The Multnomah County Sustainable Jail Project paves the way for truly sustainable jails. Because jails are like mini-cities that operate 24 hours a day and care for an average of 1200 inmates daily, they are large consumers of energy, water, and supplies. From energy retrofits to composting waste to purchasing local food, the Sustainable Jail Project saved \$400,000 by making small changes with big impacts in the past year. Cost savings are expected to increase significantly next year as more sustainable projects are implemented. A partnership between the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and the Office of Sustainability, the successes to date are the result of hard work and innovation on the part of Sheriff's Office staff. The Sustainable Jail Project is a model for jail corrections across the

nation and represents the critical next step for cost efficient and effective jail operations.
