

System Highlights



Unified and Coordinated System.

System Results

- 18,034 nights of shelter provided (77% increase)
- 1,538 family shelter calls to 211
- 218 households served (150% increase)
- 112 families housed, (115% increase)

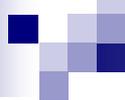


- 25,217 volunteer hours contributed, the equivalent of more than 12 full time employees or at \$12/hour - \$302,000

Other Benefits



- Families with no other place to go are safe, dry and warm
- No families turned away all winter
- School aged children remain in school
- Public health benefits
- Families matched with appropriate services to overcome specific problems



Additional Considerations

- Strong Faith community involvement, all services wholly secular
- Year round shelters are consistently full
- Rent assistance, housing placement and post housing case management are key components for success
- System coordination, partnership and team approach viewed as a model for other systems

- Entered shelter in February
- Worked with Housing and Employment Specialists
- Needed rent assistance for move in and initial few months rent
- Now working full time, Kayla in day care, family is stable.
