



SUBJECT: State Community Services Omnibus Contract Amendments #6 and #7

Retroactive Status: These intergovernmental revenue contract amendments #6 and #7 are retroactive to July 1, 1990. The State Community Services made the contract period retroactive to that date due to their timeline for receipt of federal funds. The contract amendments were not received by the County until December 24, 1990 and January 2, 1991 respectively.

Recommendation: The Aging Services Division/Community Action Program recommends Board of County Commissioner approval of the attached intergovernmental revenue contract amendments #6 and #7 with the State Community Services, for the period July 1, 1990 through June 30, 1991.

Analysis: Contract amendment #6 increases Petroleum Violation Escrow, Stripper Well (PVE SW) funds for Multnomah County by \$241,111, from \$198,424 to \$439,535. These funds pay for weatherization services.

Contract amendment #7 increases Low Income Energy Assistance (LIEAP) by \$4,677, from \$196,844 to \$201,521, and Low Income Energy Assistance Weatherization (LIEAP-WX) by \$118,516, from \$180,063 to \$298,579. These funds pay for LIEAP eligibility and weatherization services.

Background: The adopted County Budget includes \$395,000 of Petroleum Violation Escrow funds, \$222,059 of LIEAP funds, and \$497,344 of LIEAP - Weatherization funds. A Budget Modification to adjust the County Budget to the revenues will be processed shortly.





Administration funds of \$53,176 are transferred to Program expense in the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG-90). The total contract amount is unchanged at \$354,506 under cost center 641-1-20-12-41-90 as charted below.

Program funds are added to the Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP-90) in the amount of \$52,630 under cost center 641-1-20-12-39-90.

Funding for the Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP-91) is increased by \$4,677 in Administration and decreased by \$125,609 in Program. The total contract amount under cost center 641-1-20-12-39-91 is reduced by \$120,932 from \$2,643,783 to \$2,522,851.

Funding for the Low Income Energy Assistance Weatherization Program (LIEAP-WX-91) is increased by \$9,123 in Administration and by \$109,393 in Program. Total contract funds under cost center 641-1-20-12-47-91 are increased by \$118,516 from \$180,063 to \$298,579.





RE: A&T Grant Budget/HB 2338 (FY 1991-92)

On Thursday, February 21st you will be asked to approve the FY 1991-92 budget for the Division of Assessment & Taxation. As you may know, we are required to submit the A&T budget to the State Department of Revenue under legislation imposed by HB 2338.

That legislation took Assessment & Taxation out of the County's normal budget cycle. Under HB 2338 the Board of County Commissioners must certify the total expenditures for the tax appraisal and collection functions prior to March 1st. The approved budget is then reviewed by the DOR which establishes the extent to which that budget enables the County to "come into compliance" with DOR guidelines and regulations.

HB 2338 also created a unique funding mechanism for the tax appraisal and collection system in the State of Oregon. Counties share in a statewide "grant" pool created by an increase in the delinquent tax rate from 12% to 16% and the imposition of a \$20 per transaction real estate transfer fee. In FY 1990-91 Multnomah County will receive approximately \$1.85 million from this statewide pool to supplement the A&T budget.

Attached for your review is the Assessment & Taxation "Summary of Expenses" for the FY 1991-92 Property Tax Program. In keeping with the Board's direction pertaining to budget preparation under Measure 5, I have asked the Division of Assessment & Taxation to submit a budget that identifies a three percent reduction in current service levels.

Total expenditures for FY 1991-92 are expected to total \$9,862,377. They include the following:

VALUATION (Assessment & Appraisal)	\$4,196,856

TAX COLLECTION & DISTRIBUTION	1,762,802
DATA PROCESSING	2,655,800
BOARD OF EQUALIZATION	<u>160,267</u>

It should be noted that these expenditures represent both Assessment & Taxation programs and other "support functions" not included within the A&T budget.

For instance, in FY 1991-92 we anticipate spending \$980,000 toward development of a new tax collection and distribution system. In the County budget this expense is shown as part of the Data Processing Special Appropriations fund. However, for purposes of the State "grant" process we must include it with the A&T budget to show the overall cost of performing those functions.

We are projecting Multnomah County's share of the statewide revenue pool to be approximately 20% of the total budget that is certified by the DOR. This figure compares favorably with our experience from the current year's program. Should this trend continue, we can expect to receive slightly more than \$2 million in "grant" revenue to supplement the County's Assessment & Taxation programs.

I have attached an overall summary of the total budget request included in the Property Tax Program as well as summary pages for the individual programs contained therein. Also included in your packet is the **Summary of Expenses** form (Attachment "A") which has been prepared for review by the DOR. Attachment "B" compares the net General Fund cost of implementing HB 2338 from the current to proposed budgets.

I will provide you with a complete, detail budget request later in the week. In addition, you will have an opportunity to direct questions to A&T staff regarding the assumptions which went into preparing this budget request at an informal briefing on Tuesday, February 19th.





INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT

Pursuant to ORS 190.010 MULTNOMAH COUNTY, a home rule subdivision of the State of Oregon (COUNTY), and CITY OF GRESHAM, a home rule subdivision of the State of Oregon (CITY), enter into the following Intergovernmental Agreement:

RECITALS

1. ORS 166.470 limits and conditions the sale of firearms. To implement that statute, the 1989 Legislature imposed certain administrative responsibilities on the sheriff's office regarding applications for weapons purchases, including conducting criminal and mental health background checks on purchasers of weapons from federally licensed dealers; notifying dealers by certified mail of disqualified weapons purchasers; and submitting monthly reports to the Oregon State Police regarding weapons permits issued and denied.
2. The Multnomah County Sheriff's Office has been performing these statutory duties for the unincorporated area of Multnomah County.
3. The CITY desires to have the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office perform these same administrative services for the CITY and further desires that the costs of performing those responsibilities be borne by the gun purchasers.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

4. The COUNTY shall conduct the background checks required for compliance with ORS 166.470 for firearms purchases.
5. The COUNTY shall charge and collect the same dealer fee for background checks of purchasers of weapons in the CITY as it charges in unincorporated Multnomah County.
6. The term of this Agreement is from date of execution by both parties until June 30, 1992. Renewal of this Agreement must be in writing.

7. The COUNTY and the CITY may, by mutual written agreement, terminate this Agreement for any reason at any time.

8. The COUNTY or the CITY may terminate this Agreement on thirty (30) days written notice.

9. This Agreement may only be amended in writing.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT
CONSENTING TO APPLICATION OF COUNTY
FORFEITURE ORDINANCE WITHIN CITY

Pursuant to ORS 190.010, MULTNOMAH COUNTY, a home rule political subdivision of the State of Oregon, by and through the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office (COUNTY) and the CITY OF GRESHAM, a municipal corporation and political subdivision of the State of Oregon, (CITY) agree as follows:

RECITALS

1. The 1989 Legislature enacted HB 2282 (Oregon Laws Chapter 791 (1989)) which allows for the enactment and enforcement of local civil forfeiture ordinances in areas determined by those local governments to be detrimental to public health, safety and welfare, provided the procedures used in effecting and the defenses relating to the forfeiture are consistent with those set out in the State statutory scheme.

2. On December 14, 1989, COUNTY adopted Ordinance 633 (see Exhibit A attached) which amended its previous forfeiture ordinance (#422) to meet the standards imposed by the terms of Oregon Laws Chapter 791 (1989) as well as to address the additional concerns in other areas of public health, safety and welfare.

3. The prohibited conduct which COUNTY Ordinance 633 is intended to discourage is not confined to the jurisdictional boundaries of unincorporated COUNTY, but exists within the cities located in COUNTY as well.

4. The CITY is within the boundaries of COUNTY and desires to enforce COUNTY Ordinance 633 within CITY boundaries.

In consideration of mutual promises set out below, the parties agree to the following:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. The CITY consents to enforcement of COUNTY Ordinance 633 within its jurisdictional CITY boundaries. The CITY further agrees that the ordinance may be enforced by any jurisdiction's law enforcement officers, as well as by CITY police officers.

2. Disposition of proceeds realized from enforcement of the forfeiture provisions of COUNTY Ordinance 633 within CITY boundaries shall be disbursed in accordance with the

Intergovernmental Agreement between CITY and COUNTY dated April 2, 1990, and attached hereto as Exhibit B.

3. The term of this Agreement is perpetual unless terminated by either party in writing thirty days before the termination date. This Agreement is effective retroactive to April 1, 1990.

(b) Use the forfeited property to further fund law enforcement and criminal prosecution functions; and

(c) To declare specific conveyances and real property which is used or intended to be used in specific types of prohibited conduct to be nuisances.

3. Therefore, the county adopts the provisions of this Ordinance as consistent with the law of the state pertaining to the forfeiture of real and personal property based upon the prohibited conduct.

4. This Act is applicable throughout this county.

5. This ordinance provides for the forfeiture of property based upon conduct that is prohibited conduct as defined in this Ordinance when:

(a) The property was used or is intended to be used in the prohibited conduct described in this ordinance, or is profits or proceeds of the conduct; and

(b) The forfeiture is subject to procedures and limitations set forth in this Ordinance and 1989 Oregon Laws Chapter 791.

6. Nothing in this section or in this Ordinance shall be construed to limit or impair any right or remedy that any person or entity may have under ORS 166.715 to 166.735. The application of any remedy under this ordinance is remedial and not punitive and shall not preclude or be precluded by the application of any previous or subsequent civil or criminal remedy under any other provision of law. Civil remedies under this ordinance are supplemental and not mutually exclusive.

Section 2. Repeal of MCC 785.020.

MCC 7.85.020, the Policy and Purpose provisions of the Forfeiture Ordinance of Multnomah County, is repealed.

Section 3. Adoption of MCC 7.85.021.

MCC 7.85.021 is adopted to read as follows:

7.85.021. Policy and Purpose.

(A) The Board of County Commissioners finds that:

(a) The Board of County commissioners enacted Ordinance No. 422 in April 1984 which provided for the forfeiture of profits, proceeds and/or instrumentalities used or intended to be used in the manufacture, distribution or possession with intent to distribute controlled substances, gambling, promoting gambling, promoting prostitution and/or compelling prostitution.

Section 7. Adoption of MCC 7.85.026.

MCC 7.85.026 is adopted to read as follows:

7.85.026 Forfeiture.

The following will be subject to civil in rem forfeiture:

(A) All property, products and equipment of any kind which are used, or intended for use, in providing, manufacturing, compounding, processing, delivering, importing or exporting any service or substance in the course of prohibited conduct.

(B) All conveyances, including aircraft, vehicles or vessels, which are used or are intended for use, to transport or in any manner facilitate the transportation, sale, receipt, possession or concealment of property described in subsection (1) of this section, and all conveyances including aircraft, vehicles or vessels, which are used or intended for use in prohibited conduct or to facilitate prohibited conduct in any manner; such conveyances specifically include but are not limited to the following:

(a) a conveyance operated by a person whose operator's license is suspended or revoked as a result of conviction for driving under the influence of intoxicants in violation of the provisions of Chapter 16.12 of Portland City Code or Chapter 813 of the Oregon Revised Statutes; or

(b) A conveyance within which an act of prostitution as prohibited by Portland City Code 14.36.065 or as defined in ORS 167.007 has occurred.

(c) A conveyance used or intended to be used to facilitate activities defined in ORS 167.012 (Promoting Prostitution), ORS 167.017

(Compelling Prostitution), or ORS 167.122 -
167.137 (Gambling Offenses).

No conveyance used by any person as a common carrier in the transaction of business as a common carrier shall be forfeited under the provisions of this section unless the owner or other person in charge of such conveyance was a consenting party or knew of and acquiesced in the prohibited conduct.

(C) No property shall be forfeited under the provisions of this section by reason of any act or omission established by the owner thereof to have been committed or omitted by any person other than such owner while such property was unlawfully in the possession of a person other than the owner in violation of the criminal laws of the United States or any state. Such property shall be returned to the owner following a determination by the court that the property was unlawfully in the possession of a person other than the owner, and the owner did not know it, and did not consent to the use of the property for prohibited conduct.

This ordinance incorporates by reference as though fully set forth herein Sections 3(3) through (6), inclusive, of the 1989 Oregon Laws Chapter 791.

Section 8. Repeal of MCC 7.85.030; MCC 7.85.035; MCC 7.85.040; MCC 7.85.045; and, MCC 7.85.050.

The following Multnomah County Code Sections are repealed:

- A. MCC 7.85.030 - Seizure.
- B. MCC 7.85.035 - Institution of legal proceedings.
- C. MCC 7.85.040 - Disposition of property.
- D. MCC 7.85.045 - Non-consensual use of property for illegal activity.
- E. MCC 7.85.050 - Separability.

Section 9. Adoption of MCC 7.85.031.

MCC 7.85.031 is adopted to read as follows:

7.85.031 Forfeiture procedures.

The following procedures are hereby incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein the following applicable portions of 1989 Oregon Laws Chapter 791: Sections 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 12, 12a, 13, 14, 19 and 20, inclusive.

4 MCC 7.85.036 is adopted to read as follows:

5 7.85.036 Distribution of Proceeds.

6 After the forfeiture counsel distributes property under

Section 11. Adoption.

This Ordinance, being necessary for the health, safety and general welfare of the people of Multnomah County, an emergency is declared and the Ordinance shall take effect upon its execution by the County, Chair, pursuant to Section 5.50 of the Charter of Multnomah County.

LETTER OF AGREEMENT ADDENDUM

JULY 5, 1988

This is an addendum containing amendments to the November 18, 1985, Letter of Agreement between the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) and the Gresham Police Departments (GPD) that created a combined unit to investigate narcotics and vice activities.

Since implementation of the original agreement, conditions have changed and it is agreed that sections of the agreement need to be amended.

1.) Section B, Paragraph 2, Subparagraph 1

The Gresham Police Department shall assign three Gresham Police Officers to the Special Investigations Unit for at least 40 hours per officer per week. At least one Gresham Officer will always be assigned to the Regional Organized Crime & Narcotics (ROCN) Task Force during the term of the task force. On occasions when the Gresham Police Department requires the services of officers assigned to the Special Investigations Unit for non-special investigations, the Gresham Police Department shall notify the SIU manager of the need and negotiate a schedule for the officer's services. If the officers are to be temporarily removed, the two parties shall discuss a return day for replacement.

2.) Section C

The Multnomah County Sheriff's Office shall provide specialized equipment such as body transmitters, surveillance equipment and vehicle tracking devices. Vehicles for the SIU will be provided from the inventory of seized vehicles and/or be provided from funds in the SEDE Fund. Maintenance costs for the vehicles will come from the SEDE Fund.

3.) Section D

Under Section D of the Agreement both parties agree that overtime expenditures for investigative purposes are a legitimate law enforcement expenditure and therefore is within the scope contained in the original Letter of Agreement. It is the desire of both parties that expenditures for investigative overtime be funded from the special fund known as SEDE. Therefore, Section D is amended as follows:

Section D, Paragraph 2

The Sheriff's Office and the Gresham Police Department agree that forfeited proceeds resulting from the investigations of the joint Special Investigations Unit shall be placed in a special fund within the Sheriff's Office. This fund shall be identified as the SEDE Fund. The monies contained within the SEDE Fund shall be used for law enforcement purposes only, specifically, with a focus for the investigation of criminal activity involving drugs and narcotics trafficking, organized crime as defined by Section A of this agreement and vice conditions. Law enforcement expenditure for the purpose of this agreement shall include the payment of informant fees, purchase of evidence, purchase of investigative equipment, the maintenance of investigative equipment, training of unit members, approved and investigative expenses required for the successful conclusion of an investigation, and the payment of operational overtime resulting from a criminal investigation.

DEFINITION: For the purposes of this agreement, operational overtime is defined as that time outside a member's normal work date that is spent on normal working activities such as, but not limited to; investigations, undercover activities, surveillance, service of search and arrest warrants, arrests, and report writing. Time spent in court or other judicial process such as District Attorneys conferences is not included in the definition of operational overtime. It is agreed that the City of Gresham shall bill Multnomah County for the overtime expenses incurred. The billing shall include the employee name, rate of pay, benefit costs, and number of hours on the appropriate date. Both parties agree that only that time approved by the unit commander shall be compensated.

4.) Section E, Paragraph 1

The Sheriff and Chief of Police shall receive a monthly report from the SIU manager detailing operational activities, seizures, arrests, SEDE activities and other information deemed pertinent to the activities of the SIU.

This letter constitutes an agreement between the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) and the Gresham Police Department (GPD) to create a combined unit to investigate narcotics and vice operations. This unit shall be responsible for the investigation of criminal activity in narcotics trafficking, vice, organized crime, and other similar investigations needing specialized personnel and equipment, within the jurisdiction of the Multnomah County Sheriff and the City of Gresham.

To carry out the elements of this joint operation, the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and Gresham Police Department agree as follows:

- A. The combined unit shall be titled the "Special Investigations Unit." The Multnomah County Sheriff's Office shall provide the proper administrative management and operational supervision for the combined unit. The new unit will be housed at the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office.

The Special Investigations Unit shall be responsible for investigations into all commercial narcotics activities (the selling, manufacturing, growing, distribution, possession for sale, or possession for distribution of controlled substances); vice activities (gambling, prostitution, commercial pornography); and other special investigations (such as racketeering, criminal activities committed by organized criminal groups, Sting operations, etc.) for the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and the Gresham Police Department.

The Special Investigations Unit manager will consult with the Gresham Police Department Investigative Section Commander regarding conflicts over priorities of the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and the City of Gresham special investigations.

- B. In order to assure adequate personnel resource is available, the parties agree to the following sworn officer complement.
1. The Multnomah County Sheriff's Office shall assign one sergeant and no less than three sworn deputies 40 hours per person per week.
 2. The Gresham Police Department shall assign two Gresham police officers to the Special Investigations Unit for at least 35 hours per officer per week. On occasions, when the Gresham Police Department requires the service of officers assigned to the Special Investigations Unit for non-special investigations, the Gresham Police Department shall notify the SIU manager of the need and negotiate a schedule for the officers' services. If the officers are to be temporarily removed, the two parties should discuss a return date or replacement.

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The parties recognize that it is essential that the personnel in this unit be compatible to ensure an effective operation. Therefore, the Gresham Police Department shall recommend the personnel from the Gresham Police Department to be assigned. The decision of which officers are appointed to the Special Investigations Unit shall rest with the Chief of Police of Gresham after review by and upon consultation with the Undersheriff.

The Special Investigations Unit manager will be responsible for all necessary personnel evaluations and routine administrative reports required for all officers assigned to the SIU, including members of the Gresham Police Department. Evaluations of Gresham officers will be forwarded to the Gresham Police Chief for his review.

The Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and Gresham police officers assigned shall schedule their time off, vacations, and training through the SIU manager.

- C. The Multnomah County Sheriff's Office shall provide specialized equipment such as body transmitters, surveillance equipment and vehicle tracking devices. The Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and Gresham Police Department shall provide vehicles for the officers from their respective agencies. Each agency will be responsible for the maintenance costs of their assigned vehicles.
- D. All forfeited proceeds resulting from investigations conducted by the Special Investigations Unit after the effective date of this agreement shall be divided in accordance with the Multnomah County Ordinance 442 and the contract executed between Multnomah County and the City of Gresham regarding the sharing of forfeiture proceeds.

The Sheriff's Office and the Gresham Police Department agree that forfeited proceeds resulting from the investigations of the joint Special Investigations Unit shall be placed in a special fund within the Sheriff's Office. This fund shall be used for law enforcement purposes only, specifically the investigation of criminal activity in narcotics trafficking, vice, and other types of organized crime as defined by Section A of this agreement.

When joint federal and SIU investigations result in asset seizure under the federal statute, the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and Gresham Police Department shall jointly apply to the United States Attorney's Office or other responsible federal agency for participation in the forfeiture of the assets. Once awarded, the assets shall be distributed to the respective agencies by mutual agreement between the Sheriff and the Gresham Chief of Police.

The Sheriff's Office and the Gresham Police Department agree, that if the agreement is terminated, the funds and vehicles resulting from forfeitures by the joint Special Investigations Unit, shall be divided in accordance with the formula based on the manpower contribution by each agency within the unit at the time of the

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termination of the agreement. (For example, if Multnomah County Sheriff's Office assigns four persons and the Gresham Police Department assigns two persons the fund would be redistributed at a rate of 67% return to the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and 33% return to the Gresham Police Department.)


- E. The Sheriff and Chief of Police shall receive a monthly report from the SIU manager detailing operational activities, seizures, arrests, and other information deemed pertinent to the activities of the SIU.

The Sheriff and Chief of Police agree to meet quarterly to discuss the operation of the combined unit, review the status of the forfeiture fund and current issues generic to drug law enforcement with the East Multnomah County Community.

- F. This agreement may be terminated by either party upon 30 days written notice.
