General Information

1. What action are you requesting from the Board?

Abbey Stamp, Scott Taylor, Craig Prins and Representative Williamson will brief the Board on local and statewide public safety policies and practices.

2. Please provide sufficient background information for the Board and the public to understand this issue. Please note which Program Offer this action affects and how it impacts the results.

In 2013, the Legislature passed House Bill 3194. HB 3194 goals are to: reduce recidivism, decrease County utilization of State prisons, protect the public, and hold offenders accountable. The bill also created the Justice Reinvestment Grant Program.

Multnomah County public safety leaders are holding regular, collaborative discussions to develop recommendations for the best use of the funds allocated to Multnomah County via the grant program. They are considering ways to augment our rehabilitative services to assist transitions back into the community, while also keeping it safe. Mr. Taylor, Mr. Prins, and Representative Williamson will provide information on a number of topics, including:

- Strategies for capping prison growth,
- Prison forecasts and Multnomah County's impact,
- Justice and local reinvestment,
- Work of the statewide Criminal Justice Task Force, and
- The impact of HB 3194 on the juvenile justice system

This presentation is intended to update the board on current public safety efforts, and provide information as it develops the 2015 budget.

3. Explain the fiscal impact (current year and ongoing).

While this APR has no direct fiscal impact, it is anticipated that the County will receive approximately \$12M in 2015-2017 (due to statewide reinvestment of \$60M), in addition to the \$2.5M remaining from this biennium. The Justice Reinvestment Subcommittee of the Local Public Safety Coordinating Council will work with the LPSCC Executive Committee and the Board of County Commissioners to ensure wise spending and investment of the funds.

4. Explain any legal and/or policy issues involved.

Multnomah County is impacted by the state's decision to not grow the prison population. The local public safety system is required to be responsive and develop policies and practices that meet this goal, while reducing recidivism, having good outcomes for offenders and keeping the community safe.

5. Explain any citizen and/or other government participation that has or will take place.

LPSCC conducts open, collaborative meetings. Meeting attendees include all elected and appointed public safety leaders, public safety partners, community service and treatment providers, the business community, and community members.
