General Information

1. What action are you requesting from the Board?

No action is required. The purpose is to provide an update on the Feasibility Study of the Earthquake Ready Burnside Bridge Project.

2. Please provide sufficient background information for the Board and the public to understand this issue. Please note which Program Offer(s) this action affects and how it impacts the results.

The purpose of the Earthquake Ready Burnside Bridge Project is to establish a seismically resilient Burnside crossing over the Willamette River that will remain fully operational following a magnitude 9.0 Cascadia Subduction Zone earthquake. This project was identified as a top priority in the recently published 2015 Willamette River Bridge Capital Improvement Plan, a document that outlines the mission and direction for the Multnomah County Bridge Section for the next 20 years.

Since kicking off the Feasibility Study in September of 2016 the County has:

- Developed a Project Problem Statement
- Developed over 100 options that fall into various groups such as do nothing, seismic retrofit, and full replacement
- Screened these over 100 options down to a list of 26 for further evaluation
- Completed preliminary evaluation and cost estimating for the 26 remaining options

This briefing will provide information about project activities and outreach to date, share preliminary trends from option evaluation, and outline future activities for the project. By fall of 2018, the project team intends to have a short list of feasible alternatives suitable for further development in an in-depth environmental study.

The Feasibility Study includes a robust stakeholder outreach plan that provides the public, agency staff, and elected officials opportunities to give input on the development of the short list of alternatives. Outreach includes regular meetings of subcommittee groups, in person briefings, videos, online and in-person open houses, social media, a website, surveys, and a project fact sheet.
