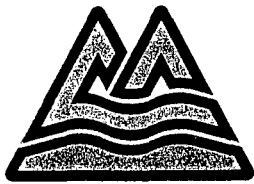

CULTURAL DIVERSITY IS OUR STRENGTH

Analysis and Background:

On November 1, 1989, a Syringe Exchange Program was implemented at Outside In, a private non-profit social service agency in downtown Portland. The goal of the program was to reduce the transmission of HIV by providing sterile syringes to IV drug users in exchange for contaminated syringes. There was hope that providing safe disposal of contaminated syringes might reduce the number of used syringes disposed of in the streets and grass of the neighborhood and therefore reduce potential risk of transmission of HIV. In addition, it was believed that providing this type of syringe exchange would provide access to a traditionally difficult-to-reach group, establishing contact between public health staff and drug injectors, contributing to drug and sex risk reduction and acting as a bridge to drug treatment.

Funding for this program was provided by the American Foundation for AIDS Research (AmFAR). In an effort to facilitate implementation of the Outside In Syringe Exchange Program, Multnomah County provided funding for the purchase of liability insurance and to enhance the research component partially funded by the AmFAR grant. The evaluation effort was lead by Dr. Hugo Maynard, Portland State University. The research sought to assess the effect of the syringe exchange program on reducing syringe sharing by drug injectors, the impact of the exchange on the community as measured by a reduction of the number of used syringes found in the streets and other public areas, and the potential increase in access to additional services for IV drug users.

The final report of this evaluation component has been completed and distributed to the commissioners. This briefing will review the results of this evaluation.

FINAL REPORT
MULTNOMAH COUNTY LOCAL FORUMS

March, 1992

SUMMARY: Nine local forums were held in Multnomah County in January and February, 1992. The purpose of the forums was to prepare for the 1992 Governor's Conference on Aging to be held in April, 1992. Forums were sponsored by the following organizations:

- Urban League -- Northeast Portland
- Older Women's League -- Areawide representation
- Gresham Senior Center -- East Multnomah County
- Northwest Pilot Project -- Downtown Portland
- Neighborhood House/Southwest Loaves and Fishes -- Southwest Portland
- Hollywood Senior Center/St. John's YWCA -- North Portland and Hollywood District
- Friendly House/Housing Authority of Portland -- Northwest and Housing Authority representation
- Chinese Social Service Center/Fook Lok mealsite -- Southeast Portland
- Portland Impact/Loaves and Fishes -- Southeast Portland

Each forum was comprised of two parts. First, forum participants were asked to identify problems, critical issues and needs facing seniors in Multnomah County. Issues surveys were distributed and 163 individuals completed and returned them. (NOTE: This number includes 14 mail-in surveys. Survey forms were not received from participants at Portland Impact and Urban League forums.)

During the second half of each forum, tax education was provided for participants. Heart of Oregon Coalition speakers shared information on Oregon's current tax structure, the impact of Ballot Measure 5, and alternative taxation methods.

The first section of this report summarizes results of the forums and issues identified. The second section discusses survey results and highlights comments made by survey respondents.

I. LOCAL FORUM RESULTS

Total attendance at the nine forums was 261. There were 223 persons over age 60 and 38 under 60. (See Attachment 1 for individual forum attendance)

Issues identified at the forums, in priority order, are:

- 1) **Health Care** - includes better insurance coverage, affordable, available insurance coverage and medical care, high costs of medications and dental care. (Identified at 8 forums.)
- 2) **Home Care/Housing** (tied) - Home care includes better, more

affordable supportive home services, home maintenance, personal care. Transportation is a major supportive care need. Housing includes need for more senior housing, more affordable and safe housing. (Identified at all 9 forums.)

- 3) **Taxes** - includes taxes too high, government spending too high, property taxes too high (Measure 5 not an answer), need new way to finance schools. (Identified at 7 forums.)
- 4) **Mental Health Services** - includes need for more services, better treatment facilities, better alcohol and drug treatment. (Identified at 5 forums.)
- 5) **Transportation** - more services and more dependable, accessible transportation needed. (Identified at 6 forums.)
- 6) **Income** - too many seniors have income below poverty level; too much income must be spent on health care and housing. (Identified at 6 forums.)
- 7) **Nursing Homes** - concern for care and life quality, need for better trained, paid staff. (Identified at 5 forums.)
- 8) **Day Care/Community Care** - need for more day care and services through senior centers. (Identified at 5 forums.)
- 9) **Information and Referral** - lack of information available, need for information about services. (Identified at 2 forums.)

(See Attachment 1 for priorities identified at individual forums)

II. ISSUES SURVEY RESULTS

163 individuals returned completed survey forms. 149 were returned at the forums (excluding Portland Impact and Urban League). 14 were mail-in surveys.

Demographics: (Note: The following information is based only on answers provided on survey questionnaires. Not all respondents answered every question, so totals in each category will not be equal.)

Residence: 148 Multnomah County residents; 4 persons reside outside the county. Following is a listing of respondents by area:

Other Information: 76 (59%) respondents indicated they were low income; 53 (41%) said they were not low income.

36 (30%) individuals indicated they were disabled; 84 (70%) stated they were not disabled.

Priority Needs: The 10 issues identified by those completing the issues survey, in priority order, are:

- 1) Better Health Insurance coverage
- 2) Property taxes too high
- 3) Cost of medications too high
- 4) Too much income spent for medical care
- 5) Need for affordable home help
- 6) Need for more mental health services; tied with need for better support services such as transportation
- 7) Too many seniors with income below poverty level
- 8) Need more affordable housing
- 9) Quality of life issues in nursing homes need to be addressed
- 10) Quality of direct care provided in nursing homes needs to be addressed

Comments: A number of respondents added comments or highlighted items which they considered especially important. Following are some of these comments:

- Lower sewer costs - mid-county sewer project hard on fixed-income people. (3 individuals commented on this.)
- Crime against seniors-personal assault, property assault, safety in neighborhoods, properly lighted streets, patrols to prevent crime. (A number of comments on this.)
- More emphasis on recreation, volunteerism, what seniors can give to community, to avoid polarization, young taxpayers vs. seniors. Should be a conference committee on this.
- Re: high taxes - Elect only those qualified for positions, less or no assistants. Weed out extra workers, unqualified "helpers."
- Need more doctors and medical workers with geriatric knowledge. more gerontology training for housing managers.

- Elect legislators who will put welfare of people above party politics.
- Address minority senior services and issues.
- Better publicity for good caregivers in many nursing homes.
- Need more diverse tax structure.
- Businesses and out-of-state should not have same tax relief as home owners.
- Keep Ombudsman program funded.
- Senior trips---more activities in senior centers.
- Better trained advocates for disabled of any age.
- More study needed on Oregon Health Plan (Kitzhaber bill) and report on it at Governor's Conference.
- Include dementia in prioritizing health needs.
- National health insurance, with single payer system.
- Information on coping with grief after losing spouse.
- Eliminate property tax after retirement for those at or near poverty level.

CONCLUSION: Seniors in Multnomah County are most concerned about health care, health insurance and medical costs. They consider need for adequate home care and support services, such as transportation, to be of prime importance. Additionally, they want adequate housing, safe neighborhoods, mental health and nursing home services to be available to senior citizens. At the same time, high taxes, property taxes in particular, and low, fixed incomes for seniors are issues they feel should be addressed.
