## General Information

### 1. What action are you requesting from the Board?

Engage in a learning dialogue about local Maternal, Child and Family (MCFH) Health Data from the first published data book in Multnomah County.

### 2. Please provide sufficient background information for the Board and the public to understand this issue. Please note which Program Offer this action affects and how it impacts the results.

In 2014 MCHD released the first MCFH data book as part of the health department's core public health function to report on baseline health outcomes for Multnomah County families. The report highlights key outcomes as compared to national standards and introduces new measures to understand family health across the county. The report highlights key preconception and early childhood outcomes that lay the groundwork for good health and illustrates a trend of some communities faring better than others. This briefing will include a summary of the local data, an orientation to the concept of Lifecourse health with a focus on nutrition and chronic stress, how these preconceptual and early childhood outcomes are clearly linked to long-term health issues and innovative approaches other communities are initiating to address these important health issues.

### 3. Explain the fiscal impact (current year and ongoing).

While this briefing doesn't impact a specific program offer, there is an economic impact associated with ensuring that the work we engage in both in our Public Health and clinical services and our role as a local government over the coming years has a true focus on primary prevention and embracing a Lifecourse approach.
