Multnomah County Updates

Media and Announcements

- On May 8, 2020, [Multnomah County released a statement](#) in response to Governor Brown's plan to reopen Oregon, announced on May 7. In summary, as part of a tri-county region with the most hospital systems, the highest population of vulnerable residents, and a major driver of the state's economy, the timeline for reopening Multnomah County will be different from more rural areas of the state. Multnomah County is developing a dashboard to identify the county's status for each of the governor's criteria for reopening; the dashboard will be shared with the public and the media next week.
- Multnomah County Elections announced that all registered voters in Multnomah County should have received their ballots by yesterday, Thursday, May 7th. Voters have until May 14th to mail their ballots; after that date, voters can take their ballot to any [official ballot drop site](#), including those at Multnomah County Libraries. Replace a lost ballot, get help voting, ask questions, or vote in person at the Elections Building (1040 SE Morrison St., Portland) or at the [Voting Center Express](#) (600 NE 8th St., Gresham). 
Epidemiology Data





As of May 8, 2020, 8:00 AM, there were a total of **839 confirmed COVID-19 cases in Multnomah County** and 3,068 cases in Oregon. 27% of Oregon’s cases are in Multnomah County. The chart below shows cases over the past two weeks ([click here for source](#)).



Call Center

Daily Metrics: The Call Center tracks how many calls and emails it responds to each day. The chart below shows the daily number of calls and emails answered by the Call Center over the past week.



Daily Metrics: The Resource Request Unit tracks how many requests for resources it processes every day. The chart below shows the number of resource requests that the unit processed each day of the past week.




Highlights:

- Continuing to prioritize resource distribution, using an equity lens, to organizations serving the communities most impacted by COVID-19 and most under-resourced in order to have the biggest impact in preventing COVID-19 spread.
- Coordinating between community partners and medical interpreters to source specific PPE for American Sign Language (ASL) interpreters.

Mass Care and Shelter

Multnomah County continues to operate four Physical Distancing Shelters (PDS) with a total capacity of 390 persons and two Medical Motels (MM) with a total capacity of 120.

Daily Metrics: The Mass Care and Shelter Unit tracks how many people are housed in Physical Distancing Shelters and Medical Motels. The charts below show these measures for each day of the past week.



EOC Section: [Logistics](#)

The Logistics Section supports the response actions of all other EOC sections. Logistics focuses on procedures for activating, dispatching, distributing, allocating, tracking, and deactivating resources needed for emergency and disaster operations from government, private, or volunteer sources. For Multnomah County's COVID-19 response, two important Logistics functions are coordinating the donation of supplies and delivering resources to community partners.



Local Updates

Media and Announcements

- A new work group of Prosper Portland's Economic Recovery Task Force, called the Addressing the Digital Divide Work Group, launched an [initial pilot of a technology distribution program](#) which will distribute 100 "technology kits" through Portland nonprofits and community organizations working with Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC); individuals with disabilities; immigrants; women; individuals experiencing poverty; or other community members in isolation and at high risk of digital exclusion.
- On May 5, the City of Portland and Multnomah County's Joint Office of Homeless Services, in partnership with nonprofit JOIN, opened the third of three temporary outdoor emergency shelters to help unhoused people shelter in place. One of the outdoor shelter sites is reserved for people who identify as Black, Indigenous, and People of Color; one for people who identify as LGBTQIA+; and the latest to open is for the general population. The shelters selected residents through an application process, with priority given to older adults, women, people with disabilities, and people with additional barriers to accessing services. Each temporary shelter site has 45 platforms for residents' own tents, with space for people to store their belongings. People at all sites have access to water, toilets, hand-washing stations, trash service, electricity, hot plates, outdoor space heaters, showers, and a health coordinator who conducts daily health screenings and can refer individuals to Medical Motels helter sites, if needed.
- Organizers of summer events that typically draw large crowds in Portland continue to announce cancellations or alternative virtual events including the [Oregon Brewers Fest](#) at Tom McCall Waterfront Park in July and the [Portland Adult Soapbox Derby](#) held at Mt. Tabor Park in August.
- BIKETOWN, the city's bikeshare system, worked with the Portland Bureau of Transportation to [extend significantly discounted pricing through May 31](#) to provide all Portlanders who need to complete essential trips with a convenient and affordable transportation option that allows for physical distancing.

State of Oregon Updates

Media and Announcements

- Oregon Governor Kate Brown held a [press conference on May 7 to announce the state's plan for reopening Oregon](#). She noted that

Today, thanks to millions of Oregonians following the strict physical distancing orders I put in place, I am happy to say these sacrifices have prevented as many as 70,000 COVID-19 infections, and 1,500 hospitalizations in Oregon... We are on track in meeting the goals that doctors and public health experts have laid out for us. And that means we now have the opportunity to begin rebuilding a safe and strong Oregon.

In order to begin reopening under the plan, Oregon counties must show that the number of new COVID-19 cases has been declining for two weeks or that there are fewer than five COVID-related

hospitalizations, there is enough safety equipment for healthcare workers, there are enough hospital beds available for people with COVID-19, that testing supplies are available, and adequate contact tracing resources are in place. In the meantime, Governor Brown stated physical distancing measures must remain in place so counties can reach these conditions. *Every hospital in Oregon is asked to submit data twice daily to Oregon’s Hospital Capacity Web System (HOSCAP). Hospital staff are asked to enter bed capacity information, by type, as well as the number of patients with suspected or confirmed COVID-19 illness who are currently hospitalized at the time of data entry. These data may conflict with hospitalization status in Orpheus due to case reporting and investigation lags and temporary discrepancies in case classification.
