1. What action are you requesting from the Board?

Adoption of the proclamation naming April 2013 National Minority Health Month in Multnomah County, Oregon.

The goal of this month is to strengthen the capacity of communities of color to eliminate the disproportionate experience of early death and preventable disease through prevention, early detection and control of disease complications. Minority communities have poor health outcomes due to racial, ethnic, social, environmental, economic, political and educational barriers. As a result of these obstacles, people have reduced access to health care resources and suffer higher rates of disease and death than their majority population peers.

This presentation will demonstrate how Multnomah County strives to address health disparities for communities of color. Presenters will inform the Board of County Commissioners about minority health data, the Equity and Empowerment Lens, and preview some programs and partnerships that hold promise for addressing health inequities.
