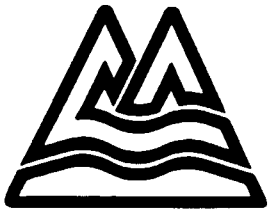

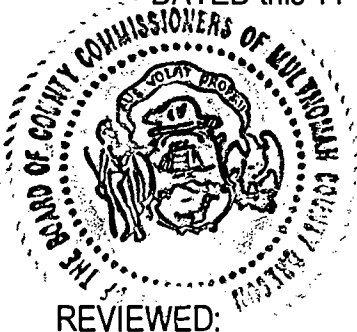
WHEREAS, after proper notice of a public hearing, the Board of County Commissioners accepted testimony and evidence presented at a de novo hearing on February 25, 1997, and the Board being fully advised; now therefore

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Condition No. 2 of the Hearing Officer's decision dated January 7, 1997 in the matter of CS 3-96 is AMENDED to read "Approval is granted for the use described in the land use application. Any substantial change in the use shall require a new Community Service Use review and conditional use permit. The school use approved is for a school of approximately 60 students. In no event, may the number of students served by the school during any one day exceed 70 students. Further, physical education classes may be provided on the subject property. The addition of showers may only be permitted if sanitation approval for use or expansion of the existing septic system can be obtained.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Board of County Commissioners adopts the following findings and conclusions:

1. The Hearings Officer's findings and conclusions in the decision dated January 7, 1997.
2. The findings of fact in the Staff Report dated December 11, 1996 except as modified and supplemented by the Hearings Officer's January 2, 1997 decision.



I. DECISION

The Hearings Officer hereby **APPROVES** the Applicant's request for a conditional use permit for a community service use, as outlined in the Applicant's application and subject to the conditions of approval contained in Section II of this decision. This approval is based upon the findings of fact and conclusions of law contained in the Staff Report prepared by Lisa Estrin for CS 3-96, as modified by the findings and conclusions contained in this decision.

II. CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL

1. Approval of this use shall expire two years from the date of this decision unless substantial development or utilization has taken place in accordance with MCC 11.15.7010(C).
2. Approval is granted for the use described in the land use application. Any substantial change in the use shall require a new Community Service Use review and conditional use permit. The school use approved is for a school of approximately 60 students. In no event, may the number of students served by the school during any one day exceed 70 students. Further, no physical education classes, shower or after-school sports activities may be provided on the subject property.
3. Students attending the school shall be transported to the school facility by district bus.
4. Approval is granted upon the condition that the Owner apply for and obtain Multnomah County Design Review approval for the proposed use, prior to issuance of any building permit or use of the subject property for "at risk" students. During such review, the Owner shall demonstrate that the proposed site design complies with Comprehensive Plan Policy #14
5. As part of design review, the applicant shall develop and submit an on-site drainage system to manage the run-off from the paved areas and building roofs. The system shall utilize a french drain system, drainage swale or other on-site drainage system approved by the Planning and Building Departments.
6. As a part of final Design Review, the Bonny Slope School shall develop, submit and obtain approval of an on-site parking and circulation plan that complies with the County code (particularly MCC 11.15.6100-.6148) and which reduces any hazardous conditions caused by vehicular/pedestrian conflicts.
7. Prior to final Design Review, the School District shall show compliance with required sight distances for driveways and shall modify the site plan to show the dedications and physical improvements required within the abutting public street right-of-way, as determined necessary by the County Engineer.
8. Prior to issuance of a building permit, the School District shall show compliance with all dedication requirements or in-lieu of fees required by the County Engineer. Those fees and requirements shall be determined and imposed by the County as a part of the Design Review process.

9. The School District shall comply with the on-site septic system requirements of the City of Portland Sanitation Permits section and shall obtain an alteration permit prior to occupancy of the property for the approved use.

IV. FINDINGS AND CONCLUSIONS

The Hearings Officer makes the following additional findings of fact and conclusions of law to support her decision to approve the above-referenced land use application and to impose the conditions of approval listed above:

1. Comprehensive Plan Policies

Not all comprehensive plan policies serve as approval criteria for plan amendment and zone change applications. Some plan policies direct local government legislation, rather than guide the course of quasi-judicial plan and zoning ordinance amendments. As a result, each plan policy must be reviewed to determine whether the a policy is intended to serve as an approval criterion for a particular land use application. *Stewart v. City of Brookings*, ___ Or LUBA ___ (LUBA No. 96-001, June 27, 1996); *Ellison v. Clackamas County*, 28 Or LUBA 521, 525 (1995); *Tektronix, Inc. v. City of Beaverton*, 18 Or LUBA 473, 489 (1989); *Standard Insurance Co. v. Washington County*, 16 Or LUBA 30, 34, 38 (1987); *Citizens for Better Transit v. Metro Service District*, 15 Or LUBA 482, 487 (1987). The Hearings Officer, therefore, has reviewed the Plan policies cited in the Staff Report to determine which are approval criteria for this application. The Hearings Officer has also made findings of compliance with Plan policies below, for provisions of Plan policies which require such findings.

- A. Policy #8 is not an approval criterion for review of this application as it provides direction to Multnomah County regarding the County's selection of areas for rural residential development, not to the siting of community services in rural residential areas.
- B. Parts A-D of Policy 13 are not approval criteria for this conditional use application. Those parts of the policy guide County actions regarding air, noise and water quality matters but do not contain approval criteria. The second full, unnumbered paragraph of Policy 13 is an approval criterion for quasi-judicial land use applications. The section does not, however, apply to the proposed use because the proposed use is not located in a noise impacted area and the proposed use is not a "noise generator," as such term is defined by County land use regulations.
- C. Policy #14 applies to development of the subject property. This policy must be considered during the design review process for the subject property when development activities are being reviewed. Compliance with Policy #14 has been required as a condition of approval of this application.
- D. Policy #19 directs the County to adopt and apply a design review process to land development. Policy #19 is not, however, a policy which serves as an approval

criterion for this land use application. The County has complied with this policy by adopting an ordinance to require the Applicant to obtain design review approval for site improvements.

- E. The Hearings Officer has considered the factors listed in Policy #22 prior to approving this land use application, as required by Policy #22.
- F. Policy #23 is a direction to the County and is not an approval criterion for this land use application. The approval of this application will, however, further the aims of this policy.
- G. This decision imposes a condition of approval requiring compliance with County sight distance standards for all school accesses to Thompson Road. The imposition of this condition will assure that the proposed use will comply with Policy #31H. Policy #31H requires the County to restrict the siting of community facilities in locations where site access would cause dangerous intersections. As Thompson Road curves and winds around the subject property and portions of the school site are heavily wooded, sight distance may be a problem at the school road entrances.
- H. Subsection B of Policy #37 is met by the Applicant as the Applicant has established that the proposed use is connected to a public water system and that approval of an on-site subsurface sewage disposal system can be obtained for the site from agencies authorized to enforce DEQ regulations. Approval of this application has also been conditioned upon approval of an alteration permit, as outlined in Exhibit E7 to assure compliance with Plan Policy #37.
- I. Compliance with subsections F and G of Policy #37 has been established by the Applicant and County staff. The County's water drainage permit process will assure that all run-off will be contained on site or by adequate, County approved methods. The County's regulations will prevent run-off from the site from adversely affecting the water quality in adjacent streams, ponds, lakes or from altering the drainage of water onto adjacent lands by containing the water on site.
- J. The Applicant has also established that there is an adequate energy supply to handle the levels of use projected by the Plan and that communications facilities are available, as required by Policy #37 H & I.
- K. Subsection A of Policy 40 does not require dedication of bicycle or pedestrian paths as no such paths are designated for the subject property and its surrounding area by the Bicycle Corridor Capital Improvements Program and Map. Subsection B of Policy 40 does not apply to this application as the proposed use is not a commercial, industrial or multiple family development. Subsection C of

Policy #40 does not require the installation of bicycle parking facilities as students will be bussed to the school site from distant locations, from which bicycle riding is not a viable transportation option.

2. The Applicant has objected to the staff report's condition of approval #2 which limits school occupancy to 60 students. The Applicant requested approval of a school use which will serve from 30 to approximately 60 students. Information submitted by the applicant in support of the application indicates that as many as 70 students might attend and occupy the Bonny Slope School (Exhibit E7) and it is this number of students which was considered by the City of Portland's Bureau of Buildings when it reviewed and commented upon the septic feasibility of the school site. At the hearing, the Applicant indicated that the District would like to serve as many as 70-75 students at the site.

Oregon Land Use Board of Appeals decisions hold that an applicant is bound by the representations it makes in the land use process which are relevant to approval criteria, even if compliance with the applicant's representations is not required by conditions of approval. *Wilson Park Neighborhood Assn. v. City of Portland*, 27 Or LUBA 106, remanded on other grounds, 129 Or App 33 (1994); *Perry v. Yamhill County*, 26 Or LUBA 73, aff'd 125 Or App 588 (1993); *Friends of the Metolius v. Jefferson County*, 25 Or LUBA 411 (1993). The Applicant's representations about a use are used by the County to determine whether a use complies with all relevant County land use approval criteria and for giving notice to project neighbors. As a result, land use approval is limited to the use proposed by the Applicant in its application, not some more intensive use, which may be allowed by the Hearings Officer. The size of the student population is critical in reviewing the impact of the proposed use on public infrastructure and upon sewage and other utility facilities.

The fact that the application for the school use indicated that a maximum of *approximately* 60 students would be served by the school indicates to the Hearings Officer that some number of students, over and above 60, might be accommodated on the school site. The Hearings Officer finds that the phrase "approximately" 60 could be read broadly to allow as many as, but no more than, 70 students at the school, the number of students the District told the City's Environmental Soils Specialist would be located at the school (Exhibit E7). Condition of approval #2 has been revised accordingly.

3. The application indicates that there will be no physical education classes or after school sports offered at the school. This fact is relevant to approval of the application as it was relied upon by Jason Abraham, Environmental Soils Specialist, in rendering his decision that the school site could handle its own septic disposal needs on site. As such, the Hearings Officer revised condition of approval #2 to prohibit such activities unless a new land use approval is obtained from the County.

A second phase, dependent upon funding, is proposed to add a 300 square foot administrative office to the existing building.

Recommended Hearings Officer Decision:

Community Service

(CS 3-96): Approve, subject to conditions, the applicants request for a Community Service designation based on the following findings and conclusions.

Conditions of Approval:

1. Approval of this Community Service Use shall expire two (2) years from the date of this decision unless substantial development or utilization has taken place in accordance with MCC 11.15.7010.
2. The Bonny Slope School facility shall be limited to serving a maximum of 60 students at the facility as described in the application. Any alteration in use, such as expansion of the school to a different type of school program, either permanent or temporary, will be considered a modification of the use that will require Community Service Use review and approval.
3. Students attending the school shall be transported to the school facility by district bus.
4. Compliance with and approval of the Multnomah County Design Review process shall be required prior to the issuance of any building permit or operation related to this proposal on this site.
5. As part of design review, the applicant shall develop and submit a on-site drainage system to manage the run-off from the paved areas and building roofs. The system shall utilize either a french drain system or drainage swale as approved by the Planning and Building Departments.
6. Prior to final Design Review, the Bonny Slope School shall develop and submit an On-site Parking and Circulation Plan that complies with County code and reduces any hazardous conditions caused by vehicular/pedestrian conflicts, as part of the design review process.
7. Prior to final Design Review, the School District shall show compliance with required sight distances for the new driveway and modify the site plan to show the dedications and physical improvements required within the abutting public street right-of-way as determined by the County Engineer.
8. Prior to issuance of a building permit, the School District shall show compliance with all dedication requirements or in-lieu of fees required by the County Engineer.
9. The School District shall comply with the on-site septic system requirements of the City of Portland Sanitation Permits section.

Applicant's Proposal:

The Washington County Education Service District and the Beaverton School District are seeking a Community Use Designation for the property located at 10351 NW Thompson Rd. Portland, Oregon. Tax lots 7, 11, 13 -- Map I N I W 26 Multnomah County. Prior to 1980 the existing building (with additions) functioned as a school for 40 years. In 1980 it was converted to the Beaverton School District Print Shop. Currently it is vacant.

The Districts are interested in re-opening the existing Bonny Slope building as a school. The Facility is proposed to be an Alternative middle and high school, housing about 30 students with growth to approximately 60 students, and about 10 teachers and support personnel. The curriculum taught will be the standard for school districts in Washington County, but the student teacher ratio will be significantly lower, at about a 5 students to each teacher. The students will be drawn from school districts in Washington County. The students that are selected to attend Bonny Slope are students that have been identified by their home school district as being "At Risk", meaning that during their school years they have a potential for dropping out of school before they reach graduation of high school. The districts feel exposing these children to more guidance by allowing the teacher to spend more one on one time with each student will help build self esteem, confidence, and increase learning skills. It must be noted that these students are not children who have been "trouble makers", but are students who need more attention and guidance in a school setting.

All students will be bused from their home district for a starting time at approximately 9:20 AM and for closing time at 3:35PM. Buses used are small mini school buses.

Most remodeling to the building will be internal to bring the structure up to current codes. As a second phase dependent upon funding, a 300 square foot administrative office is proposed at the existing entry area deck and will not extend beyond the front of the facade. The general appearance of the building will not change. A new entry will be created directly behind the existing entry on what is currently the back of the building. Orienting the entry toward the play fields at the paved area, will allow better access, safer school bus loading and unloading for students, and delivery of supplies. Amount of funding will not change the proposal to realign the entry to the west. There are no proposed changes to the play fields.

Community Service Ordinance Considerations and Findings:

NOTE: THE APPLICANT'S RESPONSE TO AN APPROVAL CRITERIA WILL BE INDICATED BY THE BEGINNING NOTATION "Applicant:"

Additional Planning Staff comments may be added where supplemental information is determined to be needed or where staff may not concur with the applicant's statements.

The Hearings Officer must find that the proposal meets the following criteria:

I. Zoning Ordinance Requirements

MCC 11.15.2212 Conditional Uses [Rural Residential].

The following uses may be permitted when found by the Hearings Officer to satisfy the applicable Ordinance standards:

(A) Community Services Uses under the provisions of MCC .7005 through .7041.

MCC 11.15.7020 Uses.

(A) Except as otherwise provided in MCC .2012, the following Community Service Uses and those of a similar nature, may be permitted in any district when approved at a public hearing by the approval authority.

(20) School, private, parochial or public; educational institution.

Staff: The proposed use is for a middle and high school in an existing building.

MCC 11.15.7015 Community Service Approval Criteria.

The approval authority must find that the proposal:

(1) Is consistent with the character of the area;

Applicant: Bonny Slope area is designated a rural residential neighborhood. Residential areas near by are developing at a higher density. Schools have traditionally been located in these types of zoned areas. Bonny Slope School will serve a countywide school base and is not required to be located in a more urban setting. The small school (30 to 60 students) will not generate noticeable increase of traffic. Noise levels will be consistent with the quiet nature of a Rural area. All instruction will be held inside the building. There are no P.E. classes held at this school. The school will not have after school sports either. The school site size is consistent with the parcelization in the area.

The building and school yard are existing. The last building addition to the former school was in 1967. Visually the site has not changed in 28 years. There are no plans for removal of any trees on site. The existing parking areas are in poor condition and are proposed to be reconditioned. The net area of land paved will not exceed existing quantities. A minor addition is planned at the current entry, and will not change the general appearance of the building and site.

(2) Will not adversely affect natural resources;

Applicant: No mineral and aggregate sites have been designated a Geologic resource in the area. The school will not adversely affect any energy source, wilderness areas, cultural and historic resources, or wild & scenic water ways. Operating the building as a school will preserve the school yard as open space for use for nearby residences throughout the year. Opening the building as a school will also insure that the character of the existing building will not change. The school has been located on this site since 1938. The building is currently a land mark for the local community, even though it has been closed for many years. Since there are minimal changes to the building exterior or site, views through the site, and from the site will not change. In addition there are no plans to remove any trees or landscaping which would support small wildlife or change any view on or from the site.

(3) Will not conflict with farm and forest uses in the area;

Applicant: There are no farms (mostly houses large lot or under 5 acres) or forest use areas near the proposed school site. The site is located in a rural residential neighborhood. All school activities are proposed to be held inside the school. Air quality requirements for a school are consistent with that of a rural residential neighborhood. See attached Aerial photo.

Staff: The subject parcel is designated Rural Residential under the Multnomah County Comprehensive Framework Plan. Statewide Planning Goal 3 - Agricultural Lands and Goal 4 - Forest Lands were established in part to preserve and maintain agricultural lands and to conserve forest lands for forest uses. An exception has been taken to Goal(s) 3 and 4, that is, Rural Residential lands have been identified and determined to possess qualities from which the rules established to protect agricultural and forest lands do not specifically apply.

(4) Will not require public services other than those existing or programmed for the area;

Applicant: This project will not require public services other than those existing or programmed for the Area. The facility is within the unincorporated area of Multnomah County. The county provides zoning and planning reviews and contracts with the City of Portland for building code review and permitting. Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue provide fire and rescue service. Unified Sewage Agency provides services to developments in the area, however, the building is on a septic system and is more than 600 feet away from the closest sanitary sewer system. Continued use of the existing septic system will be allowed providing that the existing tank is tested. Tualatin Valley Water District provides water supply. Beaverton School District owns the building and Washington County Education Service District will operate the building.

Staff: The applicant has submitted in the following service provider forms which demonstrates that the school can be served by the public services existing or programmed for the area: Police Service, Fire Service, On-site Sewage Disposal, School Review, Certification of Water Service.

(5) Will be located outside a big game winter habitat area as defined by the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife or that agency has certified that the impacts will be acceptable;

Applicant: The Oregon Department of Fish and Wild Life has not designated this site as a big game winter habitat. Site is located at 10351 NW Thompson Rd. Portland, Oregon.

Staff: Staff concurs.

(6) Will not create hazardous conditions;

Applicant: The school building and site will not create any hazardous conditions, and will satisfy the comprehensive plan. It has been several years since the facility functioned as a school, and it is understood that complying with current Fire and Life Safety codes is necessary prior to use.

The school district acknowledges that a half street improvement may be required, or fee in lieu of maybe accepted. The building is located in a designated SLOPE HAZARD area. HDP Form 1 has been completed by Foster Geotechnical, P.C., which finds that this site is suitable for the proposed use. The only on site grading anticipated is for additional parking.

Staff: The movement of the bus loading and unloading areas to the back of the property will reduce hazardous conditions by creating an area large enough to accommodate the influx of buses during the drop-off and pick-up times. Condition #6, through the design review process, requires a on-site parking and circulation plan which will allow staff to thoroughly review vehicular/pedestrian conflicts in the parking area. In addition, the County Engineer will be reviewing all driveway access points for proper site distances along Thompson Road. Through this process, the driveways may need to be relocated to allow for proper site distances for vehicles leaving the site.

(7) Will satisfy the applicable policies of the Comprehensive Plan; and

Staff: The applicant has addressed the applicable Comprehensive Plan Policies in Section II below.

(8) Will satisfy such other applicable Approval Criteria, as are stated in this Section.

MCC 11.15.7025 Restrictions.

A building or use approved under MCC .7020 through .7030 shall meet the following requirements:

(A) Minimum yards in the ...RR...district:

- (1) Front yards shall be 30 feet.
- (2) Side yard for one-story buildings shall be 20 feet; for two-story buildings, 25 feet.
- (3) Rear yards shall be as required in the district (RR zoning district: 30 feet).

Staff: The school building currently meets the minimum yard requirements for the Rural Residential zoning district. The front setback is currently 48 ft, north side setback is 63 ft, the south side setback is 68 ft and the rear setback is well over 200 ft.

(E) Off-street parking and loading shall be provided as required in MCC .6100 through .6148.

Staff: The applicant is proposing approximately 45 parking spaces, many of which are currently existing. There is additional room available to add parking if it is determined to be necessary through the design review process.

(F) Signs for Community Service Uses located in districts in MCC .2002 - .2966 pursuant to the provisions of MCC .7902 - .7982.

Staff: The applicant is not proposing any signage at this time. Through the design review process, any signage desired will need to comply with the provisions of MCC .7902 - .7982.

(G) Other restrictions or limitations of use or development not required under this subsection shall be provided in the district.

II. Applicable Comprehensive Plan Policies.

POLICY #8, RURAL RESIDENTIAL LAND:

THE COUNTY'S POLICY IS TO DESIGNATE CERTAIN LIMITED AREAS FOR RURAL RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT. SUCH AREAS ARE ESTABLISHED BASED UPON THE FOLLOWING:

- A. SIGNIFICANT PARCELIZATION WHERE AN AVERAGE OF FIVE (5) ACRES OR LESS HAS ALREADY OCCURRED, THE MAJORITY OF WHICH ARE SEPARATELY OWNED AND DEVELOPED;
- B. THE AREA IS NOT A COHESIVE COMMERCIAL FARM OR FOREST RESOURCE AREA;
- C. THE DESIGNATED AREA IS COMPATIBLE WITH ANY ADJACENT FARM OR FOREST RESOURCE AREA;
- D. THE LAND RESOURCE IS PREDOMINANTLY FOREST OR FOREST AGRICULTURAL IN NATURE (DISCOUNTING THE RESIDENCES), RATHER THAN AGRICULTURAL IN CHARACTER;
- E. THERE ARE NO PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT LIMITATIONS WHICH WOULD CAUSE THE AREAS TO BE HAZARDOUS FOR DEVELOPMENT; AND
- F. LIMITED, BUT ADEQUATE SERVICES MUST BE AVAILABLE FOR THESE AREAS, INCLUDING THOSE PROVIDED ON-SITE (WATER AND SUBSURFACE SEWAGE DISPOSAL) AS WELL AS OFF-SITE (SCHOOL, FIRE, POLICE).

Applicant: The area is designated rural residential, the size of the existing lot is 3.83 acres which is consistent with parcelization of 5 acres or less sized lots in the area. There is no cohesive commercial farming or forest resources in the area. The use of the building as a school is a use which would be normally found in and service residential developments. Adequate services such as fire, police, water are available. Sewage disposal is handled by a septic system. See the HDP form 1 which addresses any potential slope hazards. The property is generally flat with slopes at the perimeter. Any grading for parking will be designed by a civil engineer.

POLICY #13, AIR, WATER AND NOISE QUALITY:

MULTNOMAH COUNTY, RECOGNIZING THAT THE HEALTH, SAFETY, WELFARE, AND QUALITY OF LIFE OF ITS CITIZENS MAY BE ADVERSELY AFFECTED BY AIR, WATER AND NOISE POLLUTION, SUPPORTS EFFORTS TO IMPROVE AIR AND WATER QUALITY AND TO REDUCE NOISE LEVELS. THEREFORE, IT IS MULTNOMAH COUNTY'S POLICY TO:

- A. COOPERATE WITH PRIVATE CITIZENS, BUSINESSES, UTILITIES AND PUBLIC AGENCIES TO MAINTAIN AND IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF AIR AND WATER, AND TO REDUCE NOISE POLLUTION IN MULTNOMAH COUNTY.
- B. SUPPORT AND PARTICIPATE IN THE IMPLEMENTATION OF STATE AND REGIONAL PLANS AND PROGRAMS TO REDUCE POLLUTION LEVELS.
- C. MAINTAIN HEALTHFUL AIR QUALITY LEVELS IN THE REGIONAL AIRSHED; TO MAINTAIN HEALTHFUL GROUND AND SURFACE WATER RESOURCES; AND TO

PREVENT OR REDUCE EXCESSIVE SOUND LEVELS WHILE BALANCING SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC NEEDS IN MULTNOMAH COUNTY.

- D. DISCOURAGE THE DEVELOPMENT OF NOISE SENSITIVE USES IN AREAS OF HIGH NOISE IMPACT.

FURTHERMORE, IT IS THE COUNTY'S POLICY TO REQUIRE, PRIOR TO APPROVAL OF A LEGISLATIVE OR QUASI-JUDICIAL ACTION, A STATEMENT FROM THE APPROPRIATE AGENCY THAT ALL STANDARDS CAN BE MET WITH RESPECT TO AIR QUALITY, WATER QUALITY, AND NOISE LEVELS. IF THE PROPOSAL IS A NOISE SENSITIVE USE AND IS LOCATED IN A NOISE IMPACTED AREA, OR IF THE PROPOSED USE IS A NOISE GENERATOR, THE FOLLOWING SHALL BE INCORPORATED INTO THE SITE PLAN:

1. BUILDING PLACEMENT ON THE SITE IN AN AREA HAVING MINIMAL NOISE LEVEL DISRUPTIONS.
2. LANDSCAPING OR OTHER TECHNIQUES TO LESSEN NOISE GENERATION TO LEVELS COMPATIBLE WITH SURROUNDING LAND USES.
3. INSULATION OR OTHER CONSTRUCTION TECHNIQUES TO LOWER INTERIOR NOISE LEVELS IN NOISE IMPACTED AREAS.

Applicant: The existing building is located on a 3.83 acre site providing open space adjacent to rural residential lots. Average number of people on site will be approximately be forty (40 to 70), and should not impact noise levels in the area. All students will be bussed to the school in small mini-size busses. The facade that faces the street is glazed with glass block which while letting daylighting in will help prevent noise from the truck traffic from penetrating the exterior walls. In addition an existing landscaping buffer exists between the building and N.W. Thompson Road.

Water quality will be maintained through retaining run off from parking and building roofs in retention barriers (swales, ponds) as required from the Tualatin Basin district. Air quality will be maintained since the small number of students and staff (40 to 70) will provide a minimal impact on Thompson Road. All students will be bused to and from the site by small mini buses. The bus drop off area is on the play field side of the school away from the street and residences. Carpooling is encouraged for use by parents and staff.

POLICY #14, DEVELOPMENTAL LIMITATIONS:

THE COUNTY'S POLICY IS TO DIRECT DEVELOPMENT AND LAND FORM ALTERATIONS AWAY FROM AREAS WITH DEVELOPMENT LIMITATIONS EXCEPT UPON A SHOWING THAT DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION TECHNIQUES CAN MITIGATE ANY PUBLIC HARM OR ASSOCIATED PUBLIC COST, AND MITIGATE ANY ADVERSE EFFECTS TO SURROUNDING PERSONS OR PROPERTIES. DEVELOPMENT LIMITATIONS AREAS ARE THOSE WHICH HAVE ANY OF THE FOLLOWING CHARACTERISTICS:

- A. SLOPES EXCEEDING 20%;
- B. SEVERE SOIL EROSION POTENTIAL;
- C. LAND WITHIN THE 100 YEAR FLOOD PLAIN;
- D. A HIGH SEASONAL WATER TABLE WITHIN 0-24 INCHES OF THE SURFACE FOR 3 OR MORE WEEKS OF THE YEAR;

- E. A FRAGIPAN LESS THAN 30 INCHES FROM THE SURFACE;
- F. LAND SUBJECT TO SLUMPING, EARTH SLIDES OR MOVEMENT.

Applicant: The average slope of the property as determined by Foster Geotechnical is 5%. The School facilities are built away from the Steep (50%) slopes which are at the entire N-E Corner of the Parcel. There is limited potential for soil erosion due to the existence of facilities already at this location. Though the site is located in a "Slope Hazard" area, an engineer with Foster Geotechnical has certified in the HDP form 1 that this site is acceptable for a school use.

The building proposed for the school exists. The only proposed alterations on site are a 300 square foot office which will be built within the existing building foot print, and additional parking. A HDP Form 1 has been completed and development of new parking spaces will consider potential slope hazards to the north. No trees are planned to be removed.

POLICY #19, COMMUNITY DESIGN:

THE COUNTY'S POLICY IS TO MAINTAIN A COMMUNITY DESIGN PROCESS WHICH:

- A. EVALUATES AND LOCATES DEVELOPMENT PROPOSALS IN TERMS OF SCALE AND RELATED COMMUNITY IMPACTS WITH THE OVERALL PURPOSE BEING A COMPLEMENTARY LAND USE PATTERN.
- B. EVALUATES INDIVIDUAL PUBLIC AND PRIVATE DEVELOPMENTS FROM A FUNCTIONAL DESIGN PERSPECTIVE, CONSIDERING SUCH FACTORS AS PRIVACY, NOISE, LIGHTS, SIGNING, ACCESS, CIRCULATION, PARKING, PROVISIONS FOR THE HANDICAPPED AND CRIME PREVENTION TECHNIQUES.
- C. MAINTAINS A DESIGN REVIEW PROCESS AS AN ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURE WITH AN APPEAL PROCESS, AND BASED ON PUBLISHED CRITERIA AND GUIDELINES. CRITERIA AND GUIDELINES SHALL BE DEVELOPED SPECIFICALLY FOR COMMERCIAL, INDUSTRIAL AND RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENTS.
- D. ESTABLISHES CRITERIA AND STANDARDS FOR PRE-EXISTING USES, COMMENSURATE WITH THE SCALE OF THE NEW DEVELOPMENT PROPOSED.
- E. EVALUATES INDIVIDUAL PUBLIC AND PRIVATE DEVELOPMENT ACCORDING TO DESIGN GUIDELINES IN THE APPLICABLE ADOPTED COMMUNITY PLAN.

Applicant: The Bonny Slope facility will be enlarged approximately 300 square feet and will maintain the buildings scale to the surrounding community. This addition will be processed through the county's Design Review Procedure. Upgrading of the path of travel from parking area to and through the building will meet current ADA guidelines as required by the State of Oregon Structural Specialty Code and the current Uniform Building Code. Safety is major concern of the school districts. All current Fire Life Safety requirements will be met. Exterior lighting will be reviewed from a crime and safety aspect and all county requirements will be met. Access to the site, and circulation on the site is proposed to be redesigned for safety, convenience, and compliance with county regulations.

POLICY #20, ARRANGEMENT OF LAND USES:

THE COUNTY'S POLICY IS TO SUPPORT HIGHER DENSITIES AND MIXED LAND USES WITHIN THE FRAMEWORK OF SCALE, LOCATION AND DESIGN STANDARDS WHICH:

- A. ASSURE A COMPLIMENTARY BLEND OF USES;
- B. REINFORCE COMMUNITY IDENTITY;
- C. CREATE A SENSE OF PRIDE AND BELONGING; AND
- D. MAINTAIN OR CREATE NEIGHBORHOOD LONG TERM STABILITY.

Applicant: Mixing compatible land uses with this locale will help strengthen the long term stability of the neighborhood. As the area develops and densities increase, the school site with its open space will not change. The 3.83 acre site size is more compatible with the existing rural residential area and could help mitigate the higher density housing being developed to the west. This regional school will not only be a landmark for the neighborhood, as it is now, it will serve as a connection between the neighborhood and the residence of the regional service district since students come to this location from all over the service district.

POLICY #22, ENERGY CONSERVATION:

THE COUNTY'S POLICY IS TO PROMOTE THE CONSERVATION OF ENERGY AND TO USE ENERGY RESOURCES IN A MORE EFFICIENT MANNER. ... THE COUNTY SHALL REQUIRE A FINDING PRIOR TO APPROVAL OF A LEGISLATIVE OR QUASI-JUDICIAL ACTION THAT THE FOLLOWING FACTORS HAVE BEEN CONSIDERED:

- A. THE DEVELOPMENT OF ENERGY-EFFICIENT LAND USES AND PRACTICES;
- B. INCREASED DENSITY AND INTENSITY OF DEVELOPMENT IN URBAN AREAS, ESPECIALLY IN PROXIMITY TO TRANSIT CORRIDORS AND EMPLOYMENT, COMMERCIAL AND RECREATION CENTERS;
- C. AN ENERGY-EFFICIENT TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM LINKED WITH INCREASED MASS TRANSIT, PEDESTRIAN AND BICYCLE FACILITIES;
- D. STREET LAYOUTS, LOTTING PATTERNS AND DESIGNS THAT UTILIZE NATURAL ENVIRONMENTAL AND CLIMACTIC CONDITIONS TO ADVANTAGE.
- E. FINALLY, THE COUNTY WILL ALLOW GREATER FLEXIBILITY IN THE DEVELOPMENT AND USE OF RENEWABLE ENERGY RESOURCES.

Applicant: All students will be bused to and from their home school district. Tri-Met does not have bus routes with in a ¼ mile of the site. However, carpooling by parents, and staff is encouraged by the school districts. The restoration and upgrading of the existing school building makes sense from an energy aspect. The building in its present state requires less building materials and energy to remodel new teaching stations since the building is currently configured as a school.

POLICY #23, REDEVELOPMENT:

IT IS THE COUNTY'S POLICY TO :

- A. ENCOURAGE AND SUPPORT REDEVELOPMENT IN ORDER TO CREATE, MAINTAIN OR ENHANCE COMMUNITY DESIGN STABILITY AND EFFICIENCY,
- B. SEEK PUBLIC AND PRIVATE RESOURCES FOR REDEVELOPMENT AND REVITALIZATION OF COMMERCIAL, INDUSTRIAL, AND RESIDENTIAL AREAS AND STRUCTURES,
- C. HELP INITIATE AND ACTIVELY SUPPORT PUBLIC AND PRIVATE COMMUNITY BASED ECONOMIC REVITALIZATION AND REDEVELOPMENT EFFORTS,

- D. IMPLEMENT THE COUNTY'S COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM CONTINGENT ON CONTINUOUS FUNDING AND IN ACCORD WITH STATE GOALS AND REGULATIONS, AND LOCAL PROGRAM GOALS TO...
- E. PROVIDE ONGOING PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT OPPORTUNITIES IN PLANNING, IMPLEMENTATION AND EVALUATION OF ALL REDEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES.

Applicant: Public funds will be used to renovate this building to current standards for building code requirements and for educational uses. During the design process committees consisting of school district employees, teachers, parents, neighbors, and design professionals can hold regular meetings to discuss the progress of the design. The proposed changes to the building are minimal and formal meetings with the entire group may not be needed. All community members are welcome to review the progress plans and to give input. Plans can be viewed at the school district office, or possibly news letters could be sent to the neighbors.

POLICY #31, COMMUNITY FACILITIES AND USES:

THE COUNTY'S POLICY IS TO:

- A. SUPPORT THE SITING AND DEVELOPMENT OF A FULL RANGE OF COMMUNITY FACILITIES AND SERVICES BY SUPPORTING THE LOCATION AND SCALING OF COMMUNITY FACILITIES AND USES MEETING THE NEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY AND REINFORCING COMMUNITY IDENTITY.
- B. ENCOURAGE COMMUNITY FACILITIES SITING AND EXPANSION AT LOCATIONS REINFORCING ORDERLY AND TIMELY DEVELOPMENT AND EFFICIENT PROVISION OF ALL PUBLIC SERVICES AND FACILITIES.
- C. ENCOURAGE LAND USE DEVELOPMENT WHICH SUPPORT THE EFFICIENT USE OF EXISTING AND PLANNED COMMUNITY FACILITIES.
- D. SUPPORT THE DEVELOPMENT OF A UNIFIED APPROACH TO LONG RANGE COMMUNITY FACILITIES PLANNING AND CAPITAL INVESTMENT PROGRAMMING IN MULTNOMAH COUNTY.
- E. CLASSIFY COMMUNITY FACILITIES ACCORDING TO THEIR FUNCTION AND SCALE OF OPERATIONS.

The proposed middle school is considered to be a Minor Community Scale Facility. The high school portion of the project is considered a Major Community Scale Facility per Policy #31.

- F. LOCATE COMMUNITY FACILITIES ON SITES WITH AVERAGE SITE GRADES CONSISTENT WITH A PROJECT'S SCALE AND IMPACTS. SITE SLOPE REQUIREMENTS BY SCALE ARE:

- I. SUPPORT COMMUNITY FACILITIES SITING AND DEVELOPMENT AT SITES OF A SIZE WHICH CAN ACCOMMODATE THE PRESENT AND FUTURE USES AND IS OF A SHAPE WHICH ALLOWS FOR A SITE LAYOUT IN A MANNER WHICH MAXIMIZES USER CONVENIENCE, ENERGY CONSERVATION, AND PEDESTRIAN AND BICYCLE ACCESS TO AND WITHIN THE SITE.
- J. PROMOTE COMPATIBLE DEVELOPMENT AND MINIMIZE ADVERSE IMPACTS OF SITE DEVELOPMENT ON ADJACENT PROPERTIES AND THE COMMUNITY THROUGH THE APPLICATION OF DESIGN REVIEW STANDARDS CODIFIED IN MCC 11.15.7805 - 11.15.7865.
- K. PROVIDE FOR THE SITING AND EXPANSION OF COMMUNITY FACILITIES IN A MANNER WHICH ACCORDS WITH THE OTHER APPLICABLE POLICIES OF THIS PLAN.

Applicant: Bonny slope school will be a small alternative middle/high school (30 to 60 students total). This facility type is designated as "Minor Community" for the middle school aged students

and "Major Community for the High school aged students. Traffic impact will be low to the area. The site is located with direct access to Thompson Road which is a rural collector road. Thompson Road does not cut through any local neighborhood streets. A few students proposed for this school are of driving age; and the staffing requirements for this facility are no more than ten. All students will be delivered to the school by small shuttle buses (including students of driving age). Buses will arrive in the morning and late afternoon. Since this school is a regional school, and students are to be transported by school bus (a mass transit system), we feel public transit is not practical, or would not be used by the staff, students or parents. Carpooling is encouraged for parents and staff. In addition, Tri-Met's closest bus stop at present time is more than 5 miles away.

The site is generally flat and does not have an average slope greater than 10%. A HDP form -1 completed by Foster Geotechnical finds the parcel suitable for the use.

Staff: The location policy standard requiring that there be public transit within ¼ mile of the site cannot be met. However, the introduction to the "Land Use Location Policies" section of the Comprehensive Framework Plan states "It is intended that these locational criteria be construed in a flexible manner, in the interest of accommodating proposals which, though not strictly in conformance with the applicable criteria, are found to be in the public interest and capable of harmonious integration into the community." This allows for some flexibility in the evaluation of the transit requirement criteria of Policy 31. The use of mini buses to transport the students to and from the school means that public transit is not necessary in the transportation needs of the facility. The transportation needs of the students are strictly defined. Condition #3 requires that all students attending this school be transported in a district bus. Students will not be allowed to drive to the site and alternative sources of transportation are not needed to reduce impacts to the surrounding community by the vehicle trips generated by this facility.

POLICY #34, TRAFFICWAYS:

THE COUNTY'S POLICY IS TO DEVELOP A SAFE AND EFFICIENT TRAFFICWAY SYSTEM USING THE EXISTING ROAD NETWORK, AND BY:

- B. IMPROVING STREETS TO THE STANDARDS ESTABLISHED BY THE CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM, WHERE NECESSARY, AND/OR APPROPRIATE TO MITIGATE TRANSPORTATION PROBLEMS;**
- C. PLACING PRIORITY ON MAINTAINING THE EXISTING TRAFFICWAYS;**
- D. DEVELOPING ADDITIONAL TRANSPORTATION FACILITIES TO MEET COMMUNITY AND REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION NEEDS WHERE CAPACITY OF THE EXISTING SYSTEM HAS BEEN MAXIMIZED THROUGH TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM MANAGEMENT AND DEMAND MANAGEMENT MEASURES;**
- E. PROVIDING A SAFE AND CONVENIENT PEDESTRIAN ENVIRONMENT WITH ROAD CROSSINGS AND SIDEWALK NETWORK DESIGNED FOR PEDESTRIAN TRAVEL;**
- F. LIMITING THE NUMBER OF AND CONSOLIDATING INGRESS AND EGRESS POINTS ON ARTERIALS AND MAJOR COLLECTORS TO PRESERVE TRAFFIC FLOW;**
- G. REDUCING RELIANCE ON THE AUTOMOBILE AND ASSURING THAT THE PLANNED TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM SUPPORTS PATTERNS OF TRAVEL AND LAND USE WHICH WILL AVOID OR MITIGATE PROBLEMS OF AIR POLLUTION, TRAFFIC CONGESTION AND COMMUNITY LIVEABILITY;**

- H. ENCOURAGING RIDE-SHARE AND FLEXTIME PROGRAMS TO HELP MEET THE PROJECTED INCREASE IN TRAVEL DEMAND. THE COUNTY WILL WORK WITH THE METROPOLITAN SERVICE DISTRICT AND TRI-MET TO DEVELOP RIDE-SHARE PROGRAMS, FLEXTIME AND OTHER TRANSPORTATION DEMAND STRATEGIES TO ACHIEVE THE RIDE SHARE GOAL GIVEN IN THE REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLAN; AND
- I. IMPLEMENTING THE STREET STANDARDS CHAPTER 11.60 STREET STANDARDS CODES AND RULES, INCLUDING ADHERENCE TO ACCESS CONTROL AND INTERSECTION DESIGN GUIDELINE CRITERIA, AND ESTABLISHING A PROCEDURE FOR ALLOWING VARIANCES FROM THAT ORDINANCE.

EXCLUDING THAT PORTION OF MULTNOMAH COUNTY INCLUDED IN THE COLUMBIA RIVER GORGE NATIONAL SCENIC AREA, THIS POLICY AND THE FUNCTIONAL CLASSIFICATION OF TRAFFICWAYS MAP ACCOMPANYING THIS POLICY SHALL CONTROL OVER CONFLICTING PROVISIONS OF COMMUNITY PLANS OR OTHER PRE-EXISTING PLANS IN DETERMINING THE FUNCTIONAL CLASSIFICATION OF TRAFFICWAYS. TRAFFICWAYS LOCATED WITHIN THE COLUMBIA RIVER GORGE NATIONAL SCENIC AREA ARE SUBJECT TO AND SUPERSEDED BY PROVISIONS OF THE COLUMBIA RIVER GORGE NATIONAL SCENIC AREA MANAGEMENT PLAN.

Applicant: The site is located on Thompson Road which is a rural collector road. The school districts recognizes that a half street improvement may be required. A new school entrance is proposed at the intersection of McDaniel and Thompson Roads to improve site lines when entering and exiting the site. This is the correct road classification for minor and major community facilities.

POLICY #36, TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM DEVELOPMENT REQUIREMENTS:

THE COUNTY'S POLICY IS TO INCREASE THE EFFICIENCY AND AESTHETIC QUALITY OF THE TRAFFICWAYS AND PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION BY REQUIRING:

- A. THE DEDICATION OF ADDITIONAL RIGHT-OF-WAY APPROPRIATE TO THE FUNCTIONAL CLASSIFICATION OF THE STREET GIVEN IN POLICY 34 AND CHAPTER 11.60.
- B. THE NUMBER OF INGRESS AND EGRESS POINTS BE CONSOLIDATED THROUGH JOINT USE AGREEMENTS;
- C. VEHICULAR AND TRUCK OFF-STREET PARKING AND LOADING AREAS,
- D. OFF-STREET BUS LOADING AREAS AND SHELTERS FOR RIDERS;
- E. STREET TREES BE PLANTED;
- F. A PEDESTRIAN CIRCULATION SYSTEM AS GIVEN IN THE SIDEWALK PROVISION, CHAPTER 11.60.
- G. IMPLEMENTATION OF THE BICYCLE CORRIDOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROGRAM;
- H. BICYCLE PARKING FACILITIES AT BICYCLE AND PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION SECTIONS IN NEW COMMERCIAL, INDUSTRIAL AND BUSINESS DEVELOPMENTS; AND
- I. NEW STREET IMPROVED TO COUNTY STANDARDS IN UNINCORPORATED COUNTY MAY BE DESIGNATED PUBLIC ACCESS ROADS AND MAINTAINED BY THE COUNTY UNTIL ANNEXED INTO A CITY, AS STATED IN ORDINANCE 313.

Applicant: The site is located on Thompson Road which is a rural collector road. The School District recognizes that a half street improvement may be required. One egress point is proposed across from the intersection of Thompson road and McDaniel road. All off street parking area will be located to the south and to the west of the building. Existing parking off of Thompson Road will not be used. The bus loading area will be adjacent to the new entry on west side of building. Tri Met does not have a bus route near the school, however carpooling is encouraged.

Staff: The Traffic Engineering section of the Transportation Division has determined that the proposed driveway location across from McDaniel street needs additional review for site distance requirements prior to allowing the driveway at that location. In addition, improvements to Thompson Road may be required as an outcome of their review. Condition # 7 & 8 allows for the additional time and information necessary for the County Engineer to review and approve safe ingress and egress points and to obtain the need improvements to Thompson Road based upon the impacts this proposal will have on the public right-of-way.

POLICY # 37, UTILITIES:

THE COUNTY'S POLICY IS TO REQUIRE A FINDING PRIOR TO APPROVAL OF A LEGISLATIVE HEARING OR QUASI-JUDICIAL ACTION THAT:

WATER DISPOSAL SYSTEM:

- A. THE PROPOSED USE CAN BE CONNECTED TO A PUBLIC SEWER AND WATER SYSTEM, BOTH OF WHICH HAVE ADEQUATE CAPACITY; OR
- B. THE PROPOSED USE CAN BE CONNECTED TO A PUBLIC WATER SYSTEM, AND THE OREGON DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY (DEQ) WILL APPROVE A SUBSURFACE SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM ON THE SITE; OR
- C. THERE IS AN ADEQUATE PRIVATE WATER SYSTEM, AND THE OREGON DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY (DEQ) WILL APPROVE A SUBSURFACE SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM; OR
- D. THERE IS AN ADEQUATE PRIVATE WATER SYSTEM, AND A PUBLIC SEWER WITH ADEQUATE CAPACITY.

DRAINAGE:

- E. THERE IS ADEQUATE CAPACITY IN THE STORM WATER SYSTEM TO HANDLE THE INCREASED RUN-OFF; OR
- F. THE WATER RUN-OFF CAN BE HANDLED ON THE SITE OR ADEQUATE PROVISIONS CAN BE MADE; AND
- G. THE RUN-OFF FROM THE SITE WILL NOT ADVERSELY AFFECT THE WATER QUALITY IN ADJACENT STREAMS, PONDS, LAKES OR ALTER THE DRAINAGE ON ADJACENT LANDS.

ENERGY AND COMMUNICATIONS:

- H. THERE IS AN ADEQUATE ENERGY SUPPLY TO HANDLE LEVELS PROJECTED BY THE PLAN; AND
- I. COMMUNICATIONS FACILITIES ARE AVAILABLE.

FURTHERMORE, THE COUNTY'S POLICY IS TO CONTINUE COOPERATION WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY, FOR THE DEVELOPMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION OF A GROUNDWATER QUALITY PLAN TO MEET THE NEEDS OF THE COUNTY.

Applicant: The school site is currently connected to an on site septic system. The capacity is adequate to handle the proposed initial student body and staff. The septic tank has been inspected and is approved by the City of Portland for use. Water supply for the building exists and is adequate to handle the proposed student body and staff. See review form from the water district.

The water run off from the site will not adversely affect the water quality in the adjacent areas. The water run off can be handled on the site provided adequate retention provisions are made. There are no lakes ponds, or streams adjacent to the property. The existing drainage on or to adjoining property will remain unchanged.

The building will have adequate power and communication systems for a school. Both power and telephone exist on the property now.

Staff: The existing on-site septic system has been approved for up to 30 students and 10 teachers/school staff. If the school is to expand to 60 students, the septic system will need to be upgraded. A condition of approval is proposed to contain the run-off of the parking area and building roofs into a french drain system or approved drainage swale on the property. A condition of approval also recognizes the need for review of the septic system upgrade by the permitting agency that the County contracts with for this service.

POLICY # 38, FACILITIES:

THE COUNTY'S POLICY IS TO REQUIRE A FINDING PRIOR TO APPROVAL OF A LEGISLATIVE OR QUASI-JUDICIAL ACTION THAT:

- A. THE APPROPRIATE SCHOOL DISTRICT HAS HAD AN OPPORTUNITY TO REVIEW AND COMMENT ON THE PROPOSAL.
- B. THERE IS ADEQUATE WATER PRESSURE AND FLOW FOR FIRE FIGHTING PURPOSES; AND
- C. THE APPROPRIATE FIRE DISTRICT HAS HAD AN OPPORTUNITY TO REVIEW AND COMMENT ON THE PROPOSAL.
- D. THE PROPOSAL CAN RECEIVE ADEQUATE LOCAL POLICE PROTECTION WITH THE STANDARDS OF THE JURISDICTION PROVIDING POLICE PROTECTION.

Applicant: Police and agencies have reviewed the proposal. Police protection is adequate in the area. The Fire District has the man power and equipment in the area that can respond to any emergency incident and implement what ever action needs to be taken. The School Districts believe this facility is needed in this region. The students will be drawn from school districts in Washington County. The students that are selected to attend Bonny Slope are students that have been identified by their home school district as being "At Risk", meaning that during there school years they have a potential for dropping out of school before they reach graduation of high school. The districts feel exposing these children to more guidance by

allowing the teacher to spend more one on one time with each student will help build self esteem, confidence, and increase learning skills. It must be noted that these students are not children who have been "trouble makers", but are students who need more attention and guidance in a school setting.

POLICY # 40, DEVELOPMENT REQUIREMENTS:

THE COUNTY'S POLICY IS TO ENCOURAGE A CONNECTED PARK AND RECREATION SYSTEM AND TO PROVIDE FOR SMALL PRIVATE RECREATION AREAS BY REQUIRING A FINDING PRIOR TO APPROVAL OF LEGISLATIVE OR QUASI-JUDICIAL ACTION THAT:

- A. PEDESTRIAN AND BICYCLE PATH CONNECTIONS TO PARKS, RECREATION AREAS AND COMMUNITY FACILITIES WILL BE DEDICATED WHERE APPROPRIATE AND WHERE DESIGNATED IN THE BICYCLE CORRIDOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROGRAM AND MAP.
- B. LANDSCAPED AREAS WITH BENCHES WILL BE PROVIDED IN COMMERCIAL, INDUSTRIAL AND MULTIPLE FAMILY DEVELOPMENTS, WHERE APPROPRIATE.
- C. AREAS FOR BICYCLE PARKING FACILITIES WILL BE REQUIRED IN DEVELOPMENT PROPOSALS, WHERE APPROPRIATE.

Applicant: Appropriate landscaping will be maintained on site. Outdoor seating will be provided as required. Bicycle parking may not be necessary, since all students will be bussed.

Staff: There are no bicycle paths planned along Thompson Road in the Bonny Slope area. The reconversion and then maintenance of this property as a school would create an area of open space which may, with the approval of the school district, be utilized for recreation.

CONCLUSIONS:

- 1. The proposed alternative middle and high school requires application and approval for a community service use, which is a type of conditional use in the Rural Residential district [MCC 11.15.2212(A)]. Specific criteria are listed in MCC 11.15.7005 through .7041 for review and approval of a community service use.
- 2. The proposed alternative middle and high school at the Bonny Slope facilities as conditioned by staff meets the criteria for a community service use listed in MCC 11.15.7001 through .7041 and is in compliance with the applicable Comprehensive Plan Policies.
- 3. Conditions of Approval are necessary in order to ensure that the proposed use does not increase or alter the use or intensity which may impact surrounding properties.

This Staff Report and recommendation was available on December 11, 1996, seven days before the December 18, 1996 public hearing scheduled before a County Hearings Officer. The Hearings Officer may announce a decision on this application (1) at the

close of the hearing; (2) upon continuance of a date and time certain; or (3) after the close of the record following the hearing.

A written decision is usually mailed to all parties and filed with the Clerk of the Board within ten days of the decision by the Hearings Officer.

Appeal to the Board of County Commissioners:

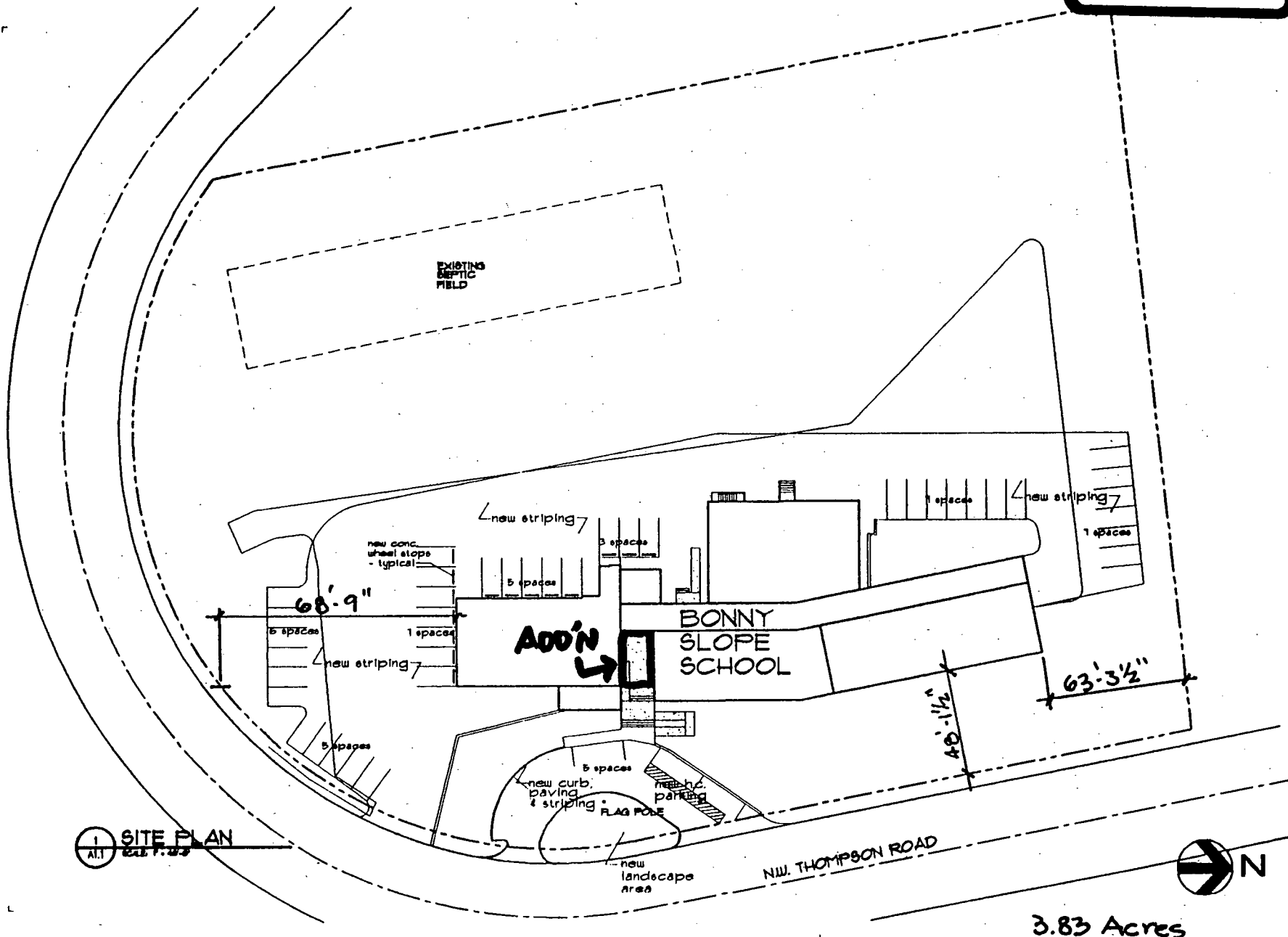

The Central Citizen Budget Advisory Committee presents its Report for your review as directed by Resolution 88-86 adopted May 26, 1988.

This year's Report was prepared by interested citizens and volunteers from Multnomah County Citizen Budget Advisory Committees and the Central Citizen Budget Advisory Committee. Creating a more diverse group, a broader approach was designed to provide a wider participation. The Dedicated Fund Review Sub-Committee, chaired by Mr. Bob Boyer, prepared an interview schedule and questions in advance. This minimized Department staff time commitment and predetermined what information would be needed as each fund representative met with the Committee. This approach worked well and minimized the time commitment of all.

The Dedicated Fund Review Sub-Committee clearly feels there are fine programs that the County should take pride in. It also feels the County should take steps to ensure that these successful programs are publicized as demonstrations of how County dollars are used effectively. The Central Citizen Budget Advisory Committee fully supports these findings. As was requested in the last review of these funds, emphasis should continue to be placed on preventative programs related to justice services and alternative programs in the jails and community corrections.

A significant enhancement to program assessment will come from the compilation of success rate information for drug/alcohol treatment programs. It is the Committee's

hope the recent increases in MIS Administration and Field Services staffing will resolve the long-standing need for more assessment information.

In order to stretch available funding for these programs, the Central Citizen Budget Advisory Committee strongly recommends that not only the Department of Community Corrections, the Sheriff's Office, and the District Attorney's Office, but also County Departments as a whole look into linking up with Portland State's Capstone Program. Undergraduates and a supervising professor would be available to tackle problems and offer recommendations and technical assistance in exchange for the opportunity to fulfill graduation requirements.

Finally, the Committee continues to desire direct feedback on their comments and the recommendations contained in the Report. Feedback and reactions from either the Board or Department level greatly assist the Committee in providing more effective fund reports. Your efforts to help complete this communication loop are greatly appreciated.

Dedicated Fund Review 1996

The Central Citizen Budget Advisory Committee has reviewed the dedicated funds of the Multnomah County Department of Justice Services, Sheriff, and District Attorney as directed by resolution 88-86 adopted May 26, 1988.

The resolution provides that these funds be reviewed by the Central Citizen Budget Advisory Committee (CBAC) every four years to determine if the purpose for which the fund is dedicated is being met, whether the level of funds is reasonable for the purpose, and whether the need for the fund has increased or decreased.

The Central CBAC has reviewed the following funds for 1996:

- Jail Levy Fund 169 (Separate reviews of the Department of Community Corrections and Sheriff's Office portions of this fund were conducted)
- Inmate Welfare Fund 168
- Justice Services Special Operations Fund 180
 - Criminal Fees 6150
 - Alarm Permit Fees 4124
 - Concealed Handgun Permit Fees 3150
 - Marriage License and Conciliation Fees 3021 & 4850
 - Forfeiture Fund 6150 (Separate reviews of the Department of Community Corrections and District Attorney's Office portions of this fund were conducted)
- Emergency Communication Fund 151
- Public Safety Sinking Fund 228
- Justice Bond Project Fund 230

Methodology

The fund review was assigned to the Dedicated Fund Review Sub-Committee (DFR) made up of volunteers from Multnomah County Citizen Budget Advisory Committees (CBACs) and interested citizens. The DFR Sub-Committee met with Pete Vandyke, Jackie Jamison, Warren Cook, Brian Martinek, Mary Ann Inglesby, Bart Whalen, and Laura Harryman from the Sheriff's Office; Tom Simpson from the District Attorney's Office; Diane

Smith, Tichenor McBride, and Hugh McIsaac from the Department of Community Corrections to discuss financial and program information pertaining to each of the funds.

The findings and recommendations were reviewed and endorsed by the Central Citizen Budget Advisory Committee.

General findings:

The Central CBAC found the funds to be well managed. The funds are acceptable and no major changes are required currently. The Multnomah County personnel interviewed were both knowledgeable of the funds and able to explain details.

General recommendations:

Emphasis should continue to be placed on preventive criminal justice programs, as well as alternative programs in the areas of jails and community corrections.

For many of the funds reviewed, it appeared that a portion of the fund was intended to be spent on specific crime prevention programs such as drug and alcohol rehabilitation, continuing education, and job skill programs. We recommend that the portion of these funds earmarked for these programs continue to be tracked to assure that they are spent on the appropriate programs.

In order to stretch available funding for these programs, the Central CBAC strongly recommends that not only the Department of Community Corrections, the Sheriff's Office, and the District Attorney's Office, but also County Departments as a whole look into linking up with Portland State's Capstone Program. Undergraduates and a supervising professor would be available to tackle problems and offer recommendations and technical assistance in exchange for the opportunity to fulfill graduation requirements.

The Central CBAC recommends that more emphasis be placed on publicizing the success and value of programs within the justice system.

Specific recommendations:

Jail Levy Fund 169 (Department of Community Corrections)

Jail Serial Levy was established by the voters in 1989, 1993 and 1996 for the operation of the Inverness Jail and for alcohol and drug treatment beds.

The portion of the levy, approximately \$1.75 million, allocated to the Department of Community Corrections for drug and alcohol treatment programs is used to contract with the Volunteers of America for operation of residential treatment centers for men and women.

Findings:

The Central CBAC is very impressed with the program and considers it an important alternative to incarceration.

Recommendations:

1. The County should develop information on the success rate for this program and link that information to the need for continued funding of the program. The value and benefits of the program should be related to the cost of the program which is about half what beds in a correctional facility cost the County.
2. The Central CBAC looks forward to the results that may be provided from the 9.0 FTE MIS Administration and Field Services. This will enhance evaluation efforts on the heels of the elimination of the Program Development and Evaluation Unit.
3. A continuing, stable source of revenue for this program should be developed rather than depending on levy renewals.
4. The department should return to the prior arrangement of assigning two parole officers to the clients of this program. These officers would supervise the clients and follow their progress after release, as well as maintaining contact with the program staff.
5. Parenting classes are not only recommended for female clients but male clients as well.

Jail Levy Fund 169 (Sheriff's Office)

The Jail Serial Levy was established by the voters on November 7, 1989 and renewed in May of 1993 May of 1996 for the operation of the Inverness Jail and for alcohol and drug treatment programs.

Findings:

Approximately 16 million is allocated to the Sheriff's Office from the current Levy for the FY 96/97 operation of Inverness Jail.

Recommendations:

1. A continuing, stable source of revenue for this program should be developed rather than depending on levy renewals.
2. The Central CBAC looks forward to the results of the staffing level study which is due out by January of 1997. If necessary the staff should be increased to an appropriate level to eliminate overtime expenses and reduce associated risks to inmates, corrections personnel, and the public.
3. Video arraignments should continue to be used to the maximum extent possible in order to keep transportation costs down.
4. Staff should continue to develop programs that provide offenders with the education and skills to reintegrate back into the community successfully.

Inmate Welfare Fund 168

The Inmate Welfare Fund was established by the Board of County Commissioners by Ordinance on September 22, 1988, to account for the purchase and sale of commissary items to inmates of County correctional facilities.

Findings:

Items are sold at current retail market value. The profit provides for essential items for indigent inmates and for recreational and educational items for the inmate population. An Inmate Welfare Committee made up of various corrections personnel oversees purchases. The addition of pay phones has increased the revenue in the fund. This fund will continue to increase as more and more offenders are added to the system.

Recommendations:

1. Inmate input should continue to be sought in the selection of commissary items and equipment purchased with these funds.
2. Staff should look for ways to publicize the positive outcomes of the various programs that Corrections runs for the offenders.
3. Profit from the fund should continue to be used for essential items for indigent offenders and for recreational and educational items for the inmate population such as the continued maintenance and periodic upgrades of the computer system.
4. The DRF Committee suggests that the use of "Welfare" in the name of this fund has a negative feeling. A name change to the Commissary Fund would add a more positive note.

Justice Services Special Operations Fund 180

This fund was established in the 1993-94 budget to account for revenues previously placed in the General Fund that are dedicated to Justice Services in the Community Corrections Department, the District Attorney's Office, and the Sheriff's Office.

Findings:

This fund accounts for probation fees, criminal processing assessment fees, conciliation court fees and marriage license fees for the Community Corrections Department. This fund accounts for revenues received from forfeitures and video lottery for the District Attorney's Office. This fund also accounts for the Sheriff's Office revenues received from forfeitures, alarm permits, concealed handgun permits, gun ordinance fees and liquor license fees collected for civil processing inspection.

This fund appears to be properly managed.

The Central CBAC chose several of the funds contained within the Justice Services Special Operations Fund 180 to review in detail.

Specific recommendations:

Criminal Fees 6150

Criminal fees assessed by the state courts are collected by the court system and transferred to the County. The County's intergovernmental agreement gives 15% to the General Fund of each jurisdiction.

Findings:

In Multnomah County these funds are used by the Department of Community Corrections for the (1) Women's Transitional Services program which provides drug and alcohol intervention and treatment and case management to pregnant, drug -addicted female offenders and their children, and (2) the Pre-Trial Release Supervision Program which provides intensive non-custody supervision for those individuals the Court feels cannot comply with recognizance release.

Recommendations:

1. Continue funding the Women's Transition Unit to enhance drug and alcohol intervention and treatment and case management programs.
2. Continue funding the Pre-Trial Release Program.

Alarm Control Fund 4124

The Alarm Control Fund is established by the Board of County Commissioners through ordinance. This fund comes from permit fees for home and business burglary alarm permits and from false alarm fines.

Findings:

The fund is used to operate the alarm permit office and the "profit" is allocated to the general funds of the seven participating jurisdictions. Policy is made by a consortium of the involved jurisdictions, while the program is administered by the Sheriff's Office.

Recommendations:

1. The County should pursue shifting the cost of the education component to the alarm companies in the private sector.

2. The County should educate the public on the success and value of the program, especially in the area of decreasing false alarms and saving police time and resources.
3. The Central CBAC supports a raise in fees for this program as requested by the Alarm Ordinance Task Force. The added revenue should be returned to the various jurisdictions to off-set the costs of police response to alarms.
4. The program should explore changes in the latest computer technology and examine possible enhancements to the current system as recommended in the 1992 review.

Concealed Handgun Permit Fees 3150

The Concealed Handgun Fund was established by the Board of County Commissioners in response to 1990-91 legislation regulating gun purchase and concealed weapons permits.

Findings:

This fund collects fees from persons wanting to purchase a handgun, take training, or have a concealed weapon permit. Fees are used to pay the cost of the program. Revenue is on a 4 year cycle that matches renewals. This cycle accounts for shortfalls matching the renewal cycle. There are 14,000 handgun permits in this County. There are no medical limitations on receiving a license.

Recommendations:

1. Accounting for the background investigation and the permit fee should be conducted separately so that the County can determine if the actual costs of each operation are covered by the fees as recommended in the 1992 Dedicated Fund Review. If it is determined that the fees do not cover costs then the fees should be increased.
2. The Central CBAC recommends that as a cost-saving measure there not be a uniformed officer working with this program unless mandated by Ordinance. A civilian could perform the supervisory function, freeing up a uniformed officer's time to perform other duties.
3. Because there are no medical limitations contained in the original handgun statute, safety concerns need to be addressed in the form of an

amendment. A change in the language should read "denial of license if it is physically impossible to operate a handgun safely".

4. In order to correct the need to dip into the General Fund every four years due to the renewal cycle, the Central CBAC recommends that renewals be on a 2 year cycle.
5. Tuition for the County Safety Class should be at the same rate as comparable classes in the private sector.

Marriage License Fees 3021

Conciliation Court Fees 4850

The Conciliation Fund, which provides for Family Services, receives funds from the marriage license and divorce filing fees to provide family counseling and recommendations to the court on child custody and support.

Findings:

This program is supervised by the presiding judge of the Court of Domestic Relations and is accounted for in the Department of Community Corrections. The staff are County employees.

Recommendations:

1. Continue parent education requirement and fees.
2. Increase publicity of Parent Education and related programs.

Forfeiture Fund 6150

These funds account for the revenue derived from the sale of goods seized under federal and state statutes that allow seizure of property that has been used for criminal purpose or was purchased with funds from criminal activity.

Findings:

According to Multnomah County Ordinance 633, half of the revenue is returned to the seizing agency, 35% goes to the District Attorney for prosecution costs, and 15% is distributed to the General Fund of the seizing jurisdiction.

Federal Law requires the revenue be used to enhance the seizing agency's budget, not for replacement. The state law allows expenditures for justice/law enforcement programs.

This fund has internal controls in place and is audited regularly.

Recommendations:

1. Continue the use of "Legal Claims Against Forfeiture" account of \$250,000 as carry-over account in the District Attorney's Office.
2. More funds need to be used for drug and alcohol treatment. There is a need to start looking to the private sector for additional monies.
3. The Central CBAC congratulates both the Sheriff's and District Attorney's Offices on their efforts and recommends that these efforts be continued and increased.

Emergency Communication Fund: Fund 151

This fund consists of telephone excise taxes collected by the State and distributed to the local jurisdictions. This revenue is based on the number of residents in the unincorporated areas of the County.

Findings:

The revenue is used, as required by state statute, to help pay for "911" calls, ambulance dispatch, and Sheriff patrol dispatch costs. The County contracts by "letter of understanding" with the City of Portland for this service.

Only 1/3 of the County's costs are covered by this fund. Continuing needs are met with large supplements from the General Fund.

Recommendations:

The Central CBAC recommends that the County should continue to contract with the City of Portland while examining the possibility of organizing a Chapter 190 program as stated in the 1992 review.

Public Safety Bond Sinking Fund 228

This fund accounts for the retirement of General Obligation Bonds approved in May 1996 to expand Inverness Jail, construct new jail facilities, upgrade

other jail facilities, and pay for major data processing linkages in the Corrections system. Proceeds are derived from property taxes. The fund was created in the 1996-97 Adopted Budget.

Findings:

This fund does appear in the FY 96/97 Adopted Budget. The Central CBAC did not review due to no activity in the fund.

Justice Bond Project Fund 230

This fund accounts for projects to expand Inverness Jail, construct new jail facilities, upgrade other jail facilities, and pay for major data processing linkages in the Corrections system. Proceeds are derived from the sale of General Obligation Bonds approved by voters May 21, 1996. The fund was created in the 1996-97 Adopted Budget.

Findings:

This fund does appear in the FY 96/97 Adopted Budget. The Central CBAC did not review due to no activity in the fund.

The State of Oregon Department of Corrections has allocated to Multnomah County \$3,167,422 for handling offenders receiving sentences of less than 12 months for felony crimes (SB1145) for the period January 1, 1997 through June 30, 1997.

A portion of this offender population will be housed in prison beds. The other portion will be supervised in the community.

Upon recommendation of the Local Public Safety Coordinating Council (LPSCC), the Department is requesting additional personnel, materials and expansion of existing sanction programs and services to provide community supervision. Total increase in costs to support the basic model of offender management is \$1,365,486. The State allocation is not sufficient to support the basic model of community supervision and housing of inmates. This modification will require General Fund supplement of \$379,732 to fully support the community supervision component. This modification will affect several program budgets within the Department (see attached expend detail). Personnel and sanction programs will be phased in over a 3 month period beginning February 1, 1997.

SUBJECT: *Budget Modification - DCC 7 & 8*

I. Recommendation/Action Requested

Request approval of budget modification to implement SB1145 Community Intervention Programs (non jail beds), and to pay for staff, materials and services necessary due to the transfer of offenders from the state system to the county system.

II. Background/Analysis

The programs and staff noted in this budget modification are necessary to manage SB1145 offenders once they have left jail and return to the community under the supervision of Adult Community Justice.

There are two sets of budget modifications attached.

Attachment A outlines the Basic Program Budget (bud mod DCC 7), which is the level of programming that the Local Public Safety Coordinating Council has requested we implement. We believe that the State will fully fund this program through SB1145 funds and, if necessary, possible emergency funding from the Governor's budget. Due to several uncertainties, there is a chance that the General Fund may need to supplement this funding for the remainder of this fiscal year.

Attachment B outlines a level of programming that we can afford using only the available State SB1145 funding (bud mod DCC 8). This level offers less services and a slower implementation rate.

Attachment C outlines the financial difference between the two models, as well as the annualized cost for BFY 97/98.

III. Financial Impact

Resources for this program will come from the State's SB1145 funding.

The total cost for the Basic Model (bud mod DCC 7) is \$1,365,486. We believe that the State will fully fund this program through SB1145 funds and possible emergency funding from the Governor's budget. Due to several uncertainties, there is a chance that the General Fund may need to supplement this funding for the remainder of this fiscal year.

The total cost for the Available Funding Model is \$985,723, and is fully funded by the State SB1145 funds (bud mod DCC 8).

The annualized cost for these programs will be \$3,668,187. It is anticipated that the pool of SB1145 funds will increase in 97/98, so the annualized cost is based upon the Basic Model.

IV. Legal Issues

None associated with this budget modification. Numerous legal issues around SB1145 have previously been discussed with the Board.

V. Controversial Issues

The current amount of State SB1145 funding is not enough to adequately fund the jail beds, programs and services we feel are needed to manage this population. We will continue discussions with the State in an effort to increase the amount of funding made available to Multnomah County.

VI. Link to County Policies

The principle behind SB1145 is that local jurisdictions are in a better position to identify and individualize programs and services for this population. The programs identified in this budget modification expand existing County programs.

VII. Citizen Participation

The SB1145 program plan has been presented to the Local Public Safety Coordinating Council. They recommend approving the Basic Model of program implementation..

VIII. Other Government Participation

The SB1145 program plan has been a joint effort between Adult Community Justice and the Sheriffs Office. In addition, the Local Public Safety Coordinating Council has members from other justice agencies in the area, and they have approved this plan.

SUBJECT: Budget Modification for SB 1145 Programs

I. **Recommendation/Action Requested**

Approval of a budget modification for the Department's SB 1145 programs is requested. *This budget modification exceeds the allocation made available by the Oregon DOC and may require a General Fund supplement.*

II. **Background/Analysis**

During the last several months, staff from this Department, the Sheriff's Office, and Budget and Planning worked to identify a level of service and capacity sufficient to meet the needs of the expected target population of offenders sentenced to 12 months or less. This level of service was approved by the Public Safety Coordinating Council and the Board. Programming includes a Field Supervision Unit, Forest Project slots, residential treatment (contracted), Day Reporting Center slots, electronic monitoring, transitional housing, outpatient treatment, mental health consultation, and Learning Center slots. The cost of this level of programming exceeds the State allocation to Multnomah County for SB 115 operations.

III. **Financial Impact**

The budget modification may require a General Fund supplement.

IV. **Legal Issues**

None.

V. Controversial Issues

State and County officials continue to work on refining population estimates. If higher estimates prove to be accurate, it is possible that service levels funded by this budget modification, even with a General Fund supplement, will not be able to properly respond to offender risk and need factors.

VI. Link to County Policies

This budget modification provides the programs and services levels recommended by the Public Safety Coordinating Council and the Board of County Commissioners.

A portion of this offender population will be housed in prison beds. The other portion will be supervised in the community.

Upon recommendation of the Local Public Safety Coordinating Council (LPSCC), the Department is requesting additional personnel, materials and expansion of existing sanction programs and services to provide community supervision. Total increase in costs to support community supervision with available State funding is \$985,725.

This modification will affect several program budgets within the Department (see attached expend detail).

Personnel and sanction programs will be phased in over a 3 month period beginning February 1, 1997.

SUBJECT: *Budget Modification - DCC 7 & 8*

I. Recommendation/Action Requested

Request approval of budget modification to implement SB1145 Community Intervention Programs (non jail beds), and to pay for staff, materials and services necessary due to the transfer of offenders from the state system to the county system.

II. Background/Analysis

The programs and staff noted in this budget modification are necessary to manage SB1145 offenders once they have left jail and return to the community under the supervision of Adult Community Justice.

There are two sets of budget modifications attached.

Attachment A outlines the Basic Program Budget (bud mod DCC 7), which is the level of programming that the Local Public Safety Coordinating Council has requested we implement. We believe that the State will fully fund this program through SB1145 funds and, if necessary, possible emergency funding from the Governor's budget. Due to several uncertainties, there is a chance that the General Fund may need to supplement this funding for the remainder of this fiscal year.

Attachment B outlines a level of programming that we can afford using only the available State SB1145 funding (bud mod DCC 8). This level offers less services and a slower implementation rate.

Attachment C outlines the financial difference between the two models, as well as the annualized cost for BFY 97/98.

III. Financial Impact

Resources for this program will come from the State's SB1145 funding.

The total cost for the Basic Model (bud mod DCC 7) is \$1,365,486. We believe that the State will fully fund this program through SB1145 funds and possible emergency funding from the Governor's budget. Due to several uncertainties, there is a chance that the General Fund may need to supplement this funding for the remainder of this fiscal year.

The total cost for the Available Funding Model is \$985,723, and is fully funded by the State SB1145 funds (bud mod DCC 8).

The annualized cost for these programs will be \$3,668,187. It is anticipated that the pool of SB1145 funds will increase in 97/98, so the annualized cost is based upon the Basic Model.

IV. Legal Issues

None associated with this budget modification. Numerous legal issues around SB1145 have previously been discussed with the Board.

V. Controversial Issues

The current amount of State SB1145 funding is not enough to adequately fund the jail beds, programs and services we feel are needed to manage this population. We will continue discussions with the State in an effort to increase the amount of funding made available to Multnomah County.

VI. Link to County Policies

The principle behind SB1145 is that local jurisdictions are in a better position to identify and individualize programs and services for this population. The programs identified in this budget modification expand existing County programs.

VII. Citizen Participation

The SB1145 program plan has been presented to the Local Public Safety Coordinating Council. They recommend approving the Basic Model of program implementation.

VIII. Other Government Participation

The SB1145 program plan has been a joint effort between Adult Community Justice and the Sheriffs Office. In addition, the Local Public Safety Coordinating Council has members from other justice agencies in the area, and they have approved this plan.

SUBJECT: Budget Modification for SB 1145 Programs

I. **Recommendation/Action Requested**

Approval of a budget modification for the Department's SB 1145 programs is requested. *This budget modification is within the allocation made available by the Oregon DOC*

II. **Background/Analysis**

During the last several months, staff from this Department, the Sheriff's Office, and Budget and Planning worked to identify a level of service and capacity sufficient to meet the needs of the expected target population of offenders sentenced to 12 months or less. This level of service was approved by the Public Safety Coordinating Council and the Board. Programming includes a Field Supervision Unit, Forest Project slots, residential treatment (contracted), Day Reporting Center slots, electronic monitoring, transitional housing, outpatient treatment, mental health consultation, and Learning Center slots. However, the cost of this level of programming exceeds the State allocation to Multnomah County. Therefore, the Department prepared the attached budget modification which is within the allocation of State funds. This budget provides the same services as the plan approved by the Public Safety Coordinating Council, but it delays some start dates and gets to full staffing more gradually.

III. **Financial Impact**

The budget modification is fully supported by State funds.

IV. Legal Issues

None.

V. Controversial Issues

State and County officials continue to work on refining population estimates. If higher estimates prove to be accurate, it is possible that service levels funded by this budget modification will not be able to properly respond to offender risk and need factors.

VI. Link to County Policies

The Public Safety Coordinating Council and the Board of County Commissioners recommended a package of SB 1145 programs exceeding available funds. This budget modification provides the services recommended, but at reduced service levels.

VII. Citizen Participation

None.

VIII. Other Government Participation

SB 1145 planning has been a collaborative endeavor with the Sheriff's Office and Budget and Planning.

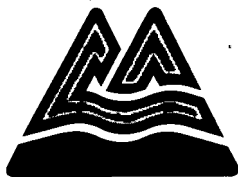

**RE: Approval of Resolution Considering Condemnation and Immediate Possession of
Parcels of Land for Emergency Road Repairs to SW Scholls Ferry Road.**

I. Recommendation/Action Requested:

The Transportation and Land Use Planning Division seeks approval of a resolution requesting consideration to begin public condemnation and gain immediate possession of real property for road construction purposes.

II. Background/Analysis:

The Transportation and Land Use Planning Division is proceeding with plans to repair slide damage to SW Scholls Ferry Road, north of SW Patton Road. In order to make the necessary repairs, the County must purchase portions of several existing parcels. Multnomah County has begun actively pursuing the purchase of these properties.

Properties described in the resolution are vital to construct repairs to the roadway and must be in Multnomah County's possession at the earliest possible date. If we are unable to secure the properties through binding offers, then condemnation will be necessary.

III. Financial Impact:

Funds will be deposited in court to cover legal expenses of the condemnation proceedings. These funds will be deposited from current Road Fund assets.

IV. Legal Issues:

If a public entity is unable to reach agreement with the owner of property deemed necessary for construction or easement, Oregon State Law authorizes state, county and city governments to condemn property under the Eminent Domain Procedures in ORS CH 35.

V. Controversial Issues:

If Multnomah County is unable to reach a negotiated settlement for sale, condemnation proceedings will be necessary.

VI. Link to Current County Policies:

This roadway is a vital link for motorists driving in the SW portion of Portland and those accessing to and from Beaverton. Without these repairs, the County will not be able to reopen the roadway. Multnomah County has been working with property owners to reach an agreement to allow for construction to proceed. This condemnation will be used as a last resort, if necessary, to return the roadway to a safe useable condition.

VII. Citizen Participation:

Multnomah County is negotiating with the property owners.

VIII. Other Government Participation:

By agreement, the City of Portland maintains SW Scholls Ferry Road at this location. Multnomah County is responsible for any capital improvement projects required.


