies for capital repairs) so that grant funds can be allocated to research staff, a community health worker, and housing inspector. The project extends current relationships between the partners by focusing standardized education on aging and disability communities. Main outcomes and outputs of the project include disseminating educational tools and research findings that will lead to a better understanding of how to best coordinate health and housing services to decrease hazards in the home and improve client knowledge, behavior, and health.

3. Explain the fiscal impact (current year and ongoing).

This grant will provide the Health Department up to \$750,000 for 36 months.

4. Explain any legal and/or policy issues involved.

5. Explain any citizen and/or other government participation that has or will take place.

The project includes partnerships with Multnomah County Department of County Human Services Weatherization and Aging and Disability Services programs; the City of Portland Housing Bureau; and REACH Community Development. Also, the project will engage members of the local aging and disability communities to participate in project design.
