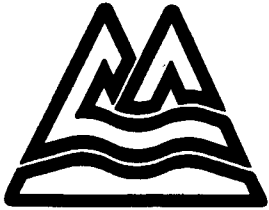



SUBJECT: Approval of a Intergovernmental Agreement between the Department of Juvenile Justice Services and Portland Public School District No. 1

I. RECOMMENDATION/ACTION REQUESTED:

The Department of Juvenile Justice Services recommends the Board's approval of an Intergovernmental Agreement between Portland Public Schools (PPS) District No. 1 and DJJS to continue the PAX program and provide a Juvenile Court Counselor on-site to help court-involved students access and succeed in the program.

II. BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS:

Project PAX was established October 1, 1995 for the 1995/96 school year as a comprehensive violence intervention program that responds to the community outcry for intervention, the federal Safe Schools Gun Act and the Portland Public School District policy regarding weapons and violence.

Project PAX (Positive Antiviolence EXperience) is a 45 to 90 day program for middle and high school students expelled for reasons of assault, fighting, weapons possessions and other disciplinary violations involving violence. Project PAX is designed to link clear and coordinated disciplinary sanctions with services that help these students learn positive alternatives to violence while continuing their academic progress. Many of the students referred to PAX will have had numerous discipline actions and have exhausted other school program options and now are expelled from school. Some students spend this time at home; others are in the streets. Other alternative programs do not focus on dealing with student violence. Project PAX can work with many of these youth to prevent the need for short or long term incarceration. Project PAX has built its curriculum to empathize skill building on anger management, conflict resolutions, problem solving and empathy training. With this skill building emphasis a student is better able to identify problems that keep him/her from being successful and self initiate positive interventions.

III. **FINANCIAL IMPACT:**

Multnomah County Juvenile Justice Services will allocate to Portland Public Schools District No. 1 the total sum of \$193,645 for the cost of the entire project, additionally provide a Court Counselor (see attachment A).

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT

This agreement is between Portland School District No. 1 (District) and Multnomah County Department of Juvenile Justice Services (County). It is for the period beginning October 1, 1996, and ending June 30, 1997. It is established for the following purpose.

PURPOSE

To continue to provide the District's Project PAX alternative programs and a Juvenile Court Counselor on-site to help court-involved students access and succeed in the program.

1. COUNTY RESPONSIBILITIES

- a. County will assign one Juvenile Court Counselor full time to PAX to provide the services and coordination described below. The Court Counselor will be assigned to work on-site at the Project PAX program and will work exclusively to support program goals as described in the PAX proposal.
- b. County will provide counseling, orientation to the Juvenile Justice Court process, and case management services to student referred to the PAX programs; will refer students to appropriate services available through the justice system (e.g., probation hearings, required weekly reporting to a court judge, community service, job training and mental health assessments.
- c. Court Counselor will serve as liaison between the County and the District regarding students referred to the PAX program.
- d. Court Counselor will maintain confidential files of history of contacts with identified students, plus records of students' formal relationship with court, and will assist in project evaluation efforts.
- e. Court Counselor will attend PAX staff meeting to facilitate effective case management and attend project training events.
- f. Court Counselor will report to the Juvenile Justice supervisor, the District Project director, and the PAX supervisor.
- g. County will provide the Court Counselor's salary, fringe benefits, and transportation and supplies as needed.

2. CONTRACTOR RESPONSIBILITIES

- a. CONTRACTOR will provide counseling and support to parents of PAX students, including Family Unity meetings, and will assist families in accessing additional appropriate services.
- b. CONTRACTOR will co-facilitate student support groups with other PAX staff.

- c. CONTRACTOR will provide instruction in violence prevention to PAX students, in coordination with other PAX staff.
- d. CONTRACTOR will provide field trips and various educational, cultural, recreational, and community service activities designed to improve student's ability to successfully return to school.
- e. CONTRACTOR will provide space and communication media for the Court Counselor.
- f. CONTRACTOR will make school records, including progress and behavioral records, available to Court Counselor for those students served by the Court Counselor pursuant to this agreement.

3. JOINT RESPONSIBILITIES

District and County, their officers and employees, shall hold information received from the other regarding students and youth involved in the Juvenile Court process in the strict confidence required by law applicable to the providing agency including, but not limited to, **42 CFR Chapter 1, subchapter A**, and shall not disclose the information for any purpose without written approval of that agency. Confidential information includes, but is not limited to, student names, family names, and all information relative to student and family. The confidential information shall be used for no other than officially serving students and family needs according to the obligations of this agreement. In the event that demand for disclosure of documents is received by subpoena or otherwise, the documents, if any, shall be returned to the agency which generated the original document (Providing Agency) and the person making the demand shall be immediately notified. In the event that a subpoena for testimony is received, the Providing Agency shall immediately be notified of the demand and shall provide instructions and defend against the demand as necessary.

4. COMPENSATION

- a. County will reimburse the District in the sum of \$193,645 for performance of those services here within, which payment shall be based on the following applicable terms:
- c. CONTRACTOR will submit a monthly itemized invoice of actual expenses to the County by the 10th working day of the month.

The County understands that the District is utilizing Federal funds for school anti-violence work.

5. INDEMNIFICATION

Subject to the limitations and conditions of the Oregon Constitution and statutes, District and County each shall be solely responsible for any loss or injury caused to third parties arising from District's or County's own acts or omissions under the agreement and District or County

shall defend, hold harmless and indemnify the other party to this agreement with respect to any claim, litigation or liability arising from District's or County's own acts or omissions under agreement.

RE: Local Agency Agreement between the State of Oregon's Department of Transportation and Multnomah County for the purpose of constructing improvements to the intersection of NE 238th Drive and NE Halsey Street.

I. Recommendation/Action Requested:

Multnomah County should enter into and execute this agreement during a duly authorized session of the Board of County Commissioners

II. Background/Analysis:

The current intersection configuration is four through lanes on NE 238th Drive and three lanes on NE Halsey Street with no turn signals. There is limited sight distance to the north, contributing to a high frequency of turning accidents at this intersection.

ODOT plans to improve the north side of this intersection in 1997 under the I-84 Project. Improvements include widening 238th Drive to five lanes and a grade change to improve sight distance. Multnomah County plans to improve the rest of the intersection to coordinate with ODOT's improvements. Specifically, the county plans to widen NE 238th Drive to five lanes from Birch Street north, approximately 400 feet, to the intersection with NE Halsey Street; widen NE Halsey Street to four lanes with left and right turn lanes and bus turnouts, approximately 500 feet east and west of NE 238th Drive; and reconstruct the signalization at the intersection with left turns and interconnection with the State's signals at the I-84 interchange to the north.

III. Financial Impact:

The estimated project cost is \$560,000. Currently, the federal funds are limited to \$377,000. This project has been proposed for full funding under the Regional Transportation Improvement Program and will be decided on by the ODOT Transportation Commission in the spring of 1997. This project is programmed in the Multnomah County CIP Program and if full funding is rejected, the additional funds will be reallocated in the CIP.

IV. Legal Issues:

There are no known legal issues associated with this agreement.

V. Controversial Issues:

There are no controversial issues at this time.

VI. Link to Current County Policies:

This project is consistent with the Comprehensive Framework Plan (1983). Specifically, policy 33a regarding the development of the transportation system to be safe, functional and convenient and policy 34 regarding the development and operation of county traffic ways.

VII. Citizen Participation:

A public meeting was held on May 9, 1996 to discuss the project and answer questions concerning the impacts. Staff from Multnomah County, ODOT and Wood Village were present. Impacts of the project, right-of-way acquisition for the project, typical cross-sections and the replacement of street trees were discussed. No major concerns were raised from the citizens.

VIII. Other Government Participation:

The City Council of Wood Village has adopted a formal resolution to support this project. Tree replacement, landscaping and other details are being coordinated with Wood Village staff.

LOCAL AGENCY AGREEMENT
SURFACE TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between THE STATE OF OREGON, acting by and through its Department of Transportation, hereinafter referred to as "State"; and MULTNOMAH COUNTY, a municipal subdivision of the State of Oregon, acting by and through its Elected Officials, hereinafter referred to as "Agency".

1. By the authority granted in ORS 366.770 and 366.775, State may enter into cooperative agreements with counties and cities for the performance of work on certain types of improvement projects with the allocation of costs on terms and conditions mutually agreeable to the contracting parties.
2. Under such authority, State and Agency plan and propose to widen NE 238th Drive to five lanes, widen NE Halsey Street to four lanes with left and right turn lanes and bus turnouts, and reconstruct signalization with left turns and interconnects, hereinafter referred to as "Project", The location of the Project is approximately as shown on the sketch map attached hereto, marked Exhibit A, and by this reference made a part hereof.
3. The project shall be conducted as a part of the Surface Transportation Program (STP) under Title 23, United States Code, and the Oregon Action Plan. The federal funds are limited to \$377,000. The project will be financed with Local STP funds at approximately 90 percent Federal, with Agency providing matching funds. Agency shall be responsible for the match for federal funds and any portion of the project not covered by federal funding.
4. The Special and Standard Provisions attached hereto, marked Attachments 1 and 2, respectively, are by this reference made a part hereof. The Standard Provisions apply to all federal-aid projects and may be modified only by the Special Provisions. The parties hereto mutually agree to terms and conditions set forth in Attachments 1 and 2. In the event of a conflict, this agreement shall control over the attachments, and Attachment 1 shall control over Attachment 2.
5. Agency shall enter into and execute this agreement during a duly authorized session of its Board of County Commissioners.

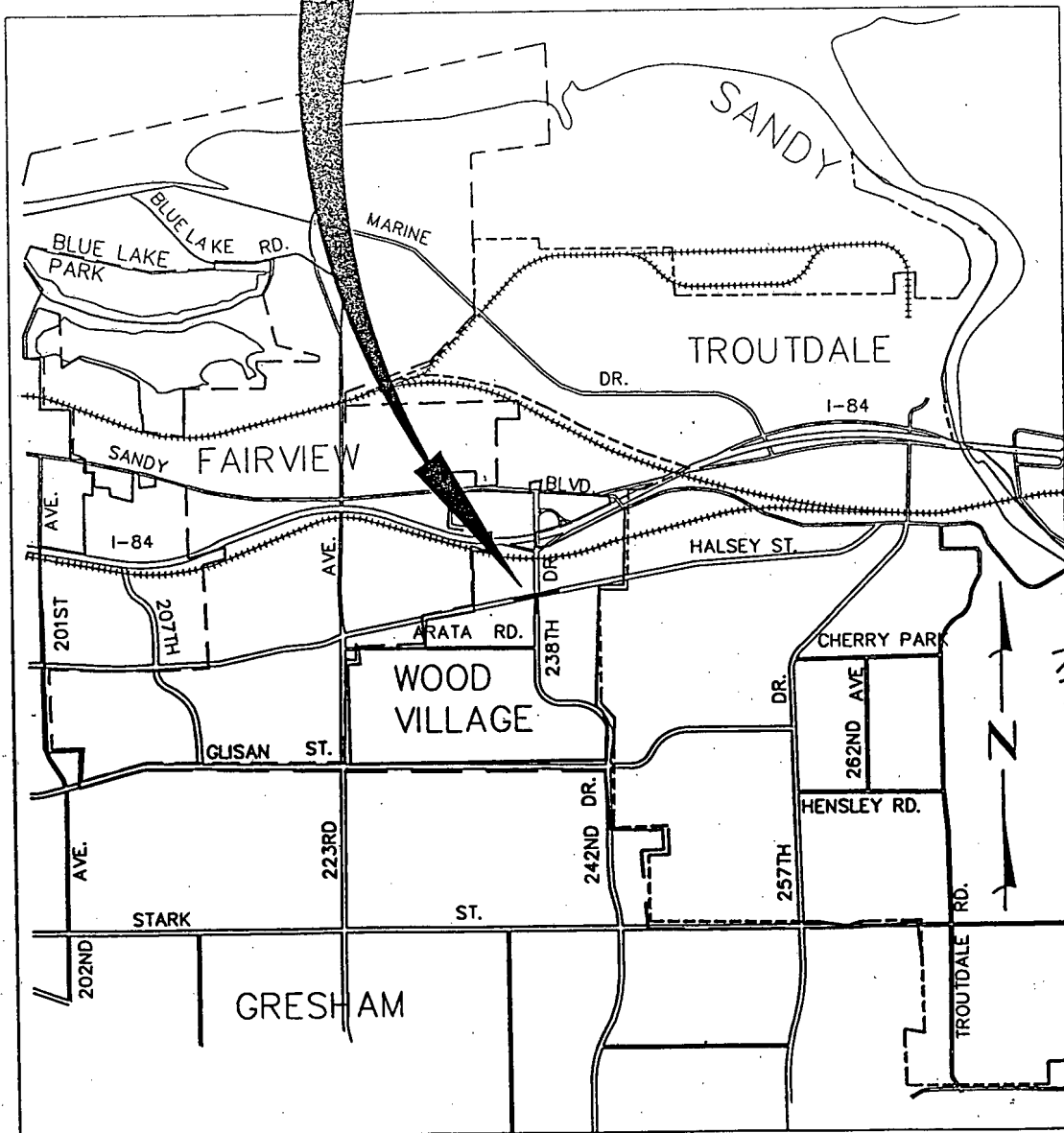

EXHIBIT 'A'

ATTACHMENT NO. 1, SPECIAL PROVISIONS

1. Agency or its consultant shall conduct the necessary field surveys, environmental studies, traffic investigations, foundation explorations and hydraulic studies; identify and obtain all required permits; acquire all necessary right-of-way; and perform all preliminary engineering and design work required to produce final plans, specifications and cost estimates.
2. Agency shall, upon State's award of the construction contract, furnish all construction engineering, field testing of materials, technical inspection and project manager services for administration of the contract. State shall obtain "Record Samples" at specified intervals for testing in the State Materials Laboratory in Salem.
3. State shall review and approve all environmental statements, preliminary and final plans, and all specifications and cost estimates. State shall prepare contract and bidding documents, advertise for bid proposals, and award all contracts.
4. State and Agency agree that right-of-way activities shall be in accord with the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policy Act of 1970, as amended. Agency should contact Region right-of-way office for additional information or clarification.
5. Agency agrees that minimum design standards shall be recommended AASHTO Standards and the current Oregon Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan, unless otherwise requested by Agency and approved by State.
6. Agency insures that all project right-of-way monumentation will be conducted in conformance with ORS 209.150.
7. Agency shall conform with requirements of the Oregon Action Plan and, if necessary, shall appoint and direct the activities of a Citizen Advisory Committee and Technical Advisory Committee.
8. Agency shall, upon completion of the project, maintain the facilities at its own expense. Agency shall also pay for all electrical energy consumed by the signalization.
9. This project is being built in conjunction with State's I-84 Interchange construction. As provided in agreement No. 14,313, State and Agency will coordinate work on their respective projects to ensure properly staged construction on NE 238th Drive.

ATTACHMENT NO. 2

STANDARD PROVISIONS

JOINT OBLIGATIONS

PROJECT ADMINISTRATION

1. State is acting to fulfill its responsibility to the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) by the administration of this project, and Agency hereby agrees that State shall have full authority to carry out this administration. If requested by Agency, State will further act for the Agency in other matters pertaining to the project. State and Agency shall actively cooperate in fulfilling the requirements of the Oregon Action Plan. State and Agency shall each assign a liaison person to coordinate activities and assure that the interests of both parties are considered during all phases for all projects.

Any project that uses federal funds, in project development, is subject to PS&E review and approval by FHWA prior to advertisement for bid proposals, regardless of the source of funding for construction.

P.E. & CONSTRUCTION ENGINEERING

2. Preliminary and construction engineering may be performed by State, Agency, or others. If Agency, or others, perform the engineering, State will monitor the work for conformance with FHWA rules and regulations. In the event that Agency elects to engage the services of a consultant to perform any of the work covered by this agreement, Agency and Consultant shall enter into an agreement describing the work to be performed and the method of payment. State shall concur in the agreement prior to the beginning of any work. No reimbursement shall be made using federal-aid funds for any costs incurred by such Consultant prior to receiving authorization from State to proceed.

On all construction projects where State is the signatory party to the contract, and where Agency is doing the construction engineering and project management, Agency agrees to accept all responsibility for and defend lawsuits involving tort claims, contract claims, or any other lawsuit arising out of the contractor's work or Agency's supervision of the project.

AUTHORITY FOR SURVEY

6. State shall prepare an Authority for Survey which will itemize the estimate of cost for preliminary engineering services to be provided by State, Agency or others, and shall furnish Agency with a copy of such cost estimate.

FINANCE

7. State shall, in the first instance, pay all reimbursable costs of the project, submit all claims for federal-aid participation to the FHWA in the normal manner and compile accurate cost accounting records. Agency may request a statement of costs to date, at anytime, by submitting a written request. When the actual total cost of the project has been computed, State shall furnish Agency with an itemized statement of such final costs.

PROJECT ACTIVITIES

8. State shall, if the work is performed by Agency or others, review and process or approve all environmental statements, preliminary and final plans, specifications and cost estimates. State shall, if they prepare these documents, offer Agency the opportunity to review and approve the documents prior to advertising for bids. State shall prepare contract and bidding documents, advertise for bid proposals, award all contracts and, upon award of a construction contract, perform all necessary laboratory testing of materials, process and pay all contractor progress estimates, check final quantities and costs, and oversee and provide intermittent inspection services during the construction phase of the project. The actual cost of laboratory testing services provided by State will be charged to the project construction engineering expenditure account and will be included in the total cost of the project.

FREE BRIDGE DESIGN

9. State shall, as provided in ORS 366.155(h), prepare plans and specifications for the structure portion only of bridges and culverts at no expense to the counties.

RIGHT-OF-WAY

10. State is responsible for acquisition of the necessary right-of-way and easements for construction and maintenance of the project. Agency may request to perform the acquisition functions, subject to execution of a written agreement. State

processing within six months from date that costs were incurred. Partial billing (progress payment) shall be submitted to State within three months from date that costs incurred.

13. The costs records and accounts pertaining to the work covered by this agreement are to be kept available for inspection by representatives of State and the FHWA for a period of three (3) years following the date of final payment. Copies of such records and accounts shall be made available upon request. For real property and equipment, the retention period starts from the date of disposition (49 CFR 18.42).

This agreement is subject to the provisions of the Single Audit Act of 1984 (49 CFR, Part 90) as stated in Circular A-128 of the United States Office of Management and Budget.

PROJECT CANCELLATION

14. Agency agrees that should they cause the project to be canceled or terminated for any reason prior to its completion, Agency shall reimburse State for any costs that have been incurred by State on behalf of the project.

DELAYED STARTING DATE

* 15. In the event that right-of-way acquisition for, or actual construction of the facility for which this preliminary engineering is undertaken is not started by the close of the TENTH FISCAL YEAR following the fiscal year in which this agreement is executed, State may request reimbursement of the sum or sums of Federal-Aid funds disbursed to Agency under the terms of this agreement.

UTILITIES

* 16. Agency shall relocate or cause to be relocated, all utility conduits, lines, poles, mains, pipes, and such other facilities where such relocation is necessary in order to conform said utilities and facilities with the plans and ultimate requirements of the project. Only those utility relocations which are eligible for federal-aid participation under the FAPG, 23 CFR 645A, shall be included in the total project costs and participation; all other utility relocations shall be at the sole expense of Agency, or others. State will arrange for utility adjustments in areas lying within jurisdiction of State and, if State is performing the preliminary engineering. Agency may request State to arrange for utility adjustments lying within Agency jurisdiction, acting on behalf of Agency.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION COVERAGE

21. The contractor, its subcontractors, if any, and all employers working under this (Agreement/Contract) are subject employers under the Oregon Workers' Compensation Law and shall comply with ORS 656.017, which requires them to provide Workers' Compensation coverage for all their subject workers.

LOBBYING RESTRICTIONS

22. Agency certifies by signing this agreement that:

- A. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the undersigned, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any Federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.
- B. If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any Federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying", in accordance with its instructions.
- C. The undersigned shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers (including subgrants, and contracts and subcontracts under grants, subgrants, loans, and cooperative agreements) which exceed \$100,000, and that all such subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

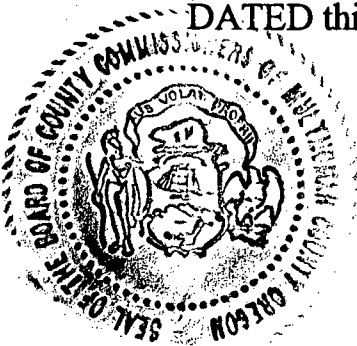



SUBJECT: Increasing Environmental Health Fees and updating food handler code

I. Recommendation/Action Requested:

The Board of County Commissioners is requested to approve this ordinance increasing certain Environmental Health license fees and updating the food handler training code to comply with changes in state statute and administrative rule and to improve verification of training by food handlers.

II. Background/Analysis:

Fee increases: The Health Department periodically reviews the fees it charges for licenses issued and services provided by the Environmental Health program. The last fee increase was enacted in 1994. The fee increases are based on an analysis of actual program costs to carry out the programs.

It has generally been the Health Department's policy that fees charged to regulated facilities should cover the costs of mandatory licensing and related services.

Increased remittance to the State Health Division: Multnomah County provides environmental health services under a delegation agreement with the Oregon Health Division. Each delegate county is required to remit a portion of food license fees to the State Health Division to support the statewide consultation unit. Multnomah County remittance was increased by \$78,739 over a two year fiscal period 95-97. A portion of that was made up through salary savings (\$26,774) but fee increases are needed to raise the remainder.

Increased building and computer costs: Both the size of the program's office rental space and the base rent increased for the inspection program.

General inflation: There have been cost-of-living increases in both supplies and personnel costs.

Increased work load: An analysis of food service plan review activities has shown that significant increases are necessary to cover costs for field visits and pre-opening inspections..

Food handler Code update: Passage of Senate Bill 380 in the 1995 Legislature established a statewide food handler training program. This ordinance changes the county code to make it comply with state statute and administrative rules. It also updates language in the code and enhances the verification of food handler training. The food handler changes are as follows:

- would require training to be completed within 30 days of employment. The county code requires training from the first day of employment.
- would adopt the state's definition of "food handler" which differs from that in the county code.
- would adopt state criteria for food handler training. The county code leaves this to the discretion of its health officer.
- would allow a restaurant to offer a state-approved training program to its food handlers if the content of the program meets state criteria and would set a fee for cards issued after this training. The county code does not address this option.
- would require operators to keep employees' cards in a central location for review by the department.

III. Financial Impact:

Additional revenues are anticipated to be:

Food Service	\$66,464
Food Plan Review	\$14,065
Tourist and Traveler Accommodations	\$2,870

Changes to the food handler code will have no fiscal impact.

V. Legal Issues:

Oregon statute and administrative rule mandate the regulation of food service facilities and tourist and travel accommodations. Multnomah County performs these functions under a delegation agreement with the Oregon Health Division. These laws and rules also authorize collection of license fees to cover the costs of these functions.

The methods used to derive the proposed fees and the program costs are within the limits of applicable laws and rules.

V. Controversial Issues:

Fee increases are always controversial. The proposed increases are based on the county's actual costs. The overall increase is 9% however, the average increase on license fees is 7%. The overall average is affected by significant increase in plan review fees.

VI. Link to Current County Policies:

This conforms to the current Health Department policy of charging license and inspection fees except where prohibited by state statute to establishments under the delegation agreement.

VII. Citizen Participation:

These proposed fee increases were shared with members of the Multnomah County Food Service Advisory Committee, the Oregon Restaurant Association and the Oregon Health Division. Additionally, the proposed changes will be published in the October issue of the department's *Food Program Update* that is mailed to all food license holders in the county.

VIII. Other Government Participation:

No direct participation by other governmental agencies is required in this matter.

ORDINANCE FACT SHEET

Ordinance Title: 5.10.320 - 5.10.345 Food Service, Food Service Plan Review and Tourist Accommodation License Fees. 8.30.010 - 8.30.350 Food handler.

Give a brief statement of the purpose of the ordinance (include the rationale for adoption of ordinance, description of persons benefited, other alternative explored):

Increases license fees in the food service and tourist accommodations programs and for plan reviews of food service facilities. Updates the county food handler code to comply with changes in state statute and rules and to enhance verification of food handler training.

What other local jurisdictions in the metropolitan area have enacted similar legislation?

Washington and Clackamas counties have similar license and plan review fees for these same services.

What has been the experience in other areas with this type of legislation?

They have been allowed to set fees to cover the cost of providing the services.

What is the fiscal impact, if any?

The proposed fees are an overall increase of approximately 9% over the last two years. It is noteworthy that there is a 7% increase for license fees; significant increase for plan review fees are necessary to cover the costs of providing all activities required.

I. RECOMMENDATION/ACTION REQUESTED: The Department of Community and Family Services recommends the approval of Budget Modification **CFSD#6**. This modification requests a transfer of \$5,000 from General Fund Contingency to the Office of Community Action and Development Anti-Poverty/Housing Stabilization professional services budget to fund facilitation services to complete Phase I and Phase II of the East Multnomah County One Stop Career System.

II. BACKGROUND ANALYSIS: Since April 1996 the Private Industry Council has funded a facilitator for a Planning Team to design and implement a "One Stop Career System" in East Multnomah County. The idea is to develop a system whereby various agencies can provide linked information to employers and job seekers without forcing them to seek out and deal with individual programs to find what they need. The October 18 Draft Implementation Plan suggests the following list of basic services that a One Stop Career system in East County will provide:

- Customer - oriented information on careers
- Labor Market Information - Occupational demand and wages
- Information on the availability and quality of education and training programs
- Referrals to training services including both classroom and employer-based occupational skill development
- Testing, assessment, and evaluation
- Information on job openings and hiring requirements
- Job referrals
- Assistance with job search skills
- School-to-Work Services
- Employer Services
- Special Need and non-English speaking services
- Outreach and marketing

- Information on Eligibility and referral to needed supportive services programs available within the community. These include: housing, child care, family services, health and mental health.

The timeline for developing the system and a list of participants on the Planning Team is attached.

Private Industry Council funding for the project has run out. The contribution from Multnomah County will pay for facilitation of the planning process through February, the planned end of Phase II of the process.

III. FINANCIAL IMPACT: The \$5,000 is a one time contribution to the process. The transfer from General Fund Contingency is one of the ways the Board can address the issue of infrastructure support for workforce development which was included in the list of issues for the Board would entertain Contingency requests during 1996-97.

On your October 24th Board meeting agenda, there is a request for Contingency Reserve funding in the amount of \$5,000 to continue the planning work for the East Multnomah County One Stop Career System.

Consideration was given to using Strategic Investment Program funds, but it was decided to leave those funds for use in more specific SIP needs, and to not use those funds for the more general, workforce development efforts such as this.

You have already approved two Contingency Reserve items previous to this one, leaving a total of \$2,535,286 remaining in Reserve, and available for appropriation.



RE: Resolution Supporting the Transfer of Restrictive Language from the Current Floyd Light Park to the Reconfigured Floyd Light Park for the Purpose of Constructing the East Portland Community Center.

I. Recommendation/Action Requested:

Request that the Multnomah County Board of Commissioners pass a resolution consenting to a property exchange between David Douglas School District and the City of Portland for the purpose of constructing a community center, provided that restrictions placed on the property by the County be transferred along with the property.

II. Background Analysis:

In 1985 Multnomah County transferred Floyd Light Park with approximately 7.8 acres located on SE 111th Avenue to the City of Portland. As a part of that transfer the County included a restriction that the land be used for "park and recreation purposes, pump station site, or other uses approved by the Multnomah County Board of Commissioners only."

In April of 1995, pursuant to the recently passed City Parks Bond Measure, a Citizens Task Force was appointed by City Commissioner Hales to make recommendations on the site selection, program and design of the newly funded East Portland Community Center. That task force developed siting criteria and reviewed over 25 sites. The criteria included factors such as adequacy of access for all modes of transportation, demographics, including concentrations of low income families and seniors, site visibility, proximity to schools, and ability to develop the site in a fiscally responsible manner.

After months of deliberation the task force recommended three sites for further negotiation: Mill Park, Glendoveer, and Russellville. All three had significant obstacles that were insurmountable. However, during the negotiation process David Douglas School District proposed the transfer of land that would make the site adjacent to Floyd Light Middle School available. Task force members reviewed the site and found that it met their criteria very favorably. After two meetings, including an opportunity for neighborhood comment, the task force recommended the site and Commissioner Hales accepted that recommendation.

The project has been designed and developed over the past ten months with Portland Parks and Recreation, the Citizens Task Force, and architectural consultants Thompson Vaivoda. The focus of the Center will be on intergenerational activities including both active recreation and educational spaces. The building will include two classrooms, a senior-priority lounge, a multi-purpose room, gymnasium, aerobics/dance room, fitness room, outdoor courtyard and space for a future aquatics center. The project has benefited from partnerships with Loaves and Fishes and Multnomah County Aging Services, both making substantial contributions to serve the senior population.

The project requires that approximately five acres of Floyd Light Park be transferred to David Douglas School District in exchange for five acres of school property. The project requires the relocation of the school's running track and the development of a practice field. These site projects involve the removal of 29 trees, and the project will plant approximately 145 trees. The environmentally-zoned portion of the site will be preserved. The exchange would allow the community center to be built on SE 106th Street thus providing the appropriate access. This location is adjacent to the Middle School and across the street from the new East Portland Police Precinct. Both are highly complimentary uses. In addition the nearby Portland Adventist has proposed a 300-unit housing project with a focus on retirement housing.

The project has broad support from the David Douglas School District, Floyd Light students, teachers and parents, as well as the adjacent Hazelwood Neighborhood Association and many private residents. Opposition to the project has been voiced by Mill Park Neighborhood Association and adjacent residents. Currently the Conditional Land Use Permit has been approved by the City of Portland Bureau of Planning and has been appealed to City Council. The first City Council hearing was held October 2 and was continued to October 16 where the City Council denied the appeal and approved the land-use application.

Multnomah County has a role in the project based on the following land-use related topics. There is a 1985 deed restriction for Floyd Light Park stating that "the property shall be used by the Grantee for park and recreation purposes, or other uses approved by the Multnomah County Board of Commissioners only." The language in today's resolution describes the two properties to be exchanged and calls for the deed restriction to be transferred to the new park property.

There is also a 1985 agreement between the County and the City that calls for the City to abide by the findings and policies of the 1984 Multnomah County Parks Master Plan as it relates to Floyd Light Park and for the City to abide by the adopted concept plan for Floyd Light Park. No adopted concept plan outside the written master plan has been identified. That master plan includes supportive language including that any development plans for Floyd Light Park consider "opening the park site to the adjoining Floyd Light Middle School fields by removing the intervening fence and exploring joint park/school uses of the grounds and indoor recreational programming."

The current Hazlewood and Mill Park Adopted Neighborhood Plans list siting a community center as a number one priority. Passage of this resolution will support this community goal.

III. Financial Impact:

There is no financial impact on Multnomah County.

IV. Legal Issues:

There appear to be no legal restrictions. Please refer to the attached July 29, 1996 memo from Matt Ryan of County Counsel for a discussion of the legal issues.

V. Controversial Issues:

The only controversial issue surrounding Multnomah County's role in the property exchange is whether or not the County is willing to prevent the Center from being built by withholding consent to exchange the property.

A number of issues have been raised regarding building the Center on park land. For a thorough discussion of these issues please refer to the attached "Questions and Answers" document prepared by Janet Bebb of Portland Parks and Recreation on September 27, 1996. The questions were asked of Commissioner Collier at the September 10, 1996 meeting of the Mill Park Neighborhood Association.

VI. Citizen Participation:

The community center project has involved a Citizen Task Force of 15 members. They have held over 25 meetings which were advertised and open to the public. In addition, three public meetings and two open houses have been held on the project. When the Floyd Light Park site was selected an ad hoc neighborhood group was formed of adjacent property owners and residents. That group convened four times and made modifications to the project. The Mill Park Neighborhood Association and the Hazlewood Neighborhood Association have each had project reviews and held meetings to discuss the project. Testimony in favor and opposed to the project is anticipated.

VII. Other Government Participation:

The City of Portland.

At Commissioner Collier's request, I have attached to this memo a draft BCC Order relating to the Floyd Light Park Property. The County transferred the property to the City of Portland in 1985.

The subject of the proposed Order is the County's consent to a property exchange between the City and the David Douglas School District. The City desires to convey a portion of the Floyd Light Property to the District in exchange for School District Property.

The County conveyed the Floyd Light property to the City subject to the following restrictive language:

The above described property to be used by the grantee herein for park and recreational purposes, pump station site, or other use approved by the Multnomah County Board of Commissioners only.

The restriction is applicable to the City's successors and assigns.

In a February 15, 1996 memo to Commissioner Kelley, I addressed the rights retained by the County under the above quoted language in the 1985 deed. I advised

that if the County objected to the proposed transfer, the County could litigate the matter under a "right of entry" or a "breach of covenant" theory against the City. On the other hand, the Board's consent to the exchange of property would be consistent with the 1985 deed.

Commissioner Collier advises however, the District wants the Floyd Light property free and clear of any County interest. To accomplish this, in a way that is consistent with County objectives, the City and the District propose as follows: (1) similar restrictive language in the conveyance of the District's property to the City; and (2) delete the restrictive language from the deed conveying the Floyd Light property from City to District. The end result will be that the property the City acquires from the District would be subject to the restriction sought by the County, and the property the District acquires (the Floyd Light property) would be free of the restriction. See attached memo to Tanya Collier prepared by Janet Bebb for Charlie Hales.

We have reviewed the above proposal and concluded that it would be legally allowable. It appears consistent with ORS 275.330(2). The statute provides as follows:

In addition to the methods described in subsection (1) of this section, lands that have been set aside for county forest, public park or recreational area may be alienated, sold or conveyed, in part or in whole, by the public body upon a finding that it is in the best interest of the public. Upon a determination that an alienation, sale or conveyance is in the public interest, the lands set aside may be sold at a public or private sale, or other lands may be taken in exchange and set aside for park or recreational purposes. When a sale, an alienation or conveyance takes place, the proceeds shall be held for maintenance and improvement of existing park and recreation lands or future acquisition of lands to be set aside for park or recreational purposes. (Emphasis added)

The emphasized language establishes the authority of a governmental entity to exchange park property for other property, provided the property received in exchange by the government is used for park and recreational purposes. This is essentially what the City/District's proposal provides. The County would lose its ability to control the use of the Floyd Light property, but it would have that authority over the newly acquired City property.

The attached proposed Order expresses County consent to the exchange. It also releases the County right or interest in the exchanged portion of the original Floyd Light Property. Of course, the County's consent is conditional upon the execution of the proper deeds between the City and the District.

Questions and Answers on the East Portland Community Center Project

Prepared by Portland Parks and Recreation for
County Commissioner Tanya Collier, September 25, 1996

1. BOND PROCESS

How was the measure put on the ballot and what did the ballot measure say?

The ballot measure "Question" was: Shall Portland repair and improve 99 neighborhood parks by issuing \$58,800,000 in general obligation bonds? The "Summary" stated:

This measure would allow the City to issue bonds and use the money for 114 projects at 99 park sites. These projects would make public safety improvements: the City would fix worn out pools, paths, lights, restrooms, play areas, sports fields and fences. Old watering and heating systems would be replaced. The proposal will make these basic repairs, renovate the city's existing community centers, and do other capital construction and improvements.

These projects include improving parks Multnomah County recently gave the City. The funds would provide new soccer fields in Northeast Portland and in Southwest Portland. The City would also add a senior center and new community centers in East Portland and in Southwest Portland. All of the money will be spent for repairs and improvements, not for day-to-day park operations. The purpose of these projects is to expand the city's recreation choices for adults and for youth.

Prior to the election, the "Yes on #26-10 Campaign" distributed a list of the 114 park projects with a sentence description of each project. For the East Portland Community Center, the information stated: "Develop a new community center to provide inter-generational recreation and community facilities."

The Report to Council defined the need for and the nature of the proposed facility. This document was more detailed and was also available to the public. This report describes the proposed facility as follows: "This center includes a gymnasium with one regulation basketball court, a fitness center, senior center and other community meeting and services spaces. The center will be planned for a possible future addition of an outdoor, seasonal aquatics facility, and possibly also an indoor aquatics center. Ultimately, 200 parking spaces are planned....The new center will have the capacity to serve 800+ participants per day." Articles such as the "Initiative Watch" in *The Oregonian* also noted the "new community center (without a swimming pool) for outer Southeast Portland." No bond funds were planned to be spent on property acquisition.

Was it clear on the ballot that park lands would be used for community centers?

It was not clear where the community center would be located. Information was available to City Council that indicated the budget of approximately \$5,000,000 would be needed for the facility itself and a commitment had been made to use a citizens task force to recommend a site. Initial sites that were examined by the task force included park land, other public land that might be surplus, and undeveloped private property for a donation.

The size was not disclosed.

The size was not disclosed in the ballot, nor was it fixed. The budget amount and indication of a single facility, along with the program, suggested a building of not less than 20,000 square feet and not more than 40,000 square feet. People's knowledge of existing community centers could be used to anticipate the new facility. Mt. Scott is 25,000 sq. ft. in a 11.22 acre site, Matt Dishman is 30,000 sq.ft. in a 1.55 acre site and Montavilla is 15,000 sq.ft. in a 9.46 acre site.

2. SITE SELECTION AND PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT

What is the history on public involvement process and how was the site selected?

The public participation process included: public announcement of the project and opportunity to serve on the Citizens Task Force; appointment of the task force; telephone survey regarding needs, well-advertised public meetings to solicit input; regular project-specific newsletters; updates sent to neighborhood coalition newsletters and others as requested; presentation to neighborhood groups as requested; press releases and updates to community newspapers; and full meeting minutes sent to the East Portland District Coalition.

The task force held 15 publicly-advertised meetings that were working meetings. The format was typically for the working group to review information during the first 1.5 hour and hear comments from the audience during the last 15 minutes. Four larger public meetings were held; 3 newsletters were distributed during the siting process to a mailing list of several hundred people; and *The Oregonian* covered the process with 14 articles.

Who was on the task force if not immediate neighbors?

The task force is comprised of 15 individuals that were selected by Commissioner Hales from applications, and they were from various neighborhoods east of I-205. Members include:

 A. Kimura: Active in the Hazelwood Neighborhood

Why Floyd Light, why now? What was the overwhelming deciding factor?

The task force's first three preferences were Mill Park, Glendoveer, and Russellville. In their letter of recommendation to Commissioner Hales, the task force acknowledged that all three had unknown issues, including cost, to be considered and requested that should none of them work out the task force would reconsider. That turned out to be the case. The Mill Park site would require \$735,000 in property purchases and the Russellville site would require approximately \$1,500,000. Glendoveer was not available through a lease with Metro. Parkrose had ranked 4th, based on task force criteria, but was eliminated because it was considered too far north to effectively serve the majority of people east of I-205. And the fifth choice, Floyd Light Park with property purchased on Stark, was also not feasible due to property acquisition costs.

The proposed land exchange which would allow the construction of the community center adjacent to Floyd Light Middle School was seen as having tremendous potential for several reasons. The location on SE 106th Ave was approved by Portland Department of Transportation as meeting their requirements. The location was proximate to high densities in the area, including high concentrations of seniors, minorities, and low income families. In addition, this site is supportive of public policies, such as adequate bus service and location within the Gateway Regional Center. The cost of relocating the running track, \$200,000, was not prohibitive. And finally, siting adjacent to a middle school had specifically been requested by City Club because that age group is at a critical stage in needing positive activities.

The site was announced so quickly that there was no chance to respond by Floyd Light neighborhood.

The task force recommended the first three sites in late September, 1995. The three sites were investigated from late September through early November. On November 16th Commissioner Hales met with the task force and proposed the new Floyd Light site. The task force requested more information on cost and then met November 20th. The primary purpose of the November 20th meeting was to hear public comments on the proposed Floyd Light site. Approximately

35 appeared and many spoke at the meeting. Following comments, the task force voted 7 in favor of the site and 5, including the chair, opposed. The primary reason for those opposing the decision was not that the site was inappropriate but that sufficient time for neighborhood outreach had not happened. Staff communicated that feeling to the Commissioner who felt that the overall siting process had been lengthy and public participation had been sufficient.

Parkrose wants it, why not give it to them?

There was considerable discussion with Parkrose High School about incorporating the new community center into their development plans for a new high school and community center. Deciding factors against siting the facility there were that it was not geographically central; an emphasis on senior activities appeared not to be of special interest; and some felt a community center was promised by the Parkrose bond measure and that East Portland citizens would not be getting all that was promised.

Why not Russellville?

Russellville was favored by some, but not all, of the task force members. Those in favor cited the excellent transit service and Gateway plans. Those opposed cited the existing congestion of the area, lack of adjacent outdoor recreation activity space, and proximity to Montavilla Community Center. The site was actively pursued for a year, including negotiations with development teams lead by Gilman and Ragsdale and subsequently Wayne Rembold. In either case the cost of the land would need to be absorbed by the community center project and was estimated to be approximately \$1,500,000. The cost was too high to consider.

Why not at South Powellhurst?

The site referred to as South Powellhurst is the former David Douglas district office and is located on SE 122nd Avenue between Division and Powell. That site was not considered by the task force largely because it's fully utilized at this time. The building is used for a variety of functions and the site is used for the David Douglas bus garage, storage and maintenance shops. In order for this site to have been selected the current uses would have to be replaced at another location which would be costly.

Why not three smaller facilities; we weren't listened to?

At one of the early meetings it was suggested that rather than building one facility, three smaller facilities associated with the school districts should be built. It was suggested that residents identify with the schools and more locations would limit car travel. That suggestion was heard and staff researched the implications and presented them to the task force and public. It was discovered that construction costs would carry a premium of \$1,250,000 for duplicated space for entry, registration, etc. and that operations costs would be 25% or \$11,250,000 over the 50 year life of a building. The cost implications prevented the task force and the Parks Bureau

from pursuing this further. In addition, the task force had stated as an early goal that the community center should form a place where school district identities could be forgotten and a stronger community-wide identity fostered.

Janet Bebb said there would be nothing done at the corner of 111th and now there will be.

In the context of an outdoor meeting, the discussion was focused on the major project components including the building, the parking and the running track. Ms. Bebb indicated that there would be no construction at the upper field and then subsequently explained that trees would need to be removed for a practice field. The intent of the comment was that no building construction would take place at that location. At no time in the process has there been intentional misrepresentation of plans, however, plans evolve over time and statements and questions can be interpreted out of context.

It was a shabby process and citizens were not listened to. Citizens were not received with courtesy; meetings were at a time when citizens can't come.

Citizens were listened to. Meetings were well publicized and between 5 - 25 people attended the task force meetings with some meetings drawing as many as 80 - 90 residents. Everyone who wanted to was allowed to speak. The task force did not always agree with comments, suggestions or proposals that were raised by the public, but they certainly listened. Citizens were received with courtesy unless comments were sufficiently discourteous to warrant a different approach.

The task force meeting time was discussed and 4:30 pm to 6:30 pm was determined to be the best compromise. People who work preferred later evening meetings; seniors, who constituted a large proportion of the task force and audience, preferred a day-time meeting. Large public meetings were held on Saturdays during the day which generally is convenient for more people. The two City Council meetings and the Planning Bureau Hearing were held during the day but written testimony was accepted in both cases for those who could not attend.

3. TRAFFIC CONCERNS

Is the community center auto oriented?

People will arrive at the community center by car, Tri-met bus, Tri-met van, school buses, bicycle, and walking. All travel modes were reviewed during the site selection process and can be accommodated at the Floyd Light site. Nevertheless the majority of patrons will drive. Tri-met estimates that 47.9% take transit for commuting but only 4.4 % take transit for recreation. So it's important that the community center location be able to be reached conveniently by car. Nevertheless, a strong effort will be made to encourage people to take advantage of the bus routes nearby, including making bus schedule information available and providing a free return bus ticket to community center patrons with a valid bus ticket or transfer slip for a trial period.

Why 102 parking spaces? Will parking be a problem? If so how will it be addressed?

Portland Department of Transportation requires all parking to be handled on-site. The number of parking spaces needed was calculated by traffic engineers from Kittelson Association and based on existing conditions at Matt Dishman. Effort was made to propose adequate but not excessive number of parking spaces. In order to review the effectiveness of the parking, a joint committee representing the community center, Floyd Light Middle School, the East Police Precinct and neighbors will be convened bi-annually for the first two years to review any problems that arise and propose solutions.

School buses won't be able to get in and out of the school.

School buses arrive and departure during two, twenty minute intervals around 8:00 am and 3:00 pm. These times are not expected to conflict with community center peak usage and the driveway to Floyd Light will be designed for easy bus maneuvering. The installation of signals at both the SE Washington and SE Stark crossings of SE 106th plus a new right-turn lane will actually improve the existing line up of school buses.

There will be increased traffic on 106th. Worried about traffic increase.

Yes traffic will increase but delays are not expected. Today, during the afternoon rush hour SE 106th has 44 second delays at the Washington Street intersection and 9 second delays at the Cherry Blossom intersection. After the community center is opened, and including the Police Precinct and housing traffic, SE 106th will have 5 second delays at the new signal at Washington Street and 9.5 second delays at the existing signal at Cherry Blossom.

Where are people going to park to get to the soccer fields? Will there be residential permit parking?

People will be asked by the community center and the school to park in the parking lots, and several parking spaces were added that are very close to the track and field. Nevertheless some people may park along SE 111th Avenue which is a public right of way and they have a right to do that. Excessive use of this or problems that arise will be discussed in the parking/traffic committee mentioned above.

In order for the area to set up a parking permit program the proposed area must consist of a minimum of 40 block faces or 8,000 lineal feet of curb space and the City must agree that parking spaces in the area will be 75% occupied at least four days per week and nine months per year. Should this program be applicable the neighborhood association can apply for it through a petition with signatures representing 50% of the affected addresses. For more information call the Bureau of Traffic Management at 823-5185.

What if I can't get in my driveway?

Ample parking is planned for the community center and on-street parking along SE 106th Avenue will remain available.

SE 106th is designated by the city as a local street, not a collector.

There are a wide range of specific roadway conditions found within each street designation and Portland Department of Transportation (P.D.O.T.) considers the designations as indications of use and not requirements. They review each proposed development based on the type of use as well as the precise dimensions and conditions of the particular street and connecting streets. P.D.O.T. found that SE 106th Avenue can accommodate the community center traffic. The street has room to include two-way traffic, bicycle lanes in both directions and on-street parking on both sides without modification to the current road width.

4. THE COMMUNITY CENTER ITSELF

What is involved in a community center and why can't we just use the new library?

The library will be a great community resource providing easy access to a wide variety of information as well as two meeting room spaces. The community center will provide very different resources. Active recreation, such as gym, fitness and dance spaces, will be used by all ages for a variety of functions. The multi-purpose room (seating 200) and two classrooms will be used for arts and crafts, community meetings, senior lunch programs, lectures, and social events such as weddings and dances. The library has two meeting rooms with capacities of 12 and 100. A sample of Parks programming for various community centers is enclosed as an example of what is possible. However, please note that the East Portland Community Center will schedule programs together with the community and will be unique to the needs of the area.

If Floyd Light is chosen what is the time frame to build it and how long will it take to get a community center if the siting process has to be repeated.

The Hearings Officer for the Conditional Land Use found that the project met all approval criteria. An appeal of that decision is expected to be heard at City Council October 2, 1996. If City Council confirms the Hearing Officer's decision building construction could begin in November. If the decision is overturned and the siting has to be repeated the process could be expected to take another year, and construction an additional year.

5. PARKS AND OPEN SPACE

This will take away our park and open space.

The 7.7 acres of land zoned as open space will not have buildings constructed on it and none of the wooded hillside will be developed. The community center and parking lot will be constructed on residentially-zoned land and will take up approximately 2.5 acres. Not in terms of zoning, but in terms of actual open space area, there will be 7.7 acres plus approximately 5 acres of the existing school land and the additional 4.6 acres of the reconfigured Floyd Light Park land.

Floyd Light Park will continue to be 7.7 acres and it will include the community center and associated parking. It will also include a sports court/grass area, ballfield, wooded hillside and the upper area along SE Salmon Street. Negotiations will continue to transfer 1.44 acres of the wooded hillside under David Douglas ownership to the park itself.

Public access to Floyd Light school grounds will be restricted and to the Christian School as well because it is private.

The practice of David Douglas School District, confirmed by Superintendent Dr. Russell, is to allow public use of school grounds except when areas are specifically needed for school activities. This is clear from the current use of the running track and practice area for jogging, dog walking, frisbee playing, etc. As with Parks jurisdiction, David Douglas may impose rules, such as picking up after your dog and excluding some inappropriate behaviors.

The Portland Christian Schools Elementary Campus was mentioned in the Staff Report and Recommendation to the Hearings Officer as being available for informal public use. This was an error. Staff at the Portland Christian School confirms that their site is not open to public use. However, it does function as visual green space. Parks deficiency was accurately described by John Sewell, Chief Planner for the Parks Bureau and that information is available.

Too many trees will be cut down.

Twenty-one trees will need to be cut down to accommodate the track and field, practice field and sidewalk required along SE 111th Avenue. These range from specimen Douglas fir trees to old, declining fruit trees. Removing trees is never done lightly. However, the community center project is important. It will serve many generations to come and will become a strong resource for community members of all ages. The project will plant more than 129 trees on site and all existing trees that can be saved will be protected during construction. Approximately 45 of the new trees will be planted in the open space area to the east of the two buildings. The entire planting is a significant addition to the diversity of Portland's urban forest.

What about the lack of park space in East County?

The Floyd Light neighborhood is not in a parks deficient area. There is, however, a lack of park

space in certain areas, including north of Stark and Washington in the Hazelwood Neighborhood. The Hazelwood Neighborhood Association land use committee is in favor of the project. Portland Parks and Recreation will continue to work on finding new sites in deficient areas. At the same time, the East Portland area is clearly deficient in community centers and publicly accessible active recreation opportunities. This has been an identified need for years, and increased density will bring with it an even stronger need for community center services.

The Park Bureau has no respect for our public land and they are building on it all over the city.

Individual citizens may disagree with specific projects and that is their right. One of our strengths is a strong public process. At the same time, Portland has one of the best park systems in the country and Portland Parks and Recreation have been conscientious stewards of the system since the mid-1800's. The only buildings that are routinely accepted in parks are community centers, restrooms, concession buildings, and maintenance buildings. This has been true since the first community center was built in a park in 1915, and continues to be true today. Buildings that have exceptional community value, or provide a site-specific function are also allowed. Examples of this would be the Children's Museum, Japanese Garden building, Zoo buildings, and the Hoyt Arboretum visitor center.

6. OTHER NEIGHBORHOOD ISSUES

What about the liveability of the immediate neighborhoods? Will property values go down?

There will be a new facility to absorb visually primarily from SE 106th Avenue, and to a lesser extent from the surrounding open space. No excessive impacts from noise, glare from lights, odors, litter, privacy and safety issues are anticipated. Many of the neighborhoods around existing community centers cherish them as assets and there is no evidence that it will reduce property values.

Will additional people in the neighborhood cause a rise in crime?

No. The community center itself will add more eyes on the park and school grounds.

How will this impact taxes, the sewer system, Cherry Blossom and 106th?

It is difficult to predict how property taxes will be impacted. Individual tax lots and their improvements are typically appraised every six years with tax rates based on sales of comparable properties. It is possible that the amenity of having a nearby community center will increase the value of homes in the neighborhood. The value of the residences on SE 106th near Washington and Stark is higher because they are on commercially zoned parcels near major streets and commercial developments that can be profitably redeveloped

regardless of the community center.

The sanitary sewer system in this area has adequate capacity to serve the community center. The storm water system is actually a series of drywells which replenish the groundwater rather than a system of pipes sending the water elsewhere. These will accommodate at least a 25 year storm and actually decrease the overall site run-off during any greater storm event. In the event of very large events, the entire site is graded to drain to a dry retention area which is larger than the existing on-site storm water storage capacity.

Inquiries by Parks staff and engineers regarding the ponding at SE Cherry Blossom Drive and SE 106th found that there are four drywells in the street which were inherited from Multnomah County which built the street about 20 years ago. The Maintenance section of the Bureau of Environmental Services has agreed to inspect and clean them this month. Since community center staff and visitors will use these streets and sidewalks, the Parks Bureau will join the neighbors in seeing that necessary improvements are made.

If the land swap occurs the ball fields will be 50 feet from someone's window.

The running track will be 50 feet from the nearest residential lot. This is allowed by the Zoning Code, but to mitigate the impact neighbors have been consulted on screening. At present an earth mound with native tree and shrub plantings is planned to help buffer the activity on the track. The football field spectator area will be over 275 feet from the nearest house and the ball field will be over 500 feet. It should also be noted that track and field activity are for the middle school, and the area will not be lighted for night-time games.

There is too much development going on.

There is a lot going on. The East Police Precinct will be completed soon, multi-family housing will be constructed, the Oregon College of Oriental Medicine plans to expand and the Portland Adventists are planning a new development with housing nearby. One of the reasons this is happening at this location is the Outer Southeast Plan proposed concentrating density in the nearby Gateway area and the plan was accepted. In the face of the need for housing and the related services one of the few choices is to plan specific areas for that growth's distribution.

7. MISCELLANEOUS QUESTIONS

Tanya Collier and Charlie Hales are in collusion to change the wording in the Master Plan.

Tanya and Charlie are working together to craft language that will protect the park.

Did the Chairman of the siting committee, Richard Cooley, profit from selling the property for the new police station and combining it with the community center and parking?

Absolutely not. The sale of the Police Precinct property was completed in September 1995, at the same time the task force recommended Mill Park, Glendoveer and Russellville. The sale of the property was never contingent upon parking, and the suggestion is highly inappropriate.

It is clear that the parking situation for the Police Precinct has caused considerable confusion. Originally the land use permit required that the City find 25 parking spaces either to construct or to enter into a shared parking agreement for the community room in the East Precinct. General Services, the City bureau in charge, felt they could obtain shared parking with either Floyd Light School, the shopping mall or the Oregon College of Oriental Medicine. During this period the Outer Southeast Plan re-zoned the Police Precinct to CX. Under this zoning the Police Precinct does not have to provide any parking at all, and technically that remains the case. At the same time, Parks agreed that, if it could be accomplished without detriment to the community center project, they would form a partnership with the Police Precinct to provide shared parking for the community room. By about June of this year it was determined that it would work and that agreement is being finalized.

The site selection process for the East Portland Community Center was concerned with primarily with transportation and serving East Portland residents. This process took many dedicated hours of thought by much-appreciated volunteers including Mr. Cooley. To suggest that the lack of parking spaces for another project was the deciding factor is to completely miss the complexity and importance of the process.

The community center is against the Mill Park plan.

Mill Park Neighborhood Plan in policy #3, Parks and Public Spaces, lists as an objective to "Attract a community center to the neighborhood or in surrounding areas to provide recreational and social activities for residents of the area." This is one of a number of objectives, and it is strong enough that Parks, the Planning Bureau and the Hearing's Officer felt the community center is in keeping with the Mill Park plan.

The City can change open space land use designation any time it wants; don't trust City's word.

What does an open space designation mean and how difficult is it to change use - lots of input.

Floyd Light Middle School is already at a maximum size and capacity for its age group and these students will always need outdoor play areas. If the school ever wished to expand it would be more likely to build adjacent to the existing building. Any such change would require a conditional use application for the R-zoned property. If the school ever wished to sell some portion of OS zoned land, it would have to apply for a zone change and Comprehensive Plan amendment. This process would take about four months beginning with a pre-application conference, an land use application, and a public hearing before a Hearings Officer. The

Hearings Officer would make a recommendation rather than a decision, and then City Council would hold another public hearing and make a decision.

The conditional use permit was not given to the Police Precinct until the collusion with Floyd Light site selection.

The Conditional Land Use Permit was granted for the Police Precinct project on July 27, 1995. One condition of approval by the Hearings Officer was that 25 parking spaces be made available for the community meeting room. An amendment to that conditional use was subsequently requested for the adjacent housing project which was proposed to be constructed on potential parking spaces. Due to a zoning change effective with approval of the *Outer Southeast Plan* on March 25, 1996, prior conditions of approval no longer applied and the project could proceed without the parking unless appealed. After discussions with the Hazelwood Neighborhood Association, General Services pledged to find the parking spaces and has pursued an agreement with Portland Parks and Recreation. If the community center is not built, General Services would continue to pursue agreements with Floyd Light Middle School and the mall.

Seniors will not be permitted to use the community center on weekends.

Not true. Programming for the facility will be developed with the community, including seniors. The schedule will be tailored to the needs and demand of the community.

Major problems with kids getting to school because of the traffic.

As part of the community center project a pedestrian safety island will be constructed in SE Washington and SE Stark at approximately SE 108th Avenue. Currently this is a very dangerous location and has been cited repeatedly by Floyd Light Middle School as a problem. The new island will include pedestrian cross-walks and will greatly improve safety in crossing here. There will also be a new cross-walk across SE 106th Avenue between the Police Precinct and the Floyd Light driveway.

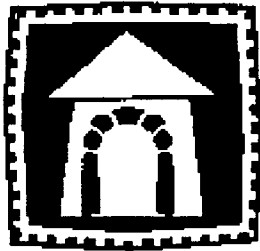
No stop lights at 106th and Stark as promised.

Plans are proceeding to install traffic signals on SE 106th at both the Washington and Stark intersections. Funding for the project which, together with the pedestrian island project totals \$450,000, is being sought by several City bureaus jointly, including Portland Department of Transportation, the Parks Bureau, and General Services. Assuming funds are successfully assembled the lights will be installed in 1997.

There's been a lot of talk lately about a new Community Recreation Center for East Portland.

What is it? How was the site selected? What kinds of services will it provide? Have community concerns been addressed in its design? The new center will be discussed at October meetings of the Portland City Council and Multnomah County Commission.



What's this all about?

When Portland voters approved the 1994 \$58.8 million bond measure for park improvements, the dream of a community

center to serve East Portland moved one step closer to reality. The measure specified that the \$4.5 million facility was to be sited east of I-205, bringing recreation programs and services to the East Portland community. Bond funds were to be used for the facility itself, not land purchase.

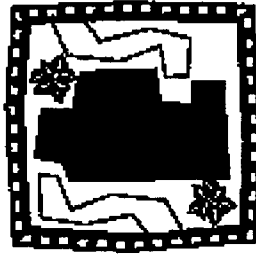
Since April 1995, a 15 member Citizens Task Force, appointed by Parks Commissioner Charlie Hales, has assisted in developing recommendations on siting and design of the new facility. As a part of their process, three public meetings and two informational open houses were held. The Task Force continues to meet on design and programming issues.



What will the center include?

The facility incorporates both community spaces and active recreation facilities - all connected by a central courtyard

that opens to the adjacent park. The building includes classrooms, a multi-purpose room with kitchen, senior-priority lounge, preschool room, gymnasium, fitness room, dance/aerobics room, and locker rooms. An indoor pool is proposed as a future addition.

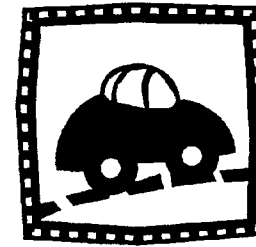


How was the site selected?

The site selection process began in April, 1995. The Citizens Task Force developed a detailed set of criteria and

then reviewed over 25 sites, narrowing the list as they went. Eventually, in November of 1995, they recommended a site *next to Floyd Light Middle School - directly across the street from the new East Portland Police Precinct on SE 106th Avenue between Washington and Cherry Blossom*. Important criteria leading to this recommendation included adequate roads and the availability of public transit, as well as demographics and the ability of the community center to effectively serve East Portland residents.

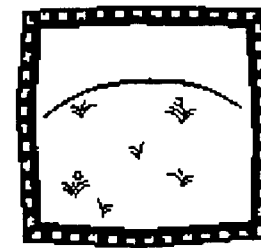
How are community concerns being addressed in the plan?



Traffic Issues

The new center will result in improvements that will make it much safer for pedestrians to cross busy Washington and Stark Streets at S.E.

106th Avenue. The Community Center and other development on SE 106th Avenue are expected to increase traffic. The major problem area was identified by the community as the intersections of SE 106th Avenue with Washington and Stark Streets. In response, City departments are joining together to fund two new traffic signals. In addition, a new pedestrian island will be constructed where Stark and Washington merge at SE 108th Avenue. Off-street parking included in the Center design will augment parking available at Floyd Light Middle School and provide additional parking resources for the Police Precinct across the street.



Has open space been sacrificed?

Floyd Light Park is about 7.79 acres now and will be 7.79 acres in the future. A property trade with David Douglas School

District will reconfigure the property lines to

allow the Center to be sited on 106th Avenue. The Community Center and parking will take approximately 2.5 acres of the reconfigured park. The new park will include the existing wooded hillside parkland, and a future ballfield. Directly adjacent will be Floyd Light school yard with the relocated track and field. This will provide 9.6 acres of open space that is also accessible to the public. In order to accomplish the project, 21 trees will be cut (the wooded hillside will not be affected). In conjunction with construction, 129 new trees will be planted.

When will the center be built?

Required City and County hearings are scheduled for October. Approval of the project at these meeting will allow project construction to begin in November of this year. Construction will occur over an 8 - 12 month period - with the Community Center opening scheduled in the fall of 1997.

? *What's left to decide?*

Before construction can begin, both the City Council and County Commission hearings will be held on the project.

1. Come to the ***City Council Hearing - October 2, 2:00 pm, Portland Building 1120 SW Fifth, Second Floor.***

The East Portland Community Center project requires a Land Use Permit and that

application has been approved by the Planning Bureau. However, the decision is expected to be appealed to City Council, which will make the final decision for the City. During the City Council Hearing, testimony in support and against the project will be heard.

2. ***Attend the County Commission Hearing - October 24, 9:30 am, 6th Floor County Courthouse, 1021 SW 4th.***

The Community Center project requires a land exchange that involves Multnomah County. Approximately five acres of David Douglas land at Floyd Light Middle School is proposed to be exchanged for approximately five acres of City of Portland Floyd Light Park. The exchange will allow the Community Center to be constructed along 106th Avenue. The County Commission will vote on a resolution that facilitates this exchange and will hear testimony in favor and against the project.

Check out the new Community Center. The model will be on display at the new Midland Library during the month of October.

SUBJECT: East Portland Community Center - Citizen Task Force Members

The Citizen Task Force has been the primary vehicle for public participation in recommending a site for the new community center, as well as making recommendations on facility programs and design. Commissioner Hales appointed the task force in March 1995 and it includes fifteen people. Appointments were made based on a combination of factors. Some members were appointed due to their history of participation in East Portland neighborhoods, and some were appointed based on special skills or geographic location.

Dick Cooley, Chair: Dick is a real estate investor raised in the east side and a graduate of David Douglas High School with long-time ties to the area. He is a past member and chairman of the Planning Commission.

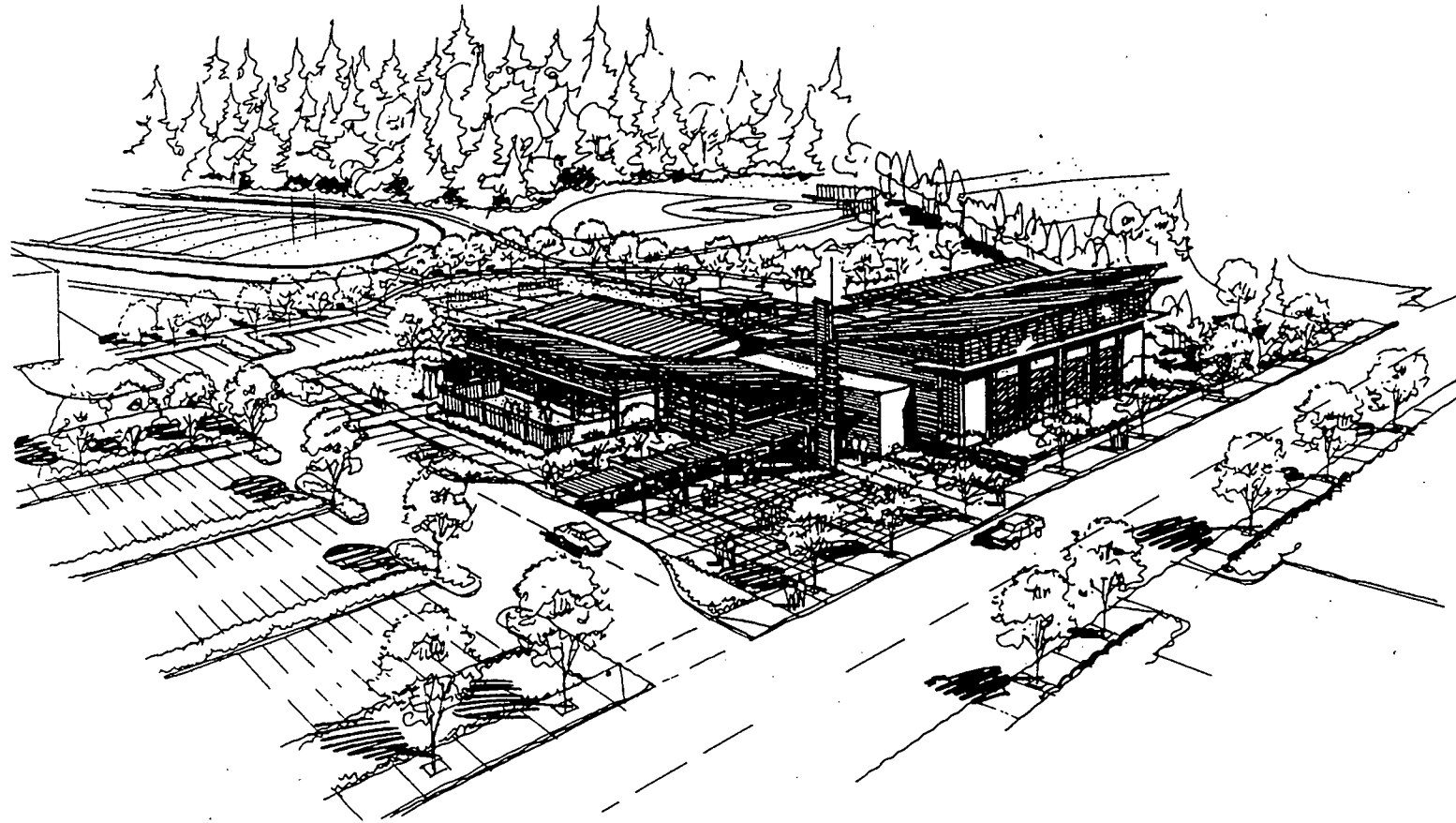

What will the center look like?

- ▶ The center will be built up in scale at the street to create a strong urban presence on 106th Avenue.
- ▶ The mass of the center is broken down on the park and ballfield side to create a softer scaled-down appearance to the east.
- ▶ The courtyard will be more intimate in scale, with views across the sports lawn and track to the hillside beyond.
- ▶ A liberal use of glass will allow the center's activities to be visible to the street and give it an inviting nature.
- ▶ Brick will be a major exterior material, relating the center to the new police precinct and giving it the dignity of a public building.
- ▶ The building and the landscape will be integrated as much as possible through the use of covered walkways and the courtyard.
- ▶ The roof forms will slope toward the courtyard, reducing the scale at the park side of the building.

Introducing the new

East Portland Community Center

In November of 1994 Portland voters approved the Park's Improvement Bond Measure which included funds to build a new community center in East Portland. The new center will be located on SE 106th, just south of Stark, next to Floyd Light Middle School.

Background

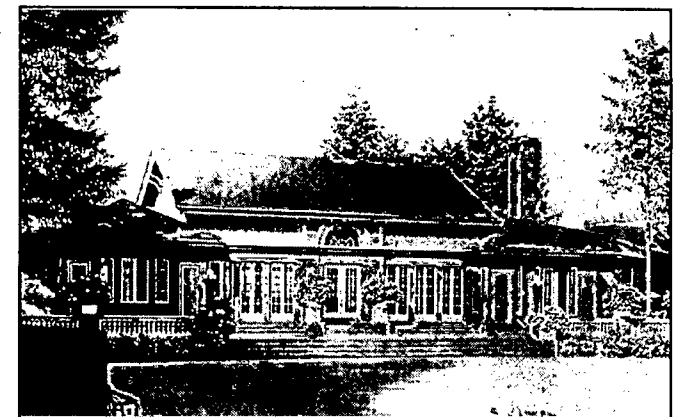
When Portland voters approved the \$58.8 million bond measure for parks improvements, the dream of a community center to serve East Portland moved one step closer to reality.

The bond measure specified that the \$4.5 million facility was to be sited east of I-205, bringing recreation programs and services to the East Portland community. Since April 1995, a 14-member Citizens Task Force, appointed by Parks Commissioner Charlie Hales, has assisted in developing recommendations regarding first the siting and later the design of the new facility.

Portland's Community Centers

Portland's highly prized parks and recreation system includes 200 parks and 50 recreation sites spread throughout the city. As the single largest recreation provider in the region, Portland Parks & Recreation's programs serve thousands of citizens each year.

Through its community centers and other community programs, Portland Parks & Recreation offers over 2,000 classes and

activities every season. Whether you are interested in shooting hoops, attending parent/toddler activity classes, or sharpening your ballroom dancing skills, people of all interests, ages and abilities can find lots to do.

Portland's community center tradition dates back to 1913, when the very first center was built in Peninsula Park. Eight decades later, Portland Parks operates 10 community centers throughout the city. They serve as hubs of activity, providing a place for the community to learn, exercise, and socialize.

The Site: It's a running track now but . . .

The new center will be located on SE 106th, just south of Stark, next to Floyd Light Middle School and across the street from the new East Portland Police Precinct.

The trade. Floyd Light Middle School property is adjacent to Floyd Light Park. The community center siting involved a property trade with David Douglas School District: five acres of park land for five acres of adjacent school property. This makes it possible to build the new center on 106th and share parking with both the school and the precinct.

The track. The running track, which is now adjacent to 106th, will be relocated as a part of the project. The new track will be east of the Community Center and oriented NE to SW. A football field will continue to be located in the middle of the track. The track relocation costs will be paid by the City of Portland.

The park. The wooded hillside on the south side of the park remains parkland. The portion of the park property transferring to the school district will continue to be zoned open space. It will be used by the school for athletics and other outdoor activities.

What will the center include?

The floor plan
The floor plan is arranged with community service spaces to the north and recreation activities to the south. A central courtyard serves as the heart of the building, opening out

to the park and open space and accommodating a range of community events and activities.

Community Spaces

In this wing, visitors will find a lounge, which will be available for senior programs as well as other activities. Across the hall, the multi-purpose room can seat 200 people but can also be divided into three smaller rooms for classes, meetings, etc. The multi-purpose room faces the courtyard and allows for activities within this space to spill outdoors during good weather. A kitchen is directly adjacent to the multi-purpose room.

The child care room, with its adjacent outdoor play area, provides space for regular preschool programs as well as drop-in child care for people using the center.

The Active Recreation Wing includes a gymnasium, aerobics/dance room, a fitness room, and lockers. In the future, an indoor swimming pool will be added and the locker rooms expanded.

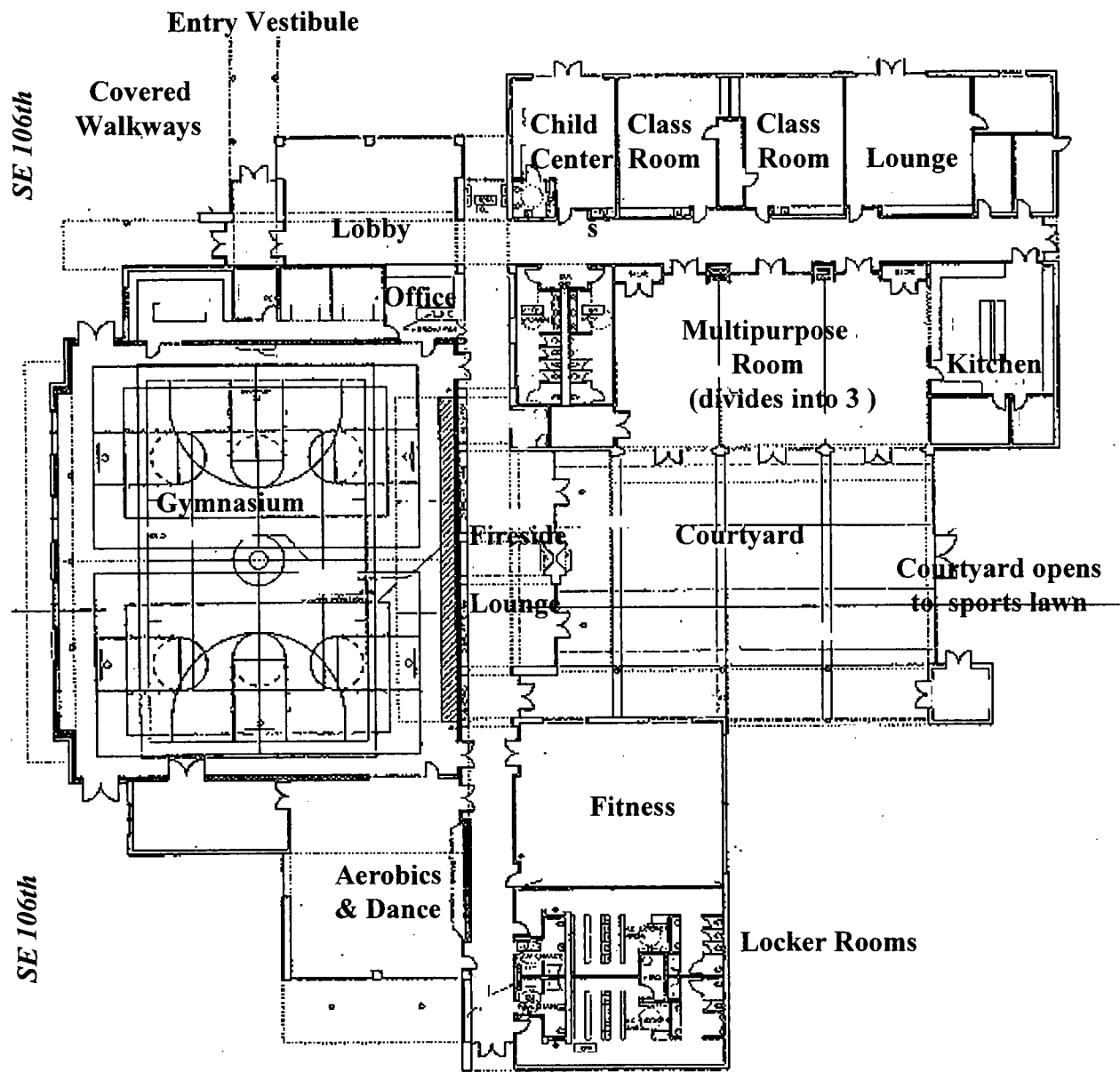

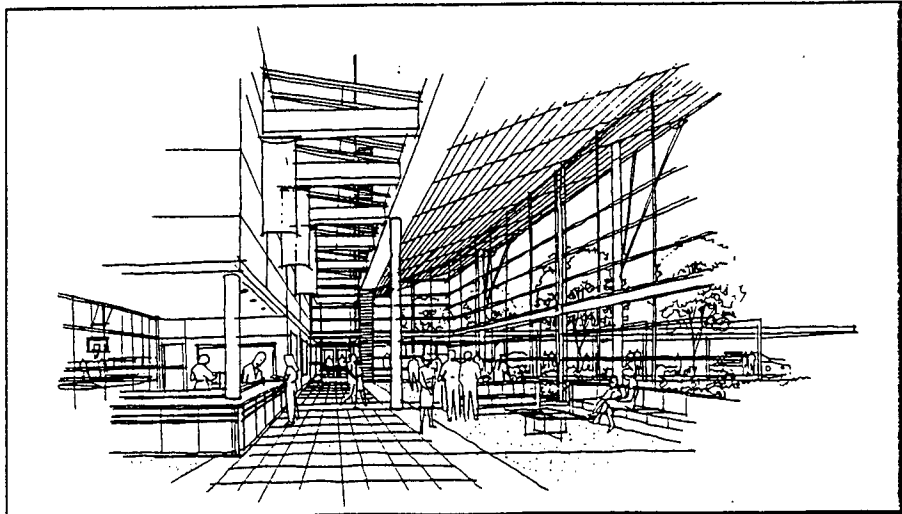

By the end of 1997, East Portland will be celebrating the grand opening of a new multi-generational community center, made possible with passage of the Parks Improvement Bond Measure in November of '94. This newsletter will be published periodically to keep interested citizens up-to-date on plans for the new facility.

Shared Parking with East Precinct

One of the concerns arising from development of the East Police Precinct has related to a lack of public parking. Because of recent zoning changes, parking was not required by code. However, the City, the neighborhood, and commercial neighbors all agree that the additional parking, previously required, is still desirable. When the community center was sited across the street from the new precinct, Portland Parks & Recreation expressed a willingness to share parking with the precinct. Now that the schematic site plan is complete, a joint parking agreement is being developed. The current discussion involves expansion of the Community Center's parking lot to add twelve additional spaces, which would be paid for by General Services.

Thirteen other spaces would be made available for precinct use during the community center's non-peak hours. The agreement has been approved in principle and will be included in the community center's land use permit application.

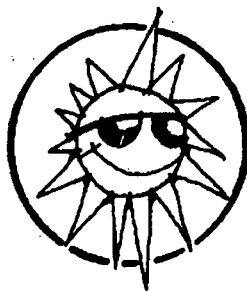
Cultural Diversity is a goal . . .

Next Task Force Meeting

The Citizen Task Force will not meet again until the Conditional Land Use Application has been reviewed by the Planning Bureau and they have made their recommendations prior to the Land Use hearing. During this period, the architects will continue to develop the design, including materials selections. Any significant modifications to the building, including those necessitated by budget constraints, will be discussed at the next meeting of the Citizens Task Force. Potential art projects may also be discussed at that meeting.

Please note: Because we don't know when the Staff Report containing the Planning Bureau's recommendations will be available, we cannot schedule the next Task Force meeting at this time. We anticipate that it will be held in early July. Please give our office a call to confirm the date and time if you wish to attend the meeting: 823-5588 or 823-2223 V/TT.

Traffic Improvements

Whenever new development occurs, associated infrastructure improvements are usually required as a condition of the building permit. The type and extent of these improvements are based, in part, on the nature of the new facility. One of the primary concerns relates to pedestrian, mass transit, and vehicle access.

Portland's Department of Transportation required that the new community center provide specific improvements to assure safe pedestrian access - especially as it related to crossing Stark and Washington at 108th. These costs were anticipated and the facility's construction budget includes \$100,000 to create crossing islands and provide crosswalks near 108th. The crossing will be striped, include overhead warning signs as well as warning signs upon approach. It will serve both Floyd Light Middle School and Community Center users.

While the Citizen Task Force understood the need for improvements at 108th, they argued that a traffic light at Stark and Washington at 106th Avenue was also necessary for crossing safety. Without it, they felt seniors and children would be deterred from coming to the community center. Because the Task Force felt so strongly about the need for expanded traffic improvements, staff took the issue back to the Parks managers. As a result, Parks Commissioner Charlie Hales scheduled a meeting with the bureaus of Transportation, General Services (Police Precinct), and Parks to explore a variety of options for funding all the traffic improvements - approximately \$400,000 - \$500,00 in all.

It didn't take long for all parties to agree that the community would be best-served if the City could find a way to add the signals at 106th. In the end, the Transportation Bureau agreed to provide \$100,000 from their special fund for traffic calming near middle schools. Parks will provide \$100,000 for pedestrian improvements

as originally planned. The balance of the funding has been committed by General Services.

At their May 6 meeting, the Citizens Task Force expressed appreciation for the additional efforts taken to address their concerns. "On the contrary," responded Zari Santner, Supervisor of the Parks & Recreation Bond Project Team, "we should be thanking you. You encouraged us to go beyond the basic code requirements, to explore other alternatives. Your ability to see the big picture and your understanding of broader community needs has significantly improved the project."

Conditional Use Schedule

The Conditional Use Permit was submitted during the first full week in May. The application will be examined to be certain it is complete and then the review process begins. Community notification will take place in June and it is expected that the hearing will be scheduled for sometime in July. A decision is expected within 17 days after the hearing.

Project Progress

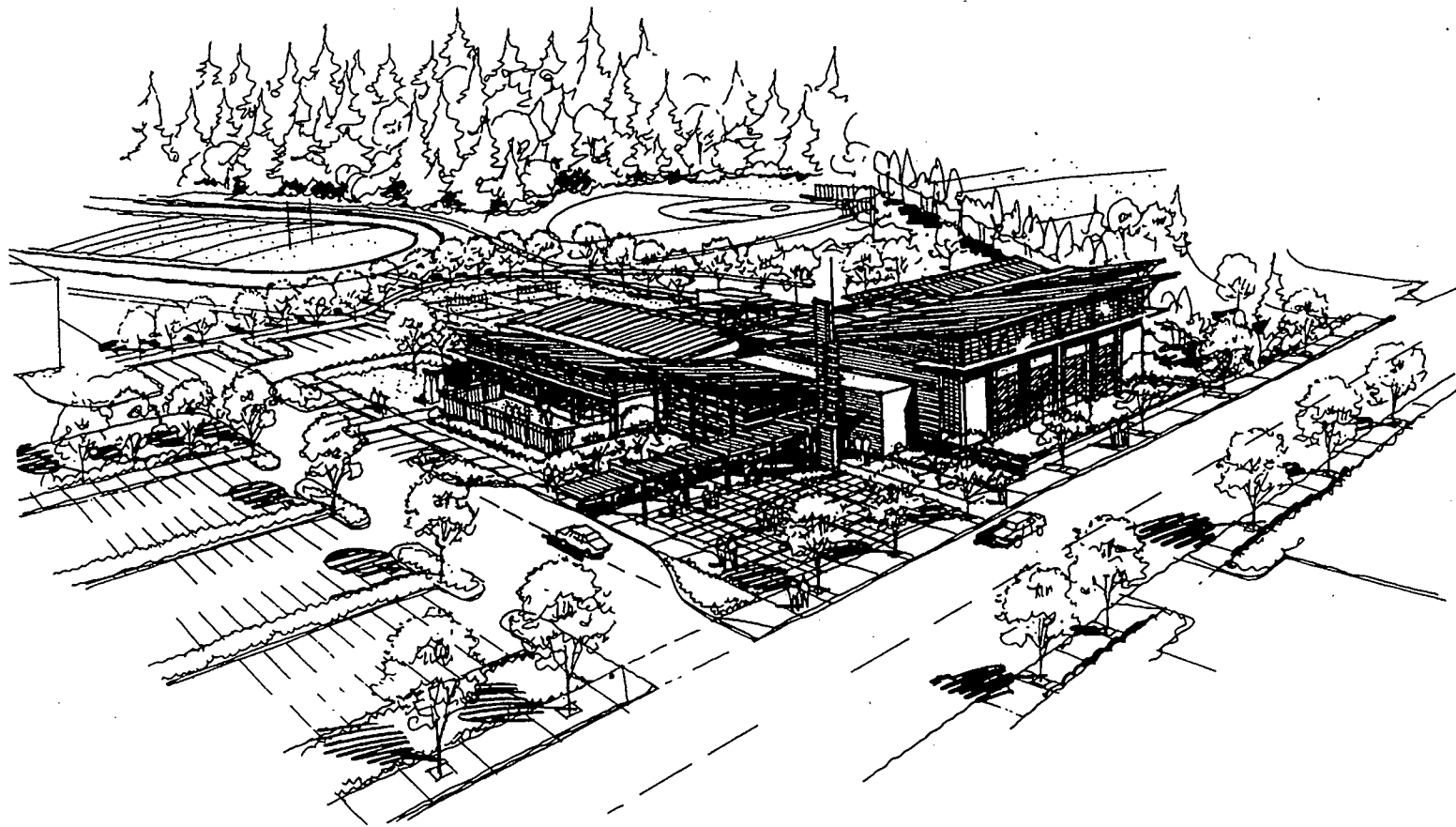
Comments from members of the Citizens Task Force, students at Floyd Light Middle School, faculty and staff of the school and school district, parks & recreation staff (maintenance & recreation), etc. have been incorporated into the schematic design. Now the architects are working on "design development". That's when specific decisions regarding all details of the design, including materials and furnishings, are made. The project will be in the design development and construction document phase for approximately three - four months.

Views Aired at Council Informal

At a February 13th informal session of the Portland City Council people gathered to explain their views on both the Southwest and East Portland Community Center. Mayor Katz and Commissioners Hales, Blumenauer and Lindberg were present. Charles Jordan, Portland Parks & Recreation Director, opened the meeting by introducing the Citizen Task Force chairs who, in turn, introduced their members. Each task force explained the process they went through and defended the logic of their siting recommendation.

Next, three community members in favor of each siting and three opposed to each siting presented their arguments. For the East Portland project, Sharon Owens, George Martin, and Maura White spoke in favor of the siting, while Rose Marie Opp, Sami Jo Cayo, and Craig Rogers presented the opposing point of view. Following these presentations, the floor was open to anyone wishing to speak. There were many noteworthy speakers both in favor and opposed to the site selections and the meeting was extended an additional hour to hear as many as possible. At the

end of the meeting, with many people still wishing to speak, Mayor Katz said she would consider how to proceed. Several days later she extended the session to February 28th. This gave an opportunity for people who had signed up previously to testify. Others were invited to testify as well. At the conclusion of the extended informal session the Council majority opinion was to forgo a formal hearing, and next hear the issues during the Conditional Land Use Permit process.

Preliminary Design Unveiled at February 10th Open House

Thirty six people signed in at the February 10th Open House on Community Center Design, which was held in the breezeway at the David Douglas School District Administration Building. The day was clear and bright - a welcome relief after several weeks alternating from wind to snow to ice to flooding.

The purpose for the open house was to gather information from the public about the proposed site and landscape plans for the facility, as well as to obtain feedback on specific architectural characteristics. At seven stations, Parks & Recreation staff and members of the design team provided background information and answered questions. At three of the stations participants completed response cards related to the information presented. Stations included General Orientation, Site Plan, Landscape Plan, Traffic, Architectural Style, Architectural Program, and the Art Component. At an eighth station, participants were *(continued on page 2)*

asked to complete an overall survey. The survey asked how effectively the site plan responds to issues and concerns expressed by the community during the siting process.

While those attending the meeting spent quite a bit of time talking with consultants and reviewing the plans, participation was low in completing both the response cards and the survey. On average, the responses to the question cards was less than a third of the participants and only four surveys were returned. While Parks & Recreation staff and members of the design team were disappointed in the number of responses, they were pleased with the positive reception the designs received.

People were asked to respond to characteristics of both the site plan and landscape plan. There were eleven responses to this card - all favorable except for *Characteristic 1: the location of a potential softball/little league field near the wooded hillside.* This characteristic was split evenly between those who liked it and those who did not. Participants felt very positive about *Characteristic 2: the courtyard space, which could be used for a variety of functions from outdoor recreation classes to outdoor dining.*

The architectural program showed the floor plan and room arrangement. The gym is situated near 106th and the courtyard space opens to the park side of the building. The responses were again quite favorable.

With regard to the architectural styles questions, people generally liked the openness that the use of glass creates and were especially in favor of the courtyard space. Responses to illustrations of the lobby space and facility cross-section were also very positive.

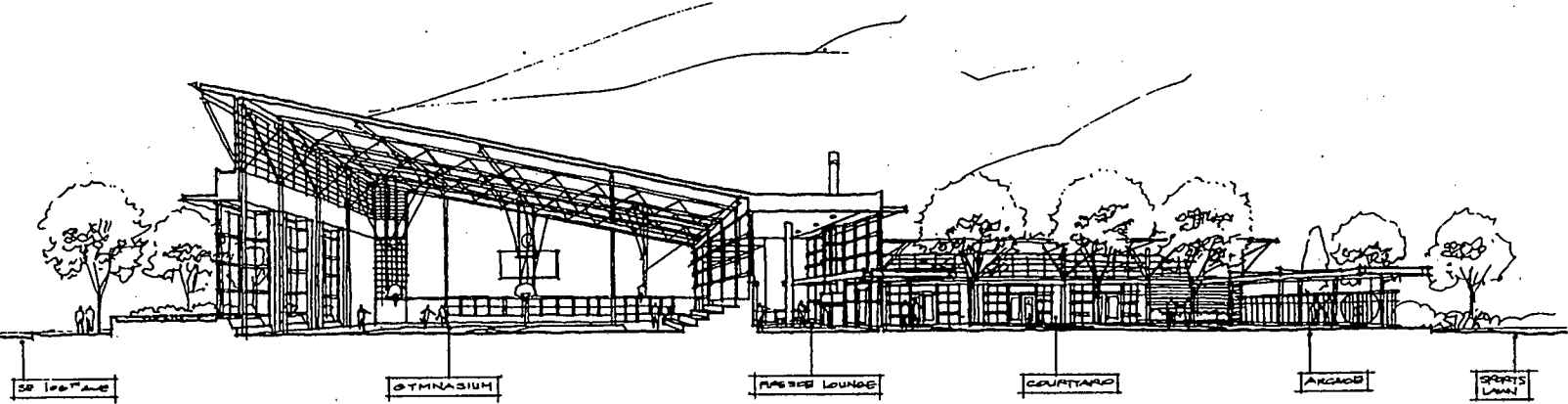
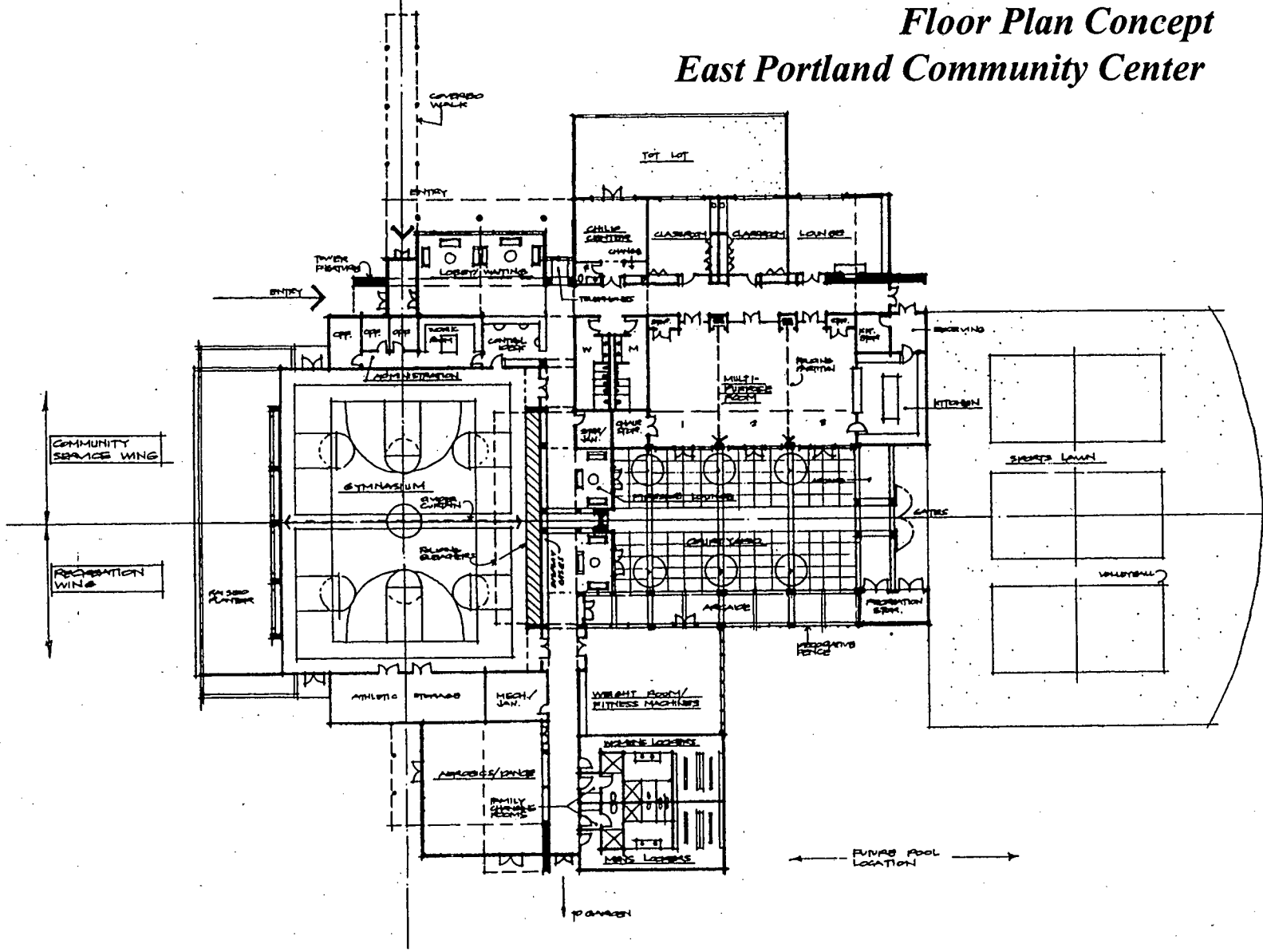

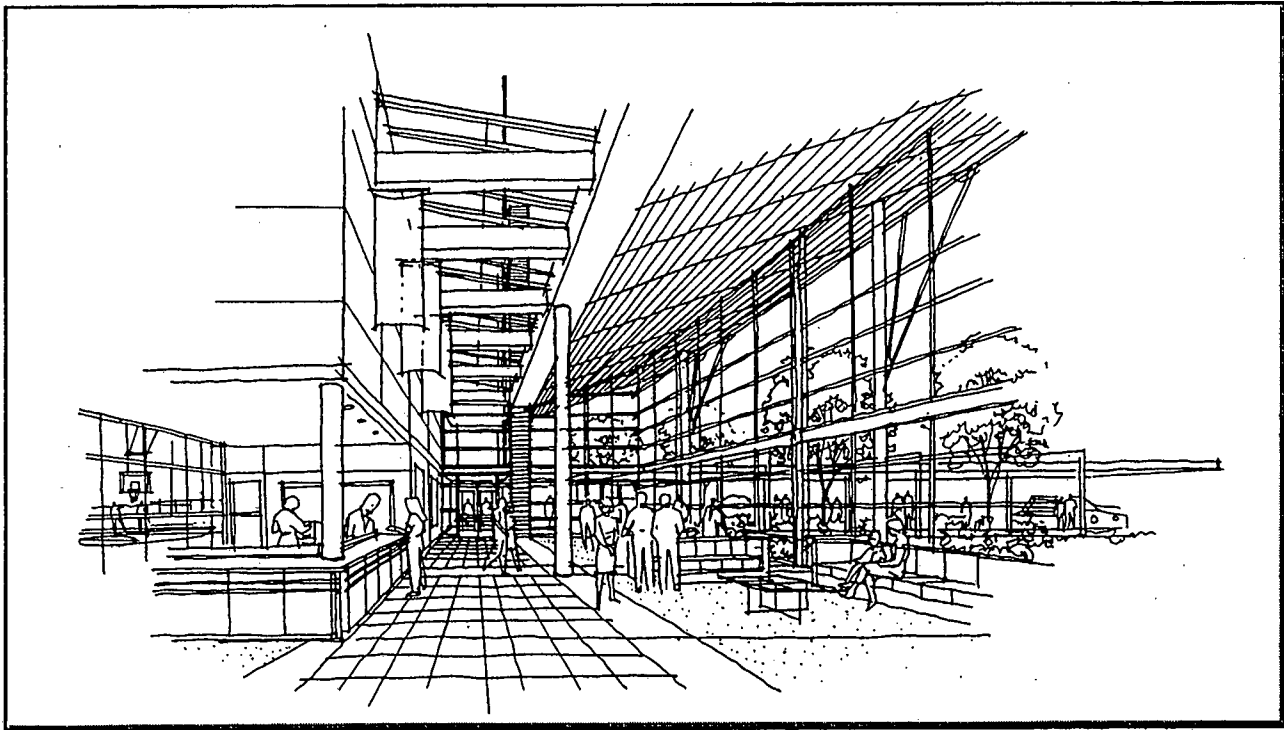

East Portland Community Center

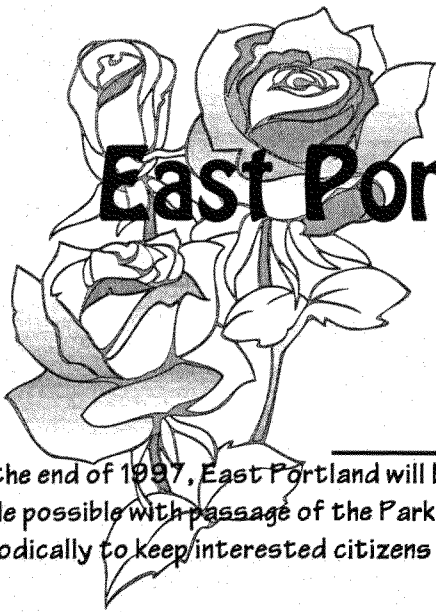


"Arcade" refers to a covered walkway.

East Portland Community Center Sited Next To Floyd Light School

On December 1, Commissioner Charlie Hales announced his decision to support the Citizens Task Force recommendation to site the new East Portland Community Center next to Floyd Light Middle School on SE 106th. Involved is a trade: five acres of park land for five acres of adjacent school property. The facility will offer recreational classes and activities, special activities and spaces for senior services and programming, and rooms for community meetings and events. Commissioner Hales' *Decision Paper* is available from the East Portland District Coalition office or by calling 823-5588.

The decision to site the facility at Floyd Light came after seven months of work by the Citizens Task Force. However, the site itself - on school property - was not introduced as an option until very late in the process, after the initial siting recommendations proved unworkable. While the site itself has met with general support, Portland Parks & Recreation recognizes the need to provide additional opportunities for the community to learn more about the project and the site and to share concerns.

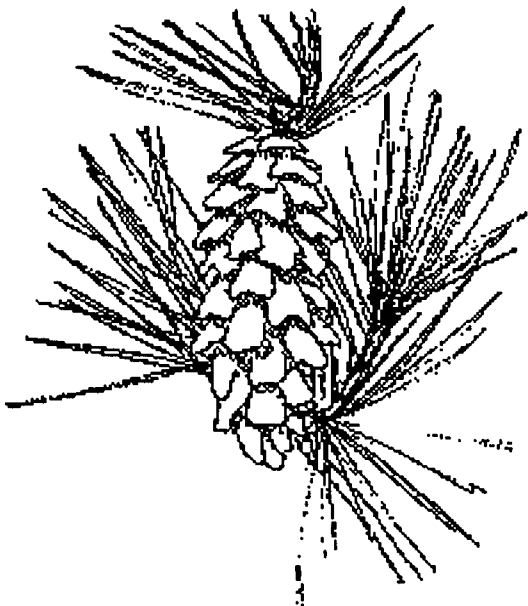

Seniors Issues

From the beginning seniors in East Portland have been vocal, supportive, and vitally interested in the new community center. There is a need in the area for senior support and activities, and an opportunity for them to give back to their community. The community center can provide such an opportunity. What are the issues?

- ***A Home Base*** - Within the community center seniors can take advantage of all the activities, but also have a home base, or "living room," where they can socialize and hold meetings. PP&R and the CTF continue to work on this issue, with the idea of a "senior-priority" space that can be used by everyone but with priority given to seniors.
- ***Meal Site*** - Loaves and Fishes provides hot meals at lunch time for a donation, along with a meals-on-wheels program for people unable to leave their homes. The community center multi-purpose room is an appropriate space to serve lunches; for full service the kitchen needs to be expanded for an additional \$87,000.

- ***Senior Programs***

All programs at the community center will be available for seniors, but what are the special ones targeting this audience? What are the opportunities for seniors to teach classes to younger people? Can we develop a truly multi-generational, multi-cultural approach to program? Should there be special classes free for seniors? These are issues being actively discussed.

- ***Aging Services and YWCA District Center***

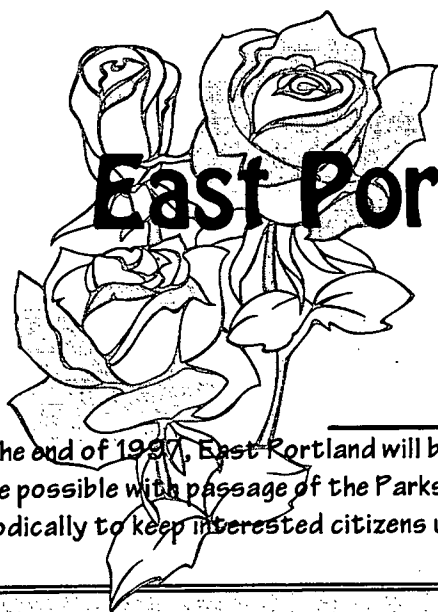
The County Aging Services and the YWCA District Center provide a wide range of services for seniors. Primarily they operate an information and referral service to give seniors assistance with meals, medical and transportation services. They also provide counselling for seniors and families on independent living. Co-location of these services with the community center would provide a one-stop location. The County would need to invest approximately \$2,000,000 for the project. The implications of this possibility will be under discussion during January.

Choosing a Site

Where should the new East Portland Community Center be located? This question is on everyone's minds. It has been the main topic of discussion for the Citizen's Task Force since they convened in early April and the subject of two public meetings.

Appointed by Parks Commissioner Charlie Hales, the Citizens Task Force is charged with recommending a site already in public ownership and a design reflective of public recreation needs and within the \$4.5 million budget. They began their work by establishing objective criteria for evaluation of potential sites:

- a) Land Use - Compatibility with the neighborhood;
- b) Access - all modes of transportation;
- c) Demographics - density patterns, geographic center of east Portland;
- d) Site Characteristics - economically efficient to develop; allows for adjacent outdoor activity, future expansion, and co-siting opportunities;
- e) Environmental considerations - including existing land form, vegetation and wildlife habitats;
- f) Partnership potential - special consideration was given to any site where a partnership could enhance the type of facility built.

First 24, then in more detail 7 sites were reviewed.

The Task Force toured the most promising 10 sites and brought forward three sites for consideration at a September 9 public meeting.

The Task Force Recommendation

On September 26, the Task Force submitted their recommendation to Commissioner Hales. The following is excerpted from their written recommendation:

Glendoveer is our primary recommendation to you. The site is centrally located within east Portland and can convey a sense of identity important for the community center. People using the existing facilities will benefit from increased recreation, meeting and educational opportunities and similarly the new community center will begin with significant golf, jogging and tennis resources. ..(that will) serve the needs of families and all ages. The land may be the least costly of all the recommended sites. (continued on next page)

Commissioner Hales hopes to have all the information he needs to make a siting decision by early November. Now, and until the end of October, is your opportunity to submit written comments. Address your letters to

Task Force Recommendation, con't.

Mill Park, with property purchased for frontage on 122nd, is our second recommendation, should Glendoveer not work out. Again, the site is centrally located and 122nd is a major north/south connector for east Portland with good vehicular and bus access. The park is currently underdeveloped and therefore would not result in the loss of past public investments. Its adjacency with the elementary school is seen as positive, as school children would be able to walk easily to the community center. Despite these positive attributes, in order for Mill Park to be a viable location for the community center, four properties along 122nd must be purchased at estimated cost of \$500,000.

Our third recommendation is the Russellville site. This site rated very highly based on our evaluation criteria. The primary asset is the proximity to light rail and bus service. There are, however, a number of concerns. First and most obvious is the fact that the site may not be available.

The \$4.5 million earmarked for the community center is already a very tight budget and will only build a fraction of what the community needs. We recommend that these funds be exclusively used for improvements and not be used for land purchase.

We continue to be enthusiastic about the importance of this project. Closer contact with the parks in east Portland as part of this process has brought home to us what we already knew. We must continue to pursue new parks and community centers for east Portland. The East Portland Community Center project is a great undertaking but it is not enough...we look forward to further progress for the east Portland community.

Why Not Acquire a New Site?

Why use parkland for the new community center? It appears to be contradictory to use what is now open space for a building. Yet historically this has been the preference of Portland citizens, beginning in 1909 when Peninsula Park was acquired and the Community Center sited along its northern edge. This established a precedent that has been followed, with positive results for neighborhoods, for years.

More recently, Portland Parks & Recreation

identified over \$100 million in capital needs to renovate our aging system and provide for future needs. In developing the Parks Bond Measure (26-10), a public opinion poll was conducted. The results indicated that citizens felt the bond package should be no larger than \$60 million and that any major new facilities should be sited on land already in the public domain rather than spending money on acquisition. The bond measure was developed to reflect these preferences and budgets for the two new community centers did not include acquisition costs.

We've been hearing from you

In Person. Over 50 citizens attended the first public meeting on May 22. They learned about the planning process for the new Community Center and completed questionnaires on facility objectives, programs and spaces, and siting criteria. (The results of this meeting were more thoroughly presented in the June-July 1995 newsletter. Copies are available from the Bond Project Team office - 823-5588.)

Eighty-five people signed the roster at the second public meeting, held on September 9 at David Douglas Administration Building. At that time, project consultants from Thompson Vaivoda & Associates Architects provided specific information on options for siting and facility spaces. Siting criteria were reviewed and the pros and cons of each site were discussed. Participants also discussed specific kinds of spaces important for their community center and debated whether specific ages need dedicated spaces. (See article entitled: *Public Meeting Survey Results.*)

On the phone. In July we heard from 300 East Portland residents (east of I-205) through a telephone survey conducted by a public opinion research firm. They ensured that we reached a representative cross-section of people and provided the statistical analysis. (See the article entitled *East Portland Community Center: What People Think.*)

At our meetings. A Citizens Task Force, appointed by Commissioner Hales, has been meeting at least twice a month since April. The Task Force represents a cross section of East Portland residents and

East Portland Community Center

Pros & Cons associated with each proposed site

Glendoveer - between Halsey, Glisan, and 148th.

Pro

1. The site is centrally located within the service area.
2. The community center will benefit from existing recreation activities that already occur on the site (tennis, golf, and walking paths) to create a one-stop activity center for the area.
3. The site has a natural, park-like setting that would be highly desirable for the center.
4. The site is very large, so the potential impact of the community center building would be less than other sites.
5. The site is well served by public transportation (especially bus lines).
6. The potential development costs for the center are the least at this site.

Con

1. The city does not yet own Glendoveer and this site is contingent upon a successful transfer negotiation with Metro.
2. The community center would take up open space that is seen as valuable to the neighbors of Glendoveer.
3. Despite the large acreage of the site, there is not a significant amount of leftover land that is not being utilized by other activities.
4. There is a concern that the center will require removal of trees.
5. There is concern for the additional traffic generated by the new center at the site, depending on which of the six potential locations is selected.

Mill Park - near 122nd between Mill Court & Lincoln.

Pro

1. The site is centrally located within the service area.
2. The park is not currently developed, so the community center would be a significant upgrade for the site.
3. Adjacency to the Mill Park Elementary School would be an advantage, as kids could easily walk to the center.
4. The location is close to other social services.
5. The site is well served by public transportation.
6. The park is already owned by the City.

Con

1. This site requires the purchase of four properties along SE 122nd Ave. to give the center exposure and access to a main street. There is no money in the construction budget for site acquisition, estimated at \$500,000.
2. The park is quite small (6 acres) and the community center will take up approximately 3 acres. There is concern that the site is too small to support the center.
3. There is concern that the new center would be too close to adjacent residential properties.
4. There is concern about traffic the center will generate in this neighborhood.
5. There is concern that the center would be too close to the elementary school & its adjacent playground.

Russellville School - SE 102nd and East Burnside

Pro

1. The site is centrally located within the service area.
2. The site is best served by public transportation of all the sites.
3. The site is most accessible of all the sites.
4. The site is more urban in character and the community center would not displace any existing park land or natural open space.
5. Adjacency to potential high density housing is seen as a plus.

Con

1. The site is owned by David Douglas School District. A developer already has a 90 day option on the site. Even if the site becomes available, there is no money for the acquisition - estimated to be \$900,000+.
2. Use of the site will require demolition of the old Russellville School, complicated by the presence of asbestos. The cost could be as high as \$250,000.
3. There is concern that the community center could be come subservient to the other development on the site and lose its identity.
4. There is concern about the increased traffic on the already busy adjacent streets, creating more congestion in the area.
5. There is concern that this site is too far to the west in the service area and too close to the Montavilla Community Center.
6. There is concern that the site is too commercial for a community center.

Glendoveer Site

Six sites are being considered at Glendoveer:

A. This site would be accessed directly off Glisan. It would require shifting one hole on the golfcourse to the north.

B. This site would integrate the new center with the existing buildings and expand the current parking lot.

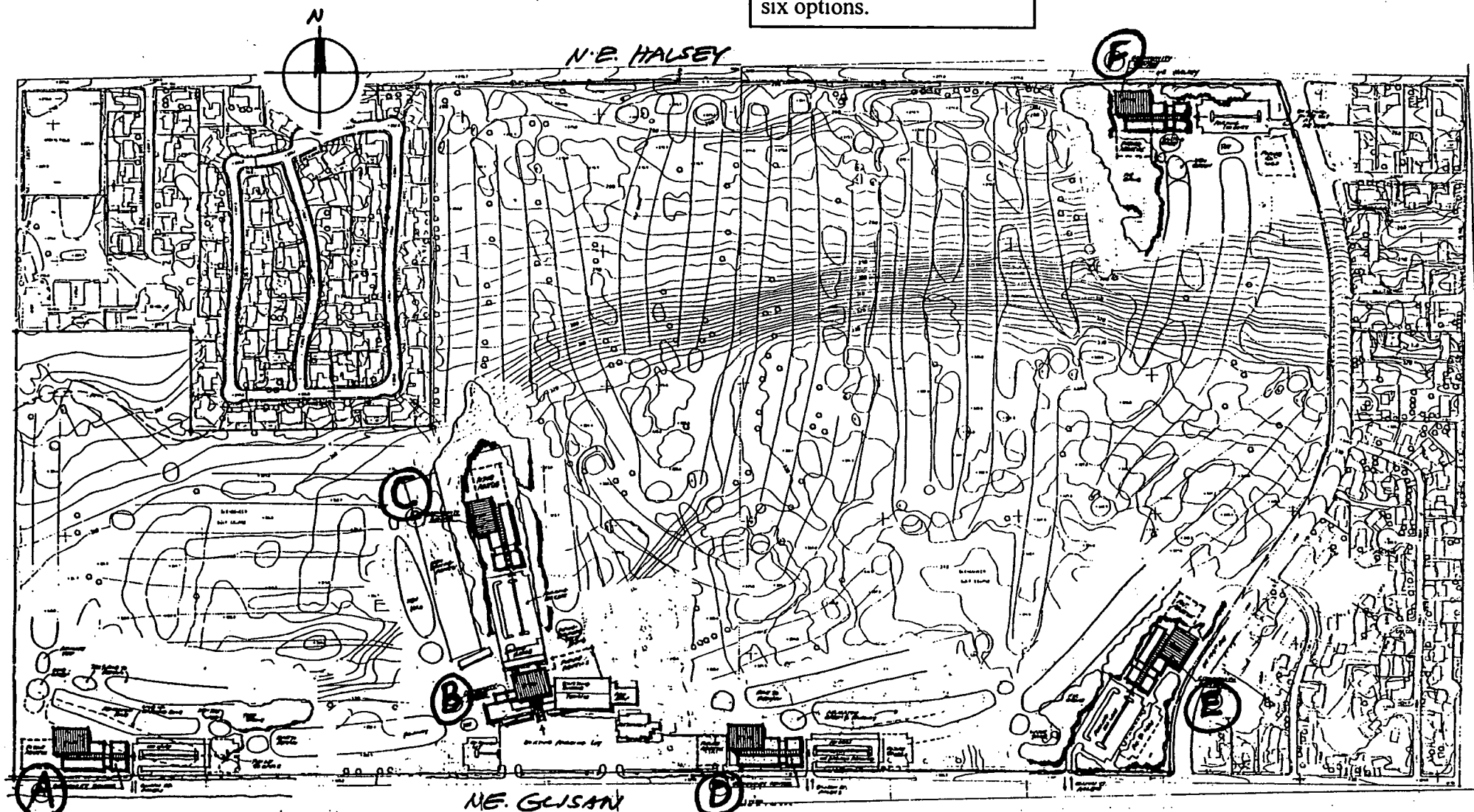
C. This option places the center on the site of the driving range, moving the driving range to the west. It would involve building a new parking lot for community center users.

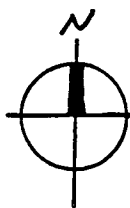
D. This site requires major tree removal & expansion of the existing parking lot. One golf hole would be relocated to the north.

E. This site places the Center in the existing woods. While some tree removal would be necessary at this site as well, the center and parking lot could be carefully designed and placed so as to impact a minimum number of trees. Access would be directly off Glisan.

F. This site would be accessed directly off 148th. Minimal tree removal would be required and there would be no impact to the golf course. Some slight pathway reconfiguration would be necessary.

RUSSELVILLE SCHOOL SITE

provides a valuable perspective. Their job is to guide the planning process and to make recommendations to Commissioner Hales on the siting and design of the new facility. Task Force meetings are open to the public and time is included on every agenda for public comment. Citizen comments are appreciated and become part of the record of each meeting.

In the mail Letters received regarding siting and programming of the new community center are copied and provided to each Task Force member and also become part of the official record.

Public Meeting Survey Results

Of the 85 people who attended the public meeting on September 9, 67 responded to a survey on programs and siting.

When asked about the overall focus for the community center, 49.3 preferred that the facility be oriented toward community education, 32.8% preferred an active recreation focus, and 17.9% felt it should be focused on seniors.

Age-specific dedicated space was a major concern. 71.7% felt there should be dedicated spaces for different age groups; 28% preferred to share spaces. Respondents felt the most important space in the new facility was a lounge area. They liked the idea of a computer room, drop-in childcare, and a stage. An indoor track was not seen as necessary.

Public transportation was considered the most important criteria in site selection. It was felt that the facility should be accessible by walking and have associated outdoor spaces. Being close to shopping or restaurants was not seen as important.

After learning about the site options, participants indicated a preference for the Russellville site, with Glendoveer second and Mill Park third.

East Portland Community Center: What People Think

To be sure the new East Portland Community Center is responsive to the needs of the community, PP&R went directly to the public on the phone. Three hundred citizens spent a few minutes of their time

helping us understand how they would like to see the community center developed. The survey was conducted in July by the firm of Davis & Hibbitts, Inc., a professional opinion polling organization.

What Did We Learn?

- * The facility is needed. Between 50 and 75% of the people said that the programs were needed in the community and the facility should be designed to support a wide variety of activities.
- * There should be an emphasis on family. Many responses focused on children and families. 86% said that providing a positive experience for children or grandchildren would be an important reason for using the new center; child care and playgrounds are also important.
- * The community center should include opportunities to learn something new as well as to exercise. Socializing and attending community meetings were also reasons for using the center.
- * When asked about siting the community center in relationship to a school, elementary schools were preferred over middle or high schools.
- * When asked whether the community center should be in a park-like setting or an urban-like setting, a park-like setting was preferred by 57%, 25% were neutral and 17% chose urban-like.

Fall Task Force Meetings

The Task Force will be meeting monthly throughout the fall and winter. Having made their siting recommendation, meeting topics will now focus on program issues.

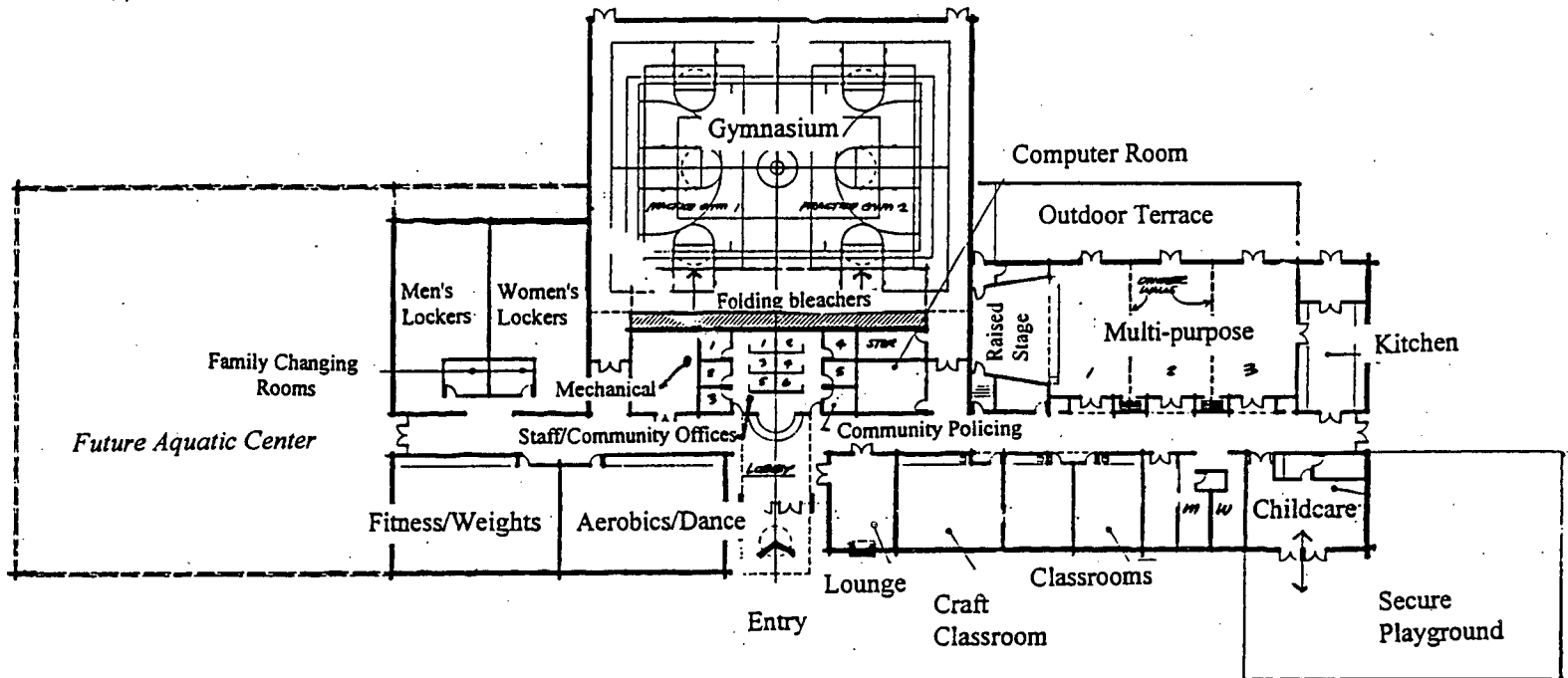

This schematic diagram reflects current thinking about what kinds of spaces might be included in the new community center. The actual design of the facility will begin once a site has been confirmed. Design options will be presented for public review and comment at a Public Meeting tentatively scheduled for November.

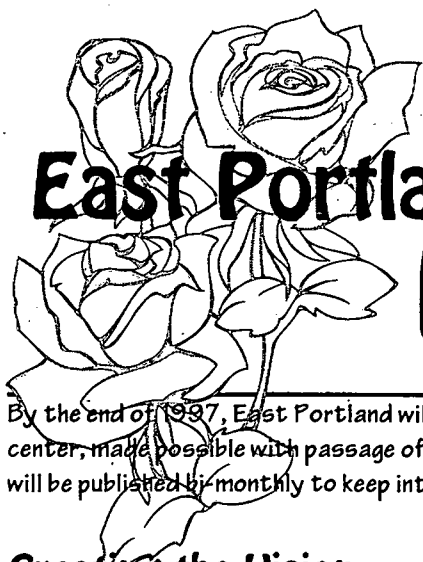
Thompson Vaivoida & Associates Architects and Councilman/Hunsaker & Associates have been working with the Citizens Task Force and the staff of Portland parks & Recreation to prepare the "program" for the new facility. In this case, program refers to the kinds of spaces that will be included, rather than the specific classes and activities that will be offered. After first determining what size facility could be built for the available funds, approximately 33,000 square feet, they prepared a range of program options for review. The main task has been to prioritize needs, since the budget will limit the kinds of activities that can be included.

Some options emphasized recreational activities, while others emphasized community service programs. Based on the results of the public opinion poll and input from public workshops, the current program emphasizes community education and services - especially senior services - with the balance given over to recreational activities. There also seems to be a strong desire for dedicated space for seniors, as opposed to the entire center being multi-generational. It is yet to be determined how much dedicated space can be built without sacrificing essential recreational spaces, such as the gymnasium, fitness rooms, etc.

Creating the Vision

On Monday evening, May 22, Charles Jordan, Director of Portland Parks & Recreation, welcomed over fifty citizens to the first of several public meetings to discuss the new community center. Dick Cooley, Task Force Chairman, and Janet Bebb, Project Manager, gave an update on the Citizens Task Force progress to date, and issues being addressed. But the real work began when participants broke into small groups to begin to develop a vision for the ideal Community Center to serve East Portland.

The Questions

The discussion focused on three areas:

- **Objectives** - What should the facility accomplish, in the broadest sense.

What do we want this center to be for our community?

- **Programs & Spaces** - What activities do we envision taking place in this community center? What kinds of

resources are lacking in our community? What kinds of spaces would be required to accommodate these activities? What kinds of facilities might be included to generate revenue that could support other free or low-cost activities?

- **Siting** - Given our overall objectives and programming needs, is our siting criteria adequate? Is anything left out?

The Responses

Objectives. All agreed that the new facility should be a place that is accessible to all - where everyone in the community feels comfortable. It should be integrated into the neighborhood, yet

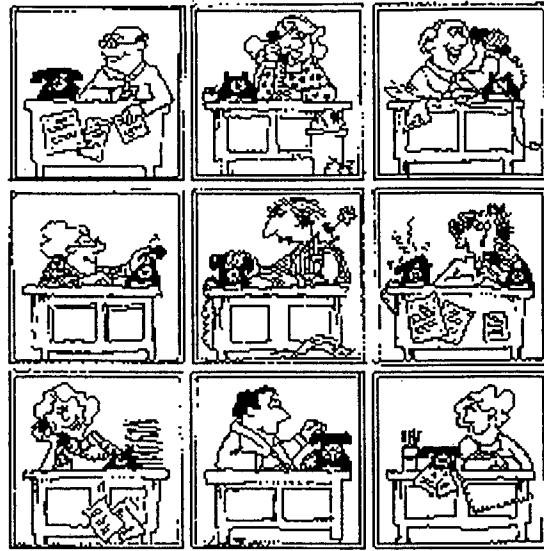
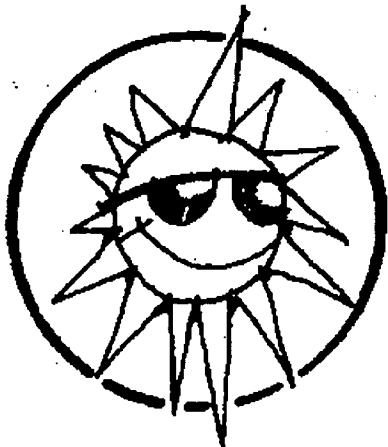

get information, to socialize, and to recreate and spaces should be designed to provide for a variety of uses simultaneously. It should have a non-institutional look, incorporating outdoor spaces for courtyards, gardening, or recreation activities. The building should be designed with an eye to future expansion.

Programs & Spaces. There were an abundance of ideas for the kinds of spaces that should be in the new center and the programs that might fill them. Spaces most often mentioned included a gymnasium, indoor track, classrooms, senior center, auditorium, meeting rooms, library, community kitchen, multi-purpose room(s), playground, restrooms, showers/lockers, pool, fitness center, game room, and computer lab. Activities ran the gambit too, including crafts, wood shop, dance and music classes, summer day camp, bingo, cards, college classes, subsidized meal programs, speakers, community services. Ideas for revenue included banquet rooms, roller rink, festival space, racquetball, water features, miniature golf, shuffleboard, croquet, etc.

Siting criteria were discussed and additions were suggested (see "Siting Criteria"). The Task Force will take all of these suggestions to heart as they deliberate over the site and primary programmatic elements for the new center.



Public Opinion Poll Scheduled

Davis & Hibbits, Inc, a market and public opinion research firm, will be conducting a telephone opinion poll of 300 East Portland households during the last week of June. The scientifically designed poll will help determine the public's recreation needs, preferences, and priorities. Findings will be presented at the Public Meeting scheduled for September 9.

Siting Criteria

The big question on everyone's mind is SITING! Where will this wonderful new facility be? That question will finally be put to the community at the Public Meeting scheduled for September 9. The Task Force has worked hard to develop siting criteria they believe will result in the best possible location for our new Center.

As a first step, potential sites must pass these **basic screening criteria**:

- ✓ The site is within the public domain and/or carries no acquisition costs;
- ✓ The site is located within east Portland;
- ✓ The land available will accommodate the community center of approximately 65,000 square feet plus related site requirements;
- ✓ The surrounding land uses are compatible with the community center;
- ✓ Public accessibility is good;
- ✓ The siting does not damage fragile ecosystems.

Beyond this basic screening, criteria has been developed to address:

- ✓ **Land Use:** Neighborhood Compatibility
 - Close to program-related services for youth and seniors
 - Consistent with or improves the established character of area
 - Site able to reflect sense of community identity
 - Close to shopping/entertainment
 - Complements existing and proposed recreation facilities in the area
- ✓ **Access**
 - Transportation system is capable of safely supporting the new use
 - Bus and light rail considerations
 - Vehicular ingress/egress will work

- Sidewalks connect the site to public transportation
- Bike lane connects exist or are planned

- ✓ **Response to Demographics:** Who are we serving?
 - Location serves area population center
 - Anticipates future population growth
 - Serves concentrations of people over 65, over 50, ethnic concentrations, youth, lower income families & individuals

- ✓ **Site Characteristics**
 - Economically efficient to develop
 - Adjacent outdoor activity is possible
 - Future expansion potential
 - Good visibility within the area
 - Co-siting options (library, soccer)

- ✓ **Environmental Considerations**
 - Site does not require clean-up of environmentally hazardous materials
 - Site does not require destruction or major alteration of land forms, vegetation or wildlife habitats
 - Facility can form a link with open spaces or corridors
 - City-designated resources, such as views and landmarks are protected or enhanced.

- ✓ **Partnership Potential**
 - A partnership is associated with the site that will enhance the type of facility built with financial contributions and appropriate adjacencies.

How Will the Criteria Be Used?

Each site that meets the basic screening test will then be evaluated based on the more detailed criteria (Land Use, Access, etc.). Criteria will be prioritized and points will be assigned to each item. By August, the Citizens Task Force will have selected up to three potential sites for public review.

Thompson Vaivoda & Associates Named to Design the East Portland Community Center

The firm that designed the Nike World Campus, Wilsonville High School, the new METRO headquarters, and the Marilyn Moyer Meditation Chapel will now add the East Portland Community Center to their portfolio. With thirty-one design and construction awards since their formation in 1984, TVA has an impressive record of peer and professional recognition for their design work.

The Selection Committee included Laurie Sitton, from the East Portland Community Center Citizen's Task Force, Rudy Barton, of the Regional Arts and Culture Council, Vicki Vanneman, Tualatin Hills Parks & Recreation Superintendent, Leo Williams, Architect with the Planning Bureau, Zari Santner, Parks & Recreation Architectural Supervisor, and John Sewell, Planning

Director. The committee reviewed twelve proposals and interviewed four firms.

The finalists were highly qualified and their interviews were each followed by lively discussion among Selection Committee members. For example, the Committee considered the recreation/operational expertise of each firm; the overall design quality of their work; the incorporation of art; the make-up of the design team; and their experience in energy efficient design. The final recommendation of Thompson Vaivoda was based on their high level of design excellence and creative use of materials, their recreation expertise, and the outstanding projects they presented as examples of their work.

TVA will begin working with the Citizens Task Force in late July and will participate in all future public workshops. Soon they will begin to translate the community's goals and objectives for the new facility into schematic design options for all to consider.

Envisioning the Best

At their April 27th meeting, the CTF brainstormed about what they would like the community center to accomplish. They are looking forward to learning about the general community's vision for the facility during the Public Workshop scheduled for May 22.

The Citizens Task Force envisions a facility that will:

- ◆ Provide many activities, including recreation and learning, for all ages;
- ◆ Encourage the interacting of all ages with opportunities for youth, adults and seniors;
- ◆ Provide both a multi-generational and multi-cultural resource;
- ◆ Offer programs and activities at costs affordable to low income families;
- ◆ Allow age groups, especially seniors, to remain separate if desired;
- ◆ Foster a sense of pride and reflect an image of the community;
- ◆ Generate some income to partially cover operating expenses;
- ◆ Be safe and easy to use;
- ◆ Serve as a social services access point;
- ◆ Be a hub of activity available for extended, possibly 24 hour, use;
- ◆ Be considered and designed as a regional facility with appropriate size;
- ◆ Serve as a focal point of east Portland much in the way a city hall traditionally has; and
- ◆ Foster a feeling of east Portland identity that dissolves current divisions.

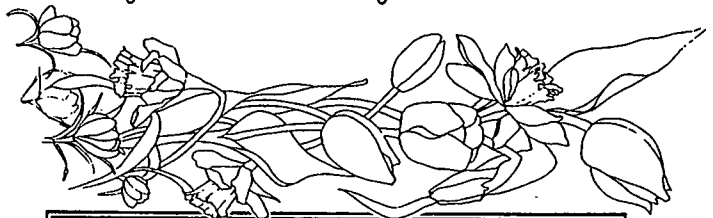
Partnership Opportunities

The prospect of a new community center has sparked some potentially exciting partnership opportunities. In one case Community Builders, developers pursuing a

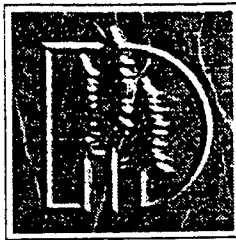
project at the Russellville site, have proposed to include the community center within their project and donate additional funds towards a family aquatics center. Their vision of the Russellville Town Center is a transit-oriented community with a mix of housing, social, medical, education, commercial and recreational uses within easy walking distance. The Community Builders' proposal is currently under review by the David Douglas School District administration.

A second potential partnership has been suggested by Parkrose School District. Plans for their new high school include a community center which could be expanded and enhanced through a partnership with the East Portland Community Center. The vision for the school is that students and the community share facilities, fostering multi-generational interaction. Facilities planned include a new theater, a branch library, a community center, a field house with a gym and fitness center, a 25-meter pool and student center, in addition to new classrooms and teaching facilities.

At this early stage in the East Portland Community Center project all potential partnerships are being considered. As the project continues to take shape we will continue to pursue partnerships that multiply the impact of the existing bond funds and enable us to provide a better facility for the community.

Consideration of the Floyd Light Park Land Swap Proposal

1. The decision is good for students - After school, when there is the most potential for accidents and for children to get into mischief, many of our students are unsupervised. This community center would provide a place to go after school. It would provide activities in areas other than just athletics and sports. It should help to keep students off the streets and keep them in the kinds of activities that discourage gang involvement.
2. The decision is good for the community - To have this community center located in the David Douglas area is a real service to the citizens of David Douglas. It has good access to bus transportation, having a stop on the corner of 106th and Cherry Blossom Drive. It is a good location (across the street from the police bureau) and will be a fine area where citizens will want to take visiting relatives to see the growth and improvement going on in the David Douglas community.
3. The decision is good for open spaces - The dedication of most of the land behind Floyd Light Middle School for school purposes ensures that this land will be maintained as open athletic fields and environmental study areas. It will also ensure that there are open spaces in the community where people may walk, get exercise and explore nature trails.
4. The decision was based upon good data - On September 23, 1994 the City Club of Portland produced a report on the Portland Metropolitan area parks. Out of many recommendations they made, two specifically refer to community centers. On page 138 they recommended "a community center at every middle school to provide a place of education, recreation and congregation for the community served by the middle school." Also, on page 140, there was a statement that "new community centers should be sited at or in close proximity to middle schools." They also stated that "community centers deliver social, safety and recreational services whether by not-for-profit or governmental agencies to the community." Floyd Light Middle School meets these criteria.
5. After discussions with neighbors, faculty and staff of Floyd Light, and with our various legal counsels, it was determined this truly was a good opportunity for the students of David Douglas, the community of David Douglas and all of the future generations of people who will choose to call David Douglas their home.

8. Park Shark - Must be able to swim 50 yards crawl stroke, backcrawl, elementary backcrawl and 25 yards of breaststroke.
9. Park Shark II - Must be able to swim 2 lengths each of breaststroke, backcrawl, sidestroke, and front crawl with good technique.
10. Introduction to Springboard Diving - Must be able to front dive unassisted and be at least a Sea Lion level swimmer. Offered at Dishman, PCC and Wilson Pools only.

Located on seven acres in a beautiful woodland setting, the pathways of Crystal Springs Rhododendron Garden wind invitingly through more than 2,500 rhododendrons, azaleas and companion plants. Beginning in early spring and continuing into summer, they provide a magnificent display of color, giving visitors the opportunity to view many varieties rarely seen in the Pacific Northwest. During the fall, many companion trees add dramatic coloring. Spring-fed Crystal Springs Lake surrounds much of the garden, attracting many species of birds and waterfowl.

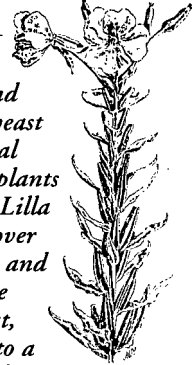

Leach Botanical Garden

Leach, Portland's only publicly-owned botanical garden, is located in a woodland hollow carved by Johnson Creek in Southeast Portland. This nine-acre, living botanical museum specializes in Northwest native plants and is dedicated to keeping up John and Lilla Leach's historical collections, displaying over 1500 species of wildflowers, ferns, shrubs and trees - most in their natural habitat. The winding trails run through wetland forest, across Johnson Creek, along a fern walk to a peat bog, past the Leaches' 1930s manor house, and on to a rock garden and dry woodlands.



How to get there:

Leach Garden Friends, incorporated in 1981, spent the first two years renovating the Leach family estate. The Garden opened to the public in September, 1983. The Garden's programs have grown to include a variety of children's outdoor classrooms, a special program oh Johnson Creek, a traveling suitcase program for children unable to come to the Garden, adult classes and special events such as English teas, plant sales, family nature fairs and a Christmas bazaar.

Volunteers assist in maintaining the Garden, lead tours, teach classes and workshops, staff the gift shop and greet manor house visitors, put on (fun) fundraising activities such as plant sales, English Teas and holiday bazaars, pursue history projects related to John and Lilla Leach's legacy to the community, and help with the international seed exchange. 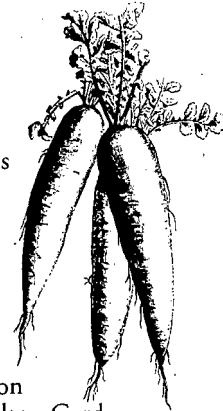

Portland Parks and Recreation manages a growing inventory of natural areas.

Today, over 7,600 acres of natural areas, large blocks of urban wild lands, inside the City of Portland offer important refuge for people as well as wildlife. Proceeds from Bond Measure 26-26 passed by voters in May 1995, are now being used to add to this inventory.

SMITH AND BYBEE LAKES NATURAL AREA

Located in North Portland's Rivergate Industrial District along N. Marine Drive and N. Portland Rd. • Phone 797-1850

This 2,000 acre natural area is the largest remnant of what was an incredible system of lakes and sloughs along the south shore of the Columbia River. An accessible trail from the parking lot on N. Marine Drive leads to two wildlife observation blinds. An interpretive center and additional trails are planned. Disabled Access: *Parking:* Designated in N. Marine Drive lot. *Trail:* Accessible - paved.

POWELL BUTTE NATURE PARK

Access road hours: 6am-10pm, June 1- Aug 31; 7am-8pm, Sept. 1-late Oct.; 7am-6pm, late Oct.-early April, 7am-8pm, early April-May 30. Enter park from SE 162nd Ave & Powell Blvd.

A 570 acre upland meadow and forest, Powell Butte offers spectacular views of the Cascades and other local buttes, excellent wildlife viewing and over nine miles of trails for hikers, bicyclists and equestrians.

ELK ROCK ISLAND NATURAL AREA

(Peter Kerr Park and Milwaukie's Spring Park) Access from 19th & Sparrow, Milwaukie (except during high water)

Discover great bird watching and Willamette River scenery on Portland's oldest rock. Created by lava flows occurring about 40 million years ago, Elk Rock Island is the most varied natural landscape in the city. Over 60 kinds of birds have been spotted, including Great Blue Heron, Sharpshinned Hawk, Belted Kingfisher & Great Egret. Except during spring "freshets," simply hike to the island from the Milwaukie side of river. Disabled Access: Inaccessible

MARQUAM NATURE PARK

Access from the interpretive shelter off SW Sam Jackson Park Road (1/4 mile west of Duniway Park).

71 acres of park land in wooded ravines around Portland's "pill hill" are connected by trail to Terwilliger and the Willamette Greenway and to Council Crest, Hoyt Arboretum and the Wildwood Trail. Marquam Nature Park offers a perfect retreat for hikers and bird watchers. A new self-guided tour begins at the interpretive shelter. Pick up a guide at the shelter or at the Portland Parks and Recreation office downtown. Disabled Access: Inaccessible

OAKS BOTTOM WILDLIFE REFUGE

Access from Sellwood Park at SE 7th & Sellwood Blvd. or parking lot at the 5000 block of SE Milwaukie Blvd.

Portland's first official wildlife refuge is a 160-acre floodplain still connected to the Willamette River. A two-mile trail encircles the open water habitat providing viewing opportunities for 140 bird species known to frequent Oaks Bottom. Great Blue Heron from the Ross Island heronry find Oaks Bottom one of their favorite feeding areas. A project to enhance wildlife habitat value on the 7-acre former landfill site at the south end of Oaks Bottom is now underway. Disabled Access: Inaccessible



FOREST PARK

Located in NW Portland, bounded by Burnside on the south and Newberry Rd. on the north, St. Helens Rd. (US 30) on the east and Skyline Blvd. on the west.

The nation's largest forested park within city limits, Forest Park's 4,900 acres stretch 7-1/2 miles across the northeast face of the Tualatin Mountain. An abundance of wildlife (over 100 bird and 60 mammal species) share space with hikers, bicyclists and equestrians who use Forest Park's 60 miles of trails and firelanes. A recent public-private acquisition effort is enabling the northward extension of Wildwood Trail toward Newberry Road. Maps are available at the Park's downtown office, at Hoyt Arboretum and at Portland Audubon. *One City's Wilderness*, by Marcy Houle is an excellent guidebook available at local bookstores. Disabled Access: Inaccessible



40 Mile Loop & Willamette Greenway Trail

The 40 Mile Loop and the Willamette Greenway Trail together make up approximately 140 miles of a growing regional trail system. Aquired in 1990, the Springwater Cooridor segment extends from SE McLoughlin to Boring and is now being developed for public use. Other projects such as the Peninsula Crossing Trail will get underway soon to help complete this terrific system. Maps are available at Portland Parks & Recreation's downtown office for \$2.

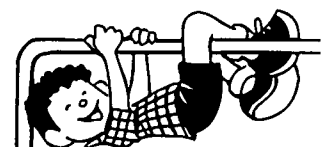

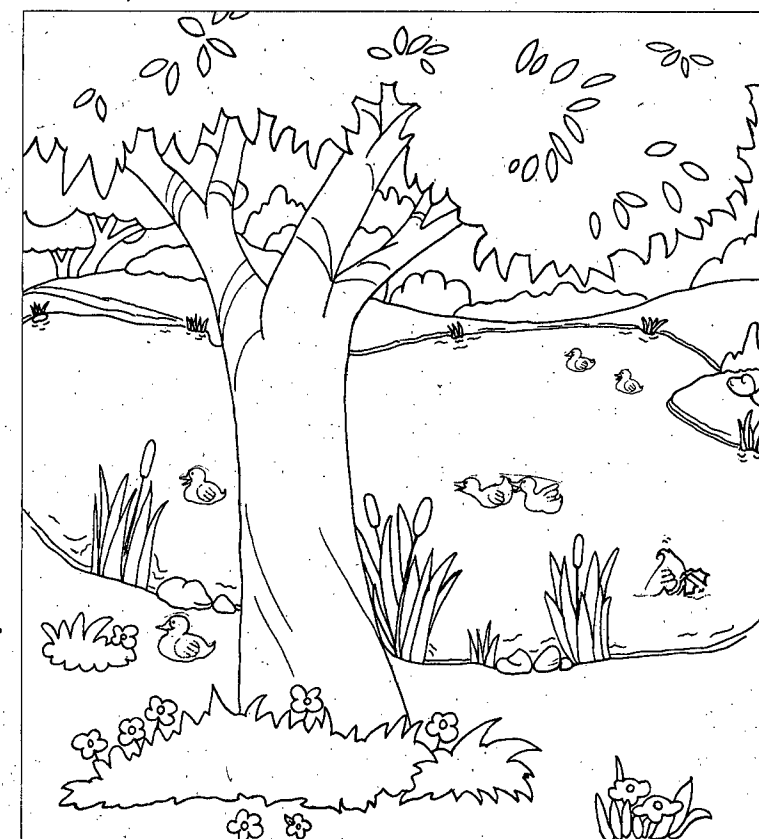

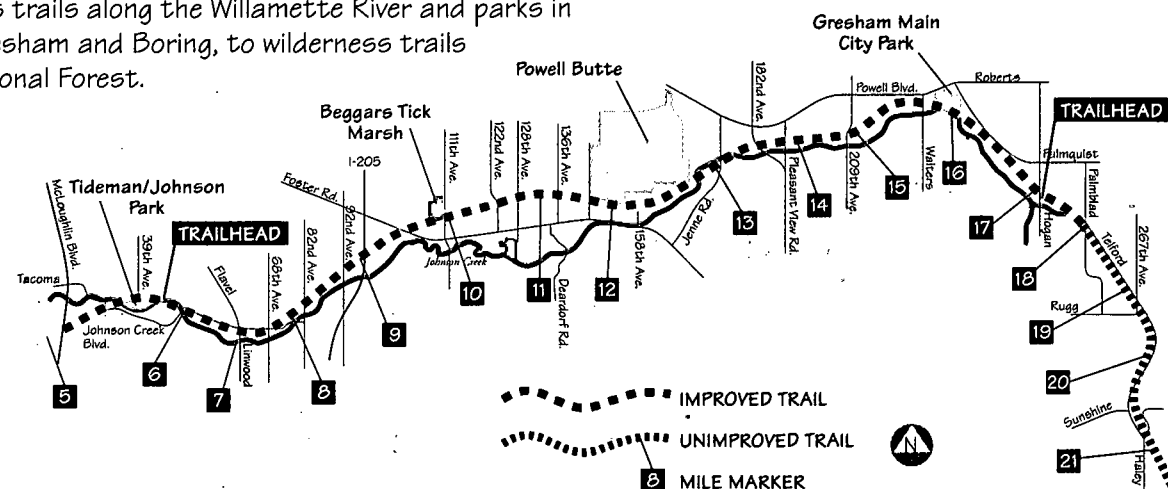

Recent Accomplishments



Portland Parks & Recreation is dedicated to enriching the lives of citizens and enhancing Portland's natural beauty.

We strive for excellence in our parks, gardens, open space, and in our recreation programs. Portland citizens expect a lot from their park system and we do our best to deliver. We strive to make our parks and programs:

- Appealing...** safe, clean, and attractive; cared for natural environments; up-to-date facilities; professionally delivered programs.
- Accessible...** a park or program located in every neighborhood; affordable; available to people with disabilities
- Diverse...** something for everyone – formal gardens, ballfields, nature trails, neighborhood parks; adult & youth, group or individual, programs in arts, sports, education; everyone is welcome.
- Responsive...** involve our citizenry; solicit public input; provide people with information; act in the best interest of the public. Work with businesses, agencies, and citizen groups to secure resources and advocates.
- Balanced...** as responsible stewards of 10,000 acres, we balance human and wildlife needs; protecting plants, trees and property while allowing public recreation to flourish.

Much goes on behind the scenes to keep us on track with our goals and on the cutting edge of park and recreation agencies throughout the United States. Here is a sampling of some recent accomplishments:

East Bank Park Development Plans are complete and first phase funding secure. Beginning in 1997, a pathway for walkers & bicyclists will be constructed from OMSI to the Steel Bridge. This will create an Eastside-westside waterfront loop from the Hawthorne bridge to the Steel bridge. It will eventually join up with the Springwater Corridor.

Springwater Corridor If you walk, hike, or bike and you haven't discovered this 16.5 mile trail along Johnson Creek, it's time you do! The corridor creates a new non-motorized transportation route linking to trails along the Willamette River and many parks in SE Portland, Gresham and Boring, and to wilderness trails in the Mt. Hood National Forest. Ultimately, it will connect to the Pacific Crest Trail. Financial partners for this trail include: City of Gresham, Clackamas County, City of Milwaukie, OR Dept. of Transportation, Portland Dept. of Transportation, Multnomah County, 40-mile Loop Land Trust. Turn to page 142 for a map of the trail.

Community Schools expand to 74 sites! School's out at 3 o'clock, but you aren't home 'til later? It isn't a new problem, but there are still too few solutions. Keeping kids busy with positive activities between the hours of 3-6 p.m. is the goal of our expanded Satellite Community School program. We take over 60 elementary schools and four middle schools during those bewitching hours to offer some fun programs. Add this to our existing 10 community schools and you've got a great program that is reaching into many neighborhoods.

Park Ranger Program Our Rangers serve as goodwill ambassadors, providing assistance to park users while keeping order when necessary. These roving Rangers monitor the most highly used parks during the summer. They work with Portland Police, neighborhood associations, and volunteer neighborhood foot patrols. Surveys reveal people feel safer in their parks since we began the Ranger program.

Planning for Senior Citizens Leisure Needs Seniors and other Senior Program Providers joined forces with us to develop a strategic plan for improving services for senior citizens. As a result, we are working to upgrade facilities, develop more specialized programming, and improve customer service.

American's With Disabilities Act We have a great record for accommodating people in our programs. And, we are working on making our parks and facilities more accessible. We've identified 115 sites for improvement. All construction projects must factor in ADA improvements. A group of citizens with disabilities and the City County Advisory Committee for the Disabled (CCACD) give their insight into making access improvements.

OUR OPERATIONS DIVISION—

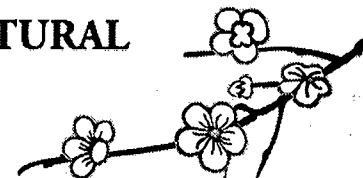
Caring for Parks, Facilities and Natural Areas

The employees in the "Operations" division preserve and protect Portland's parks and openspaces.

The care the Operations employees provide includes:

- **Parks**— Daily maintenance and repair of 100 park and recreation buildings, 12 swimming pools and 180 park grounds. This means picking up A LOT of litter and garbage, clearing paths and raking leaves, maintaining drinking fountains and rest rooms, regular safety inspections of 100 play structures, grooming 200 ballfields, posting 800 park signs, keeping 3,000 park and sports lights lit, and mowing 1,200 acres of turf.
- **Gardens**— Operation of five public gardens, and the community gardens program. See page 136.
- **Natural Areas**— Management of 7700 acres of forests, meadows and natural areas as well as 100 miles of trails. See page 138.
- **Horticulture**— Guardianship of over 40 acres of shrub beds and thousands of acres of trees. This includes the production of over 80,000 flowers and landscape plants for parks throughout the city.
- **Innovative Programs**— Administration of our integrated pest management and water management programs.

HORTICULTURAL SERVICES 823-1636



Horticultural Services runs an eight acre nursery at the foot of Mt. Tabor where trees, shrubs, groundcovers and wetland plants are grown for use in city landscapes. In the greenhouse complex over 80,000 bedding plants are produced annually through the efforts of volunteers and staff. These annual flowers are used in Portland's parks, public gardens and transit malls.

We also construct and maintain a variety of public landscapes including Portland's wastewater treatment plants and environmental restoration projects along Portland's waterways. We provide flower and plant displays in 323 planters along the Light Rail and Transit Mall corridors and in Pioneer Courthouse Square in downtown Portland. Horticultural Services oversees the Parks Pest Management program and the Flowers for Portland Parks volunteer neighborhood flower program.

URBAN FORESTRY 823-4489

Urban trees provide benefits that are fundamental to our city's livability. Qualities such as clean air and water, cooler streets and homes, beauty and wildlife habitat are essential elements to the health and comfort of any city. Portland is fortunate to have such an extensive urban forest. Urban Forestry offers support to Portland citizens in the following ways:

Planting - Fall is the best time! If you are planning to plant a street tree on city right-of-way, City Arborists will help you choose the right tree and issue you a permit.

Preservation - To preserve Portland's urban forest, the Tree Cutting Ordinance regulates the cutting of trees 12" diameter or greater on certain private properties. We also regulate the removal of any tree in the public right-of-way. If you are planning to remove a tree, call us before you begin.

Pruning - Pruning your trees properly can mean the difference between a long-living healthy tree or a disease infested hazardous tree. City Arborists offer advice on how and where to prune, if a hazardous condition exists, and how to hire a good tree care company.

Learn how to properly prune your trees at our Low-Limb Training October 12th. Call 823-4489 for info and to register.

BP Points For Parks

Last season, every time the Blazers made a 3-point shot, BP donated \$2,000 to Portland Parks for outdoor basketball courts. The result of last year's fund-raiser will be unveiled (two new courts!) this month at Ed Benedict Park in outer southeast Portland.

Hoyt Arboretum Picnic Shelter & Community Building

A favorite place for many, the Arboretum is a 200 acre tree museum complete with a Visitor's Center and a Picnic Shelter. Unfortunately, the picnic shelter was aging beyond usefulness and the visitor's center was little more than an overused room. The Hoyt Arboretum Friends Foundation (HAFF) spread word that structural improvements needed to be made to keep the Arboretum a premier destination. Individuals, businesses and volunteers came through and a beautiful picnic shelter is already being enjoyed while a new indoor classroom and information center is currently under construction.

Off Leash Dog Areas

Dog owners will tell you, dogs gotta run and socialize. Parks seem like the perfect place to some— except not everyone (squirrels included) love loose dogs, and the law says *leash 'em*. What to do? Follow the trend in other growing cities, and create off-leash dog runs. While we admit to growing pains (who would have guessed they'd be so popular) this program has many successes. Right now you'll find *areas in* Gabriel, West Delta and Mt. Tabor park where Rover can lose his leash. Also, all of Chimney Park is dog park central.

Play It Safe

A children's safety program that reached 1000 children in 25 parks this summer. Messages of fire, bike and personal safety were delivered in a fun and educational way. Safety "graduates" were invited to a safety carnival at the end of summer. Our co-sponsors included Fire Bureau, Portland Police, Transportation Bureau and Ackerley (look for safety artwork from these kids on billboards), and Art Media.

Zone-In Television Show

Children really have a special place with us. We know pre and young teens face challenges. Coming this fall is the first in a four part series on helping kids make good choices. We handle the tough topics kids face everyday with input from experts and peers. Tune in October 11 at 5 PM on Fox49 for our show on Violence. Our partners include Portland Police, Portland Transportation-Safety, Fire Bureau, Dornbecker Hospital, and Fox49.

Heron Lakes Golf Course Environmental Excellence

Some of our golf course patrons fly in and some live in the trees. In '92, Heron Lakes joined the Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary System which provided us with information and guidance in the preservation and enhancement of wildlife habitat. Because we have shown such a strong commitment to this program, we received designation as a certified Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary. Only four Oregon Golf Courses have ever received this certification.

Hoop - It Up

Close downtown streets, hoops are moving in. Three-on-three basketball players hit the mock courts September 21 & 22. Sponsored with Nike and the Trailblazers, this is a fund raiser for our Youth Basketball League.

Elm Tree First Aid

Portland's Elm Trees are vulnerable to the deadly Dutch Elm Disease. While we spray and prune it isn't enough. Resources restrict our ability to provide the special labor intensive "medical treatment" (a tree I.V. if you will) that is required. But in the case of Ladd's Addition, neighbors volunteered to provide the manpower if we provided the systemic fungicide and training. This preventative maintenance gives the trees in Ladd's Addition extra protection.

Eagle Program

High School students with limited finances, that agree to work part-time at our golf courses for two years while sustaining good grades, can apply for a four year Evans College Scholarship. Our first students in this program graduated from college this year— we were nearly as proud as the parents. The program continues to grow (40 Eagle kids are with us now) and has received national attention.

Youth Drug-Free Basketball League

Saturday soccer gives way to basketball in January. Now more kids than ever can play ball. Free clinics and t-shirts for the kids along with scholarships are provided through a grant from Robert Woods Johnson Foundation, and a contribution from Nike and Portland Trailblazers.

Storm Clean-up

Trails washed away, trees blown over... are parks safe? You bet. Safety is our number one priority. Identifying and removing hazards is our first order of business. Some of us worked around the clock to ensure safe public safety. We still have storm clean-up to do, but things are safe and no injuries reported.

Community Outreach

We use a variety of strategies to improve our communication with citizens. We're mailing this guide to every household to let people know about our programs. After this term, you can join a mailing list to get this complete guide, or a smaller, targeted guide. With over 100 program sites, we've created a one-stop phone number, 823-PLAY, to help get you the information you need. We are going on line this month with our own Home Page on the internet.

Implementing The Bond Measures

Public support for Portland's park system was demonstrated by the overwhelming passage of measures 26-10 (Parks Improvements) and 26-26 (Greenspaces), and we want you to know we appreciate it and will spend it efficiently and effectively. We have so much to tell you about what we are doing that a paragraph just won't do. So, *we invite you to turn the page and read all about it!*

Parks Bond Measures 26-10 & 26-26



A Progress Report

Passage of two parks-related bond measures in the last two years reaffirmed Portlanders' commitment to providing parks and recreation opportunities and preserving natural areas for future generations. Measure 26-10 provided \$58.8 million for renovation of Portland's parks and infrastructure and development of new recreation facilities. The second bond measure, 26-26 (also known as the *Greenspaces Bond Measure*), was passed by voters in May, 1995. 26-26 provides \$135 million for acquisition of regionally significant natural areas such as Forest Park and the East Buttes; for completion of trails such as Peninsula Crossing and connecting OMSI to Springwater Corridor; and passes \$7.4 million dollars through to Portland Parks for the purchase of local natural areas.

Much work has been completed since passage of the two measures. Here is a brief glimpse into all that's going on. A more detailed annual update will be available soon. Call 823-5588 to request a copy or to join a mailing list for information on a particular project.

Neighborhood Parks

At the heart of Portland's park system are neighborhood parks. Sprinkled throughout the city, their playgrounds, sports fields, picnic areas and pathways provide opportunities to play and relax. Of the 114 projects planned for Portland's park system, 64 focus on neighborhood parks. While each project is unique, all share renovation goals: increase maintenance efficiency, improve accessibility, and ensure the highest safety standards. Here's some of the improvements you're likely to see.

Automatic irrigation is being installed or improved in 61 parks, replacing manual systems. This allows us to irrigate after hours which saves money, uses less water, and assures that the entire park will remain available during the daylight hours. Irrigating sports fields makes them safer, since the fields don't get rock hard in the summer heat.

Playgrounds are being renovated at 52 parks, and five parks are getting playgrounds for the first time. In some cases, equipment that no longer meets safety standards is being replaced or relocated within a curbed area to contain the soft surface material. New equipment is being added and soft rubber matting is being installed under the play equipment.

In most parks, **pathways** are being developed or realigned to improve accessibility. Restroom renovation will make them more accessible, pleasant to use, and easier to maintain.

Park Restrooms

Before the year 2000, 46 of the 97 restroom facilities will be renovated and five new restrooms added. In a few instances, the original buildings will be modified. In other cases, entirely new facilities will replace the old. Regardless, where gracious old-style restrooms are concerned the new designs will reflect the original.

The materials being incorporated into the structures, such as glass blocks and tile, will make graffiti easier to remove and the new lighting and plumbing will be more difficult to vandalize. Some brick buildings, which must be sandblasted to remove graffiti, will be stuccoed and painted. As they are renovated, many of the restrooms will be converted to single occupancy.

While work on the restrooms has gone slower than originally hoped, the first 13 are slated for completion by the end of 1996. And, Portlanders will be relieved to know that by the end of the decade, all 51 'comfort stations' will be functional.

Swimming Pools

Many of Portland's municipal pools and bath houses have been around since the early 1900s! Now, six pools will get a needed face lift and a new pool added. This fall, work begins at Sellwood, Grant, Creston, and Wilson pools. A new pool is planned at the SW Community Center. Planning will soon begin for improvements to Peninsula, Montavilla, and Mt. Scott pools.

Our Aquatics Program offers recreational swim and opportunities for fitness, therapeutic programs and competition. Instruction is a critical part of our program. In 1995, over 25,000 children learned to swim with us. Pool improvements will enhance these programs, replace outdated filtration and circulation systems, and where possible add some of the amenities that have become standard in aquatics facilities across the country.



Sellwood Pool will have a zero depth edge when it reopens in 1997. With the shallow end edge much like the edge of a lake, zero depth pools



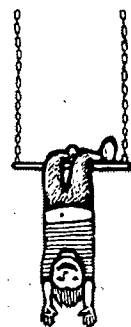

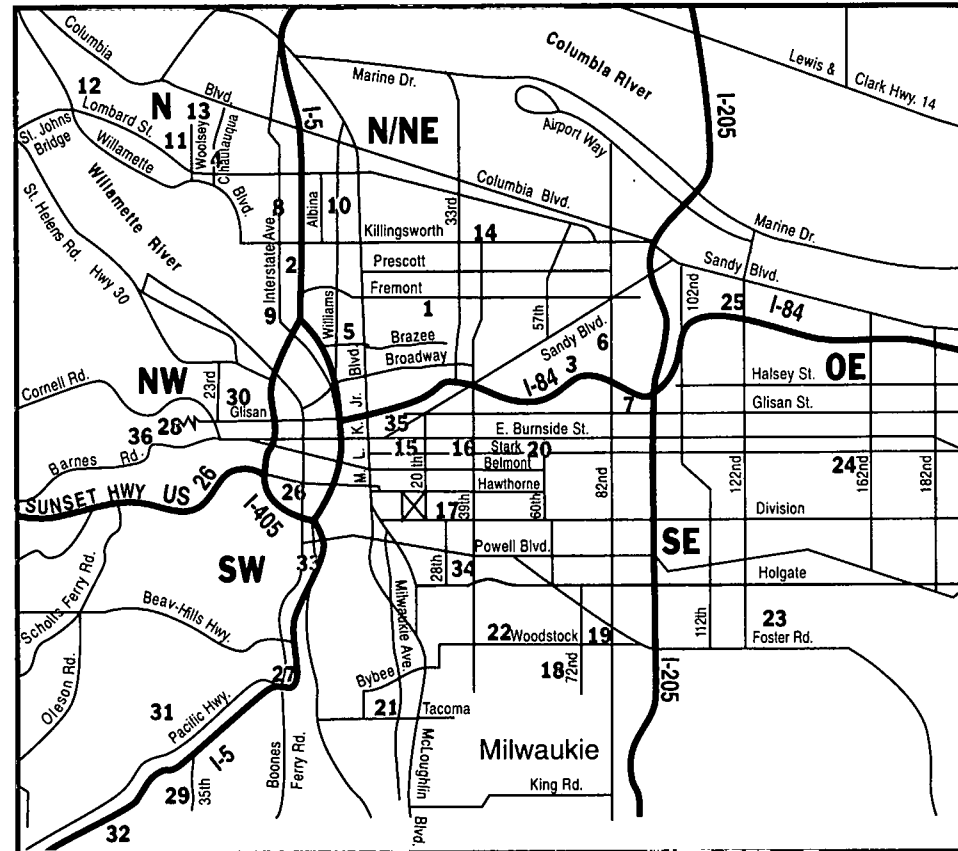

provide an ideal entry for small children, the elderly or people with physical limitations. Water play equipment is another new feature. A water slide will be at Wilson pool and kid-activated sprays and small slides at Sellwood. Family Changing Rooms, included in all the bath house renovations, will make life easier for parents with small children and people with disabilities.

Two New Community Centers

Of Portland's eleven community centers, only one was actually built with that intention: Peninsula Park Community Center, constructed in 1913. But in early 1998, citizens will celebrate the grand opening of two new centers. The 1994 bond measure funds community centers in Southwest and East Portland. After a 15-month planning process, sites have been selected and the facilities designed and soon the year-long construction phase will begin.

The East Portland Community Center is sited at SE 106th just south of Stark Street, next to Floyd Light Middle School and directly across the street from the new East Portland Police Precinct. The Center is designed around a central courtyard with classrooms and multipurpose rooms on one side and active recreation (gymnasium, fitness, and dance) spaces on the other side.

The SW Community Center will be in Gabriel Park on the corner of SW 45th and Vermont. The center will feature an aquatics center, gymnasium and rooms for fitness, aerobics/dance, community meetings, and child care. Plus, a Fans of Fanno Creek resource room.

Staying In Touch

Newsletters, Public Meetings, Cable TV shows, community newspapers, the Internet... these are some of the ways you can stay on top of what's being planned for Portland's parks.

Join our mailing list for Newsletters on projects you are interested in. When planning for a project begins, a newsletter is sent to every address within a two to five block radius of the park and to others who want to be on the mailing list. It describes issues and invites additional suggestions before the draft plan is developed. It also announces the public meeting on the draft plan. A fact sheet, describing the final plan, is sent to everyone asking to remain on the mailing list. For larger projects, such as the new community centers, periodic newsletters are produced throughout the process.

Parkscapes is a semimonthly cable television show produced by Portland Cable Access (Channel 30). *Parkscapes* features plans for regional parks, new facilities, major renovation projects, and periodic updates on neighborhood park projects.



Adding To The Legacy - Greenspaces

Measure 26-26, the Greenspace Bond Measure, is a cooperative effort between Portland Parks and Metro. The dollars from this bond measure will be used to protect and purchase natural areas throughout the metropolitan region. Here's an example of the projects already underway here in Portland:

Forest Park acquisitions to complete Portland's premier park. Three parcels totalling 122 acres have already been purchased.

Urban Waterways acquisitions along Johnson Creek in SE Portland and along the Columbia Slough in N. & NE Portland. Our first acquisition was 15 acres at the east end of Johnson Lake (excellent wildlife viewing!) on the Slough.

Botanic Garden acquisitions which buffer Leach Garden, Hoyt Arboretum, and Crystal Springs Rhododendron Garden. Our friends organization have helped us identify acquisition priorities.

Terwilliger Parkway acquisitions, formerly a narrow 200-300 foot wide greenway, has been substantially enhanced with three acquisitions totalling 28 acres.

Tryon Creek acquisitions to protect Tryon Creek and it's tributaries. Three properties totalling 22.5 acres have been purchased to date.

Willamette Greenway acquisitions have been purchased to protect resources and improve access to the Willamette River. 27 acres have been acquired.

East Buttes acquisitions to preserve and buffer Rocky, Kelly and Powell Buttes in east Portland. As of today, 2.2 acres have been purchased at Powell Butte.

Trails. Although much trail development has occurred over the past 20 years, there are still gaps in the Willamette Greenway and the 40 Mile Loop trail systems. Parks staff is prioritizing projects that will help make the connections in the most critical areas.

Other Projects. Capital Improvement projects include a trailhead at Oaks Bottom Wildlife Refuge, a wheelchair accessible trail at Forest Park, and a substantial improvement to the visitor center at Hoyt Arboretum.

A Letter From The Commissioner



Dear Fellow Citizens,

This activity schedule opens the door to the many wonderful programs offered by Portland Parks & Recreation to people of all ages. Whether you want to learn a second language, get fit in a yoga class, play tennis, or keep a child busy after school, Portland Parks has something valuable to offer. With thousands of programs at over 100 locations throughout our great city, we're proud of our first-class curriculum and I urge you to consider the many opportunities available to you and your family.

As Portland's population grows, so does the importance of our parks and recreation programs. Our quality of life is due in part to the opportunities the city's parks system affords us as city residents. There are few cities in the nation where citizens can hike forest trails lined by magnificent trees, take outings to mountains and rivers in the wilderness just minutes from the city, or lay down a blanket for a picnic on the slopes of an extinct volcano in Mt. Tabor Park.

As we all feel the pressure of population growth, many citizens have expressed concern for the protection of our parks and open spaces. I consider my role as the steward of the Parks system to be one of the most important responsibilities of being a City Commissioner. So, not only will you enjoy additional park acres and open space, but our existing parks will be in far better shape than at any time during this half century.

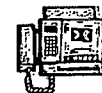

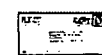

Folks from around town air concerns over city parks

■ The downtown gathering brought together people who object to various changes under consideration

Residents from all quadrants of Portland discovered something in common Wednesday — unhappiness over parks.

A crowd that at times neared 100 — counting lunch-eaters, pigeons and a pair of small football players — listened to angry speakers and read protest signs during a midday gathering in Terry Schunk Plaza downtown.

The speakers were upset about:

■ **Johnswood Park** in St. Johns. A 7.9-acre open space that Host Development — the nonprofit group, Home Ownership a Street at a Time — wants to combine with 5.75 acres from the school district. The company then would build 103 "affordable homes."

■ **Floyd Light Park**. The 7.9-acre park would lose 5.9 acres for the Outer Southeast Portland Community Center.

■ **Pier Park**. The city wants to put in an 8-foot wide service road for the handicapped in the St. Johns area.

■ **Gabriel Park**. A community center is planned on three of the park's 90.4 acres in Southwest Portland.

■ **Powell Park**. Fred Meyer Inc. has proposed trading about 4.1 acres of land at its corporate headquarters in Southeast Portland for about 3.8 acres of neighboring Powell Park. It would then place a new store and some offices on the 3.8 acres, which borders busy Powell Boulevard. The parks department has not taken a stand on the proposal.

Most of the vitriolic comments, as well as several of the signs, were aimed at Commissioner Charlie Hales. He had attended previous protests but this time he was at a

retreat.

Several of the 16 candidates now vying for the council seat formerly held by Rep. Earl Blumenauer used the forum to attack Hales, Mayor Vera Katz, Parks Bureau chief Charles Jordan and city policies.

Members of Hales' staff responded later, noting that the siting of community centers at Floyd Light and Gabriel parks came after "an extensive public involvement program." They said Hales has worked to guarantee "many opportunities for public involvement on these issues." See p. 1

Jordan, commenting later, defended people's right to protest, but added, "I wish there was more fairness and not so much exaggeration of fact. In Gabriel Park, for example, we want to use three acres for a community center. That's three acres out of a 90-acre park. Really, is that paving the park over, as they claim?"

Jordan labeled a number of the comments as "just plain mean. If you have a case, let it stand on its merits. Personal attacks are just not the Portland way."

Candidate Chuck Duffy said he thinks the Johnswood Park really is a park and he feels there has been a lack of public bid process to decide whether Host is the proper group to receive the land.

But Jordan said the city bought the Johnswood parcel to go alongside a planned school. He said the land is not a park, and because of the school district's decision, will not be next to a school.

Duffy drew applause when he said that Host's name involved developing home ownership one street at a time, "not one park at a time."

Fellow candidate Melinda Benson Wilde said the protest illustrates "a lack of city interest in listening to its citizens."

The next official action involving the parks controversies will be a public hearing at 2 p.m. Sept. 5. That meeting is on whether to allow the sale of the Johnswood property.

5. After Hales announced the land swap deal, Cooley told task force members that the commissioner wants the community center at Floyd Light and that he (Hales) would like their support for the decision. Task force members are pushed for a decision on Floyd Light. Cooley calls for vote. First to determine if there were enough votes in favor of Floyd Light, then once assured he had the votes, Cooley called for a second vote, presumably to remove suspicion from himself as he picks the Glendoveer site. Some task force members find this odd given Cooley's push for Floyd Light.

6. Area residents and interested parties opposing the Floyd Light sites (Park and Middle School) receive especially rude treatment from Cooley during site tour and meeting hearings, despite polite and reasonable challenges to the site decision.

7. Hales knowingly breaks the City's agreement to keep Floyd Light Park a park, ignoring the City-signed agreement with Multnomah County when the area was annexed. The agreement called for the City to abide by the Multnomah County Master Park Plan.

8. Commissioner Earl Blumenauer expressed his concerns to Mayor Katz on the siting process (December 8, 1995) and to concerned citizen Craig Rogers.

9. The Parks Bureau unveils plans for Floyd Light community center which call for construction of a parking lot for 150 cars. The parking space allowance is considered well beyond what would be necessary for community center patrons only.

10. Park Bureau and General Services departments discuss agreement for parking at the proposed Floyd Light Community Center in order to resolve the parking problem for the new police station. This agreement surfaces the police parking issue and its relationship to the community center.

11. Recently, it was reported in the Oregonian that another builder friend of Hales received approval to designate parking for his proposed apartment complex at the SE community center. Construction of the complex would have been denied without the approval for addition parking.

The facts clearly demonstrate that questions surround the real reason the SE Community Center was sited at Floyd Light and why Cooley headed the siting task force. It should be investigated exactly what Commissioner Hales promised David Douglas School District officials to secure the Floyd Light Middle School property. The siting and purchase of land for the SE police station should also be investigated to determine if Cooley used advance Planning Commission data to voters and profits from a City land purchase, and if the Cooley-Asbahr site was given preference due to Hales' influence.

City Commissioner Charlie Hales misled the people of Portland on the real reason for his siting the SE community center at Floyd Light. It's allegedly to cover-up a problem with the questionable site of the SE police station on land once owned by developer Richard Cooley, a Hales contributor who oddly also chaired the siting task force.

In siting the Southeast Portland Community Center, documented information indicates, despite misleading claims by Commissioner Charlie Hales, the siting of the community center at Floyd Light was not because it best met the needs of the community, but rather an attempt to cover-up problems with a questionable land purchase for the SE police station (directly across from the designated SE community center site). The police station land was sold by developer Richard Cooley, who made a large profit on his deal to the City.

The police station site was found to be inadequate by City planners because it failed to meet the full parking needs for a precinct station. It is therefore reasonably presumed that Commissioner Hales, with the aid of Richard Cooley, orchestrated the selection of Floyd Light (Park, then Middle School) for the community center to resolve the parking problem which stalled the construction of the police station. The parking problem would have potentially cost the City a substantial amount annually and would have raised questions as to why the Cooley-owned site was chosen over other more suitable locations. Cooley is a friend and major campaign contributor to Commissioner Hales, and has been given authority within City government by Hales.

Facts that support this allegation:

\$700,000.00 ABOVE ASSESSED VALUE

1. City of Portland purchased a site for its Southeast Police Precinct from Richard Cooley, (and family members) and developer Roy Asbahr (and family members). The site had a tax assessed value of \$276,800 but was sold to the City for \$700,000. Note: Cooley served on the City Planning Commission which presented him an opportunity for advance knowledge of where the City would purchase property. (This relationship and his ownership of other properties purchased or pending by the City should be investigated).

2. The police station site (directly across from Floyd Light Middle School property) was considered inadequate because it was not large enough to accommodate the necessary parking—the site is 25% less of City requirements—so construction had stalled. To resolve the problem, City official David Kish contacted David Douglas School District Superintendent Dr. Ron Russell with a proposal for police station parking at the school. Dr. Russell asked about "what form the remuneration would be" to the district to allow such parking (July 1, 1995 letter from Russell to Kish).

3. City Commissioner Charlie Hales named Richard Cooley as chair of the SE Community Center siting task force, presumably to direct the siting of the center to the Floyd Light Park property. This is confirmed by the actions of Cooley—although task force members preferred other sites, Cooley repeatedly lobbied for the Floyd Light Park site despite concerns that it would have a dramatically negative impact on the neighborhood, increasing traffic and noise to the largely residential area, and, if the park site was chosen, would involve the purchase of several homes which Cooley claimed would not be a problem for the City according to Hales.

4. Cooley continued to encourage the task force not to drop Floyd Light Park. He got several task force members to go along with him in keeping it on the list. Meanwhile Commissioner Hales negotiated a land swap with the David Douglas School District offering 5 acres of the 7.9 acre park and pledging \$200,000 to move a new track field in exchange for the middle school land. Hales did not disclose that he allegedly also gave the school district unrestricted access to City park properties adjoining district schools as part of the deal. At a public meeting, a school official was heard to say that Hales had made this promise. (The Hales' agreement should be investigated).

GRANTEE SHALL USE THE PROPERTY FOR PARK AND RECREATIONAL PURPOSES ONLY, OR FOR OTHER USES APPROVED BY THE MULTNOMAH COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS. THE MULTNOMAH COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS SHALL HAVE STANDING TO ENFORCE THIS CONDITION THROUGH APPROPRIATE LEGAL ACTION.

for the benefit of the County.

6. WHEREAS, the County is satisfied the property exchange between the City and the District as above described is consistent with the goals of the Mid-County Neighborhood Parks Master Plan, because the City would be required to maintain the use of the property it receives for park and recreational purposes or other uses approved by the County Board.

7. WHEREAS, the terms and conditions of the property exchange are consistent with the goals of ORS 275.330.

8. WHEREAS, the District intends to keep the property described in Recital No. 3 above open for public use when not needed by the District for educational purposes.

II.

ORDER

NOW THEREFORE IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that the County consents to the City's conveyance of that certain portion of the Floyd Light Park Property, more particularly described in Recital No. 3 above, to the District in exchange for certain property more particularly described in Recital No. 4 above; provided:

1. The District's deed of conveyance to the City contain the exact restrictive language as referenced above in Recital No. 5 to and for the benefit of the County; and
2. The District and the City strictly adhere to all other terms of conveyance as recited herein; and
3. This Order shall not be final and effective until and unless the City receives final

1 Conditional Use approval for the siting and construction of the community center, and
2 any applicable appeal period has expired.

3 IT IS THEREFORE FURTHER ORDERED, that upon the execution of the deeds between
4 the city and the District as provided for herein, the County hereby withdraws, releases, and
5 extinguishes any continued interest in that certain parcel of property more particularly described in
6 Recital No. 3 above.
