The Future Generations Collaborative (FGC) is an innovative partnership among American Indian and Alaska Native community members, community-based organizations, and public health agencies to increase healthy pregnancies and healthy births, and strengthen families in American Indian and Alaska Native communities. The Collaborative's work is community-led and aims to heal the root causes of health inequities and health disparities experienced by Native communities.

Each day, Multnomah County employees work tirelessly to serve the community and provide quality care and service. This award is presented to a current Multnomah County employee who truly demonstrates outstanding service to the public.



Alison Goldstein is currently the lead social worker for the Tri-County 911 Service Coordination Program, a program targeted to residents of Multnomah, Clackamas and Washington counties, who use emergency medical services frequently. She and her team work to connect clients to the right care in the right place. Alison has been a practicing social worker for more than twenty years, focusing on the LGBTQQI community, injection drug-users, people living with HIV and Hepatitis C, and those involved in criminal justice systems in both South Florida and Portland, Oregon.

In her spare time, Alison loves being among trees, at the beach and spending time with her family and good friends.

## ❖ ————— **Public Health Partner Award** ————— ❖

This award is given to an outstanding organization whose partnership with Multnomah County Health Department helps to influence policy solutions that improves the public health environment for all members of the community.



Since 1968, Outside In has helped homeless youth and other marginalized people move toward improved health and self-sufficiency. Outside In has continually revised their Homeless Youth Services and Medical Services to meet changing community needs. Multnomah County Health Department partnered with Outside In to pass a state bill that would increase community access to naloxone; a medication that reverses opiate overdose. Since Outside In began their naloxone program the number of opiate overdose deaths decreases by almost 25% in 2013. [www.outsidein.org](http://www.outsidein.org)
