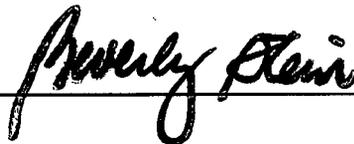

**BEHAVIORAL HEALTH POLICY BRIEFING
PRESENTED TO THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS
JANUARY 14, 1997**

I. BACKGROUND

During the past three years the Multnomah County Department of Community and Family Services (DCFS) has initiated a structural reengineering of community based behavioral health services. As a direct result of the Oregon Health Plan(OHP), declining state and local revenues, and the emergence of managed care as a model for behavioral health services delivery, DCFS has collaborated with its' community partners to initiate a number of unprecedented system changes. These changes include a major internal reorganization, the successful development and implementation of the Partners Project, CAPCare, CAPCare Plus, Target Cities, and a Mental Health Crisis Triage system. All of the changes have had as their primary objectives improved services integration, quality of care, access to services for vulnerable populations, creation of systems that have the capacity to make data driven decisions and produce measurable outcomes, and cost containment.

II. LEGISLATIVE ISSUES

At every phase of systems development during the past three years, there has been great uncertainty about the future of the OHP, revenue stability, and critical policy decisions that were to be made either by the state legislature or state agencies. Underlying the public policy goals outlined above was a strong belief that managed care systems design **in some form** would be required by the state. The strategy for response to this trend has been to develop a number of managed care system models to position the community based behavioral health system to respond to several possible scenarios. This "positioning" strategy has been articulated to the Board at a number of decision points during the past three years.

The legislative issues that are creating both certainty and uncertainty are easy to identify but difficult to interpret. They can be delineated as follows:

- OHP funding, due to the passage of BM 44, including full behavioral health services roll up, appears to be stable.
- The uncertainty of the legislative processes that will finalize budgets, define education and public safety will leave significant questions unanswered until late session.
- BM 47's immediate revenue impact on county programs has forced a reexamination of the county's role in the provision of community base mental health services.

III. WHAT IS THE COUNTY'S ROLE IN THE PROVISION OF COMMUNITY BASED MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES (IF ANY)?

In Oregon law, all references to the Community Mental Health Program (CMHP) include Mental and Emotional Disabilities, Developmental Disabilities, and Alcohol and Drug services. This document's focus is on Behavioral Health, which includes MED and A&D, but any policy decisions made regarding Multnomah County's role will also affect Developmental Disability services. With that in mind, Multnomah County has two choices in response to this question. *The implications of these choices can only be completely understood in the context of both budget information and the Oregon Health Plan RFP, which will be addressed in Sections IV and V of this document.* Those choices are outlined as follows:

1) Function as the Community Mental Health Program (CMHP) and Local Mental Health Authority (LMHA), which means to assure the availability of a range of required or permitted services, in addition to certain mandated services (emergency holds and civil commitments) for which the county is financially responsible. The county may assure the availability of services, within the limits of allocated state revenue, through contracts with community based agencies or provide them directly. Other than for those mandated services noted above, the contribution of county revenue is optional. In Oregon the majority of counties operate as the CMHP, in others the CMHP function is contracted to another entity.

2) Cease to operate as the CMHP, which would allow the state to contract out the function of assuring the availability of statutorily specified services or manage the system directly, leaving the county with the requirement and financial responsibility to fund only the mandated services; emergency holds and civil commitment.

This option would effectively eliminate the County's authority to monitor, regulate, or evaluate, state funded mental health services. Contribution of county revenue through contract or intergovernmental agreement is also a choice under this option.

IV) BUDGET SUMMARY

A detailed analysis of the Behavioral Health budget is attached for your review. A summary of that analysis is presented as follows:

V) SHOULD MULTNOMAH COUNTY RESPOND TO THE OREGON HEALTH PLAN RFP AND WHAT PARAMETERS SHOULD BE SET FOR THAT RESPONSE?

The Oregon Health Plan RFP was released on January 10. Key elements of this proposal are :

- The RFP requires proposals to provide/manage the Medicaid behavioral health benefit.
- **Entities qualified to bid are limited to Fully Capitated Health Plans (FCHP's), and Community Mental Health Programs constituted under ORS430.620, or one or more other organizations authorized by the Local Mental Health Authority (LMHA) to submit a proposal.** As defined by Oregon Administrative Rule, the LMHA is the Board of County Commissioners.
- A letter of intent from qualified bidders is due to the State on January 24, 1997 and a notification of intent to conduct to conduct a local planning process is due by January 31, 1997.

Given the parameters set by the RFP, Multnomah County has three choices, independent of revenue or other policy considerations at this time.

1) Authorize the Department of Community and Family Services to respond to the RFP. The authorization requires that Multnomah County would retain it's legal status as Community Mental Health Program.

2) Initiate a County RFP process to authorize one or more other organizations to submit a proposal(s). This action would allow Multnomah County to retain its status as CMHP, but shift approximately \$35m and the responsibility for managing those funds to entities over which the County would have no regulatory or monitoring authority.

3) Take no action and allow the state to conduct a competitive process to determine which organizations would receive funding to provide services. This action (or lack thereof) would have the same consequences as Option 2.

VI) RECOMMENDATIONS

- **THE COUNTY'S ROLE**

The Multnomah County Department of Community and Family Services should continue to function as the Community Mental Health Program. Local government should continue to play a strong role in assuring access, quality of care, and the availability of services for high need, vulnerable populations. This role is consistent with the county's historical mission and articulated benchmarks. In addition, effectively carrying out this role will promote services integration and responsible stewardship of public funds. Even if county revenue contributions were reduced, county management of the state funds remaining in the system would promote achievement of the above goals.

- **BUDGET**

DCFS recommends continued funding of mandated services and those non-mandated that would result in higher expenditures in the mandated service areas if those services were not provided. DCFS further recommends a full BCC review of remaining CGF allocations in light of county benchmarks, public safety, and family support priorities.

Material previously submitted to the Board has indicated that a total amount of approximately \$7m in CGF was available to reprogram, reduce or eliminate as part of the BM 47 budget reduction process. Further analysis suggests that this total dollar amount is not available and there are policy and cost shift issues associated with these funds. About \$1m is allocated for adult civil commitment and emergency hold services for which the county is statutorily responsible. An additional \$.4m is allocated for non-mandated services that mitigate the expenses of holds and commitments. If these services were eliminated it is anticipated that hold and commitment costs would increase dramatically, significantly exceeding the cost of non mandated services. The remaining funds provide for a mix of children's mental health (about \$3.5m), alcohol and drug services for adults, children and families, and Hooper Detox (\$1.1m). A significant proportion of children's mental health funds provide services for individuals who are not Medicaid eligible.

- THE RFP

DCFS recommends that the Board of County Commissioners grant authorization to proceed with a response to the RFP. Implicit in this recommendation is the understanding that there will be future decision points and opportunities to stop this process should budget or legislative actions make it undesirable for county participation. It is further understood that the county's role to be proposed in the RFP will be as manager of OHP funds in the context of a contract relationship with service providers.

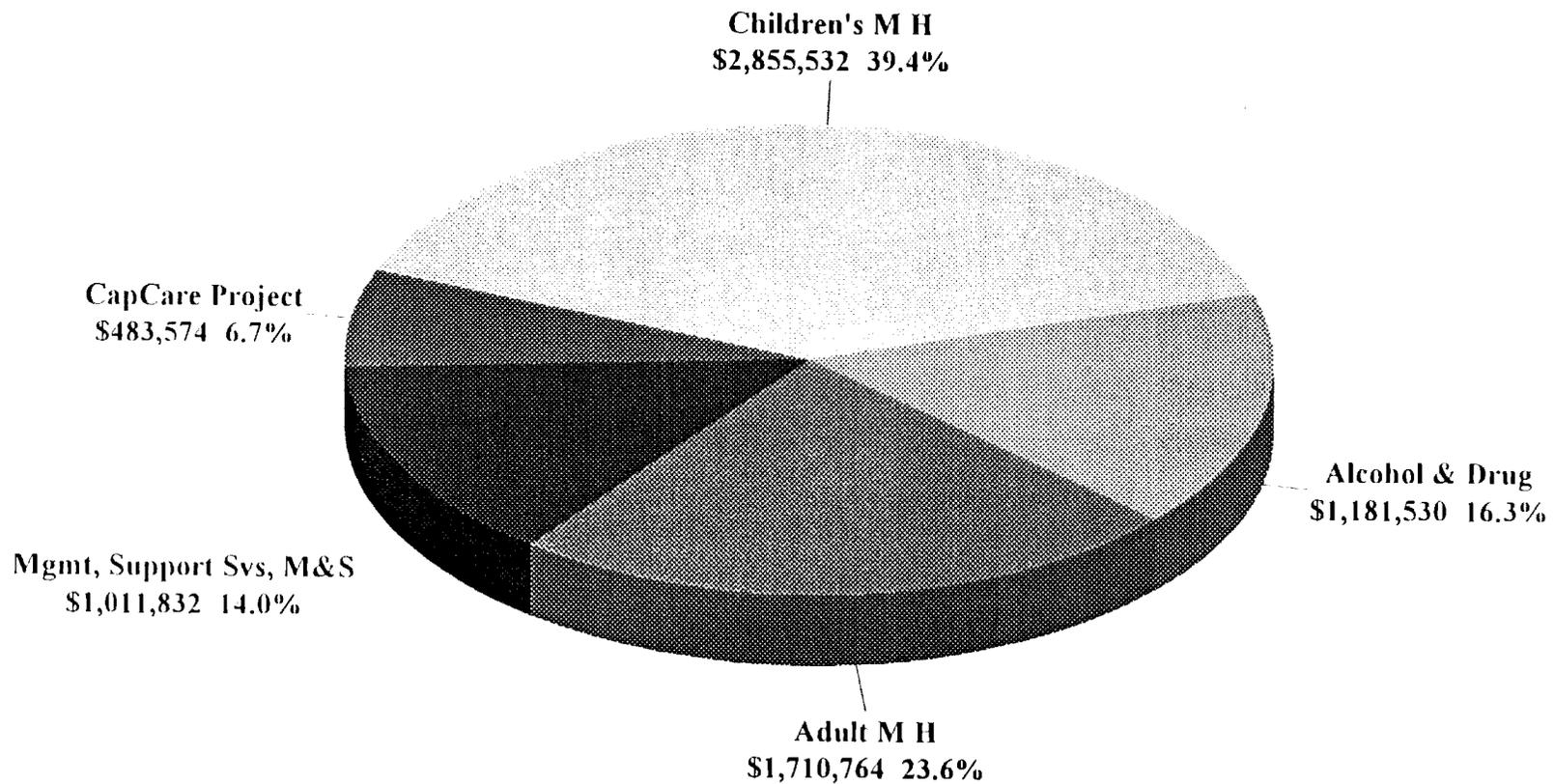

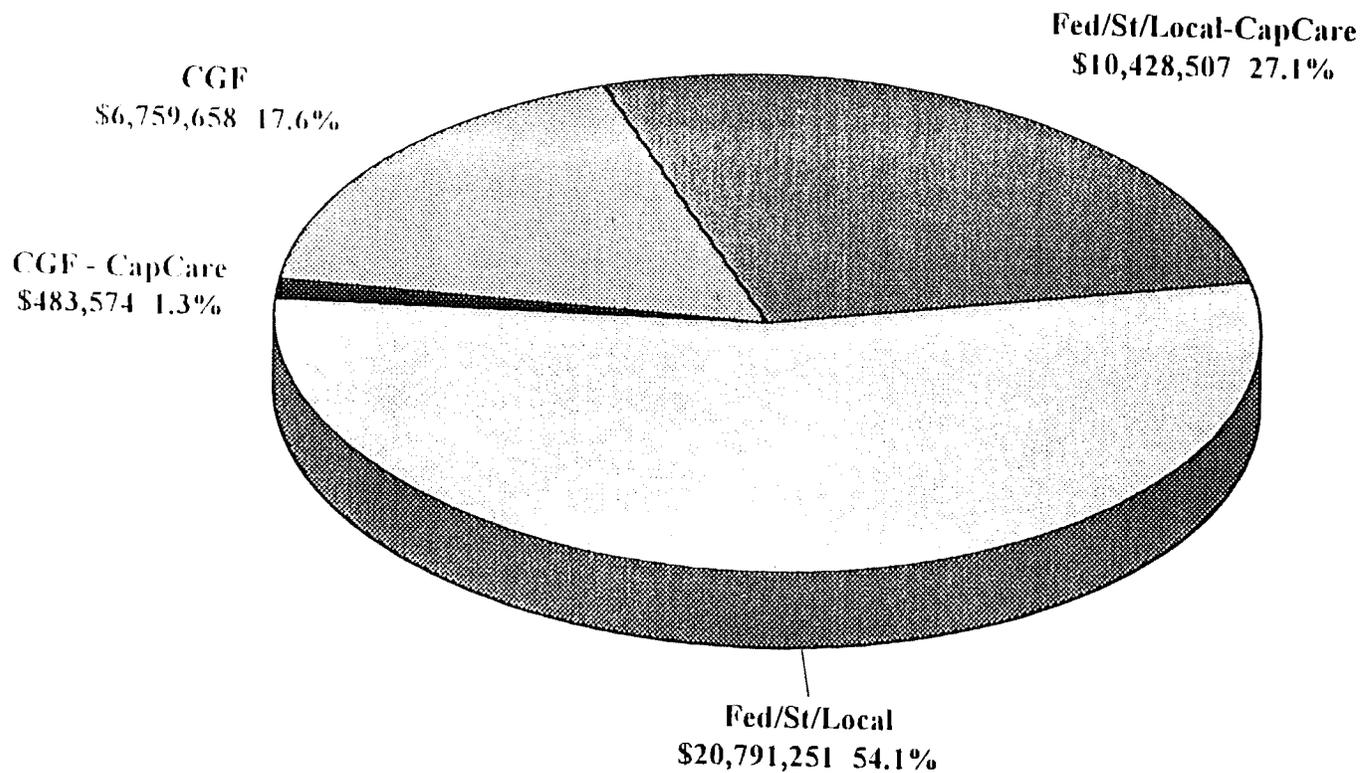
Division of Behavioral Health FY 1996-97 CGF Distribution By Program

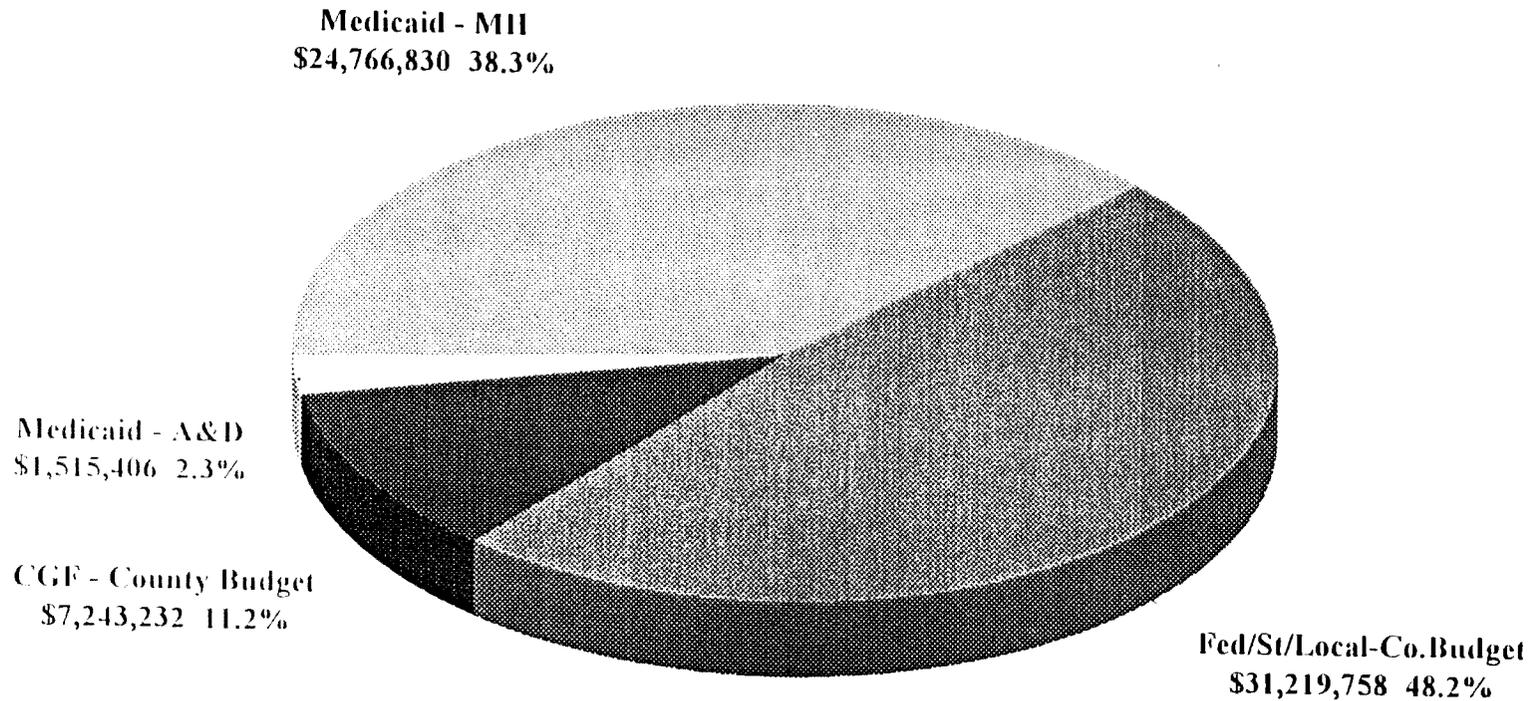
Division of Behavioral Health FY 1996-97 Total Revenues in County Budget
