

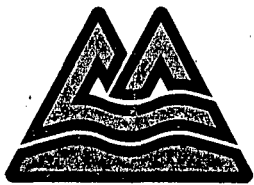

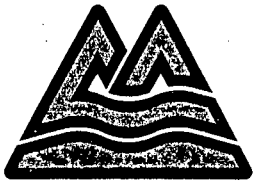

Children's Care Team Legislation: HB 2004 Bill Analysis

The version of HB 2004 (B-engrossed) approved by the House of Representatives addresses some deficiencies included in the original legislative package. The main provisions of the bill and issues yet to be addressed are outlined below.

The bill's key elements are:

- Creation of a 13-member State Commission on Children and Families with a lay citizen majority that is responsible for statewide planning, standards, and policy development.
- Creation of a county Commission on Children and Families with a minimum of nine members and a lay majority.
- State and local commissions would continue to plan for and administer funds now appropriated to the Children and Youth Services Commission.
- On July 1, 1995, Children's Services Division (CSD) would be abolished and a new State Office for Services to Children and Families created in its place. The new office would not be located in the Department of Human Resources (DHR). It would provide child protective services, residential care for children, psychiatric residential and day treatment, and close custody services. Foster care and adoption services and other unspecified entitlement programs would remain within DHR subject to pilot projects developed by counties. The bill requires that child protective services be separated from other services and states that assessments of risk to a child be made by DHR staff and investigations of allegations of abuse and neglect be conducted by law enforcement agencies.
- On July 1, 1995, local commissions would begin planning for use of federal Title XX Social Service Block Grant funds (\$32 million annually), subject to approval by the state commission. These funds currently represent approximately 17% of CSD's funding and support caseworkers in local branch offices (\$26.5 million/year) and a portion of purchased out-of-home care services (\$5.5 million/year).
- Beginning July 1, 1995, local commissions could request that state "services for children and families" be transferred to their control subject to the approval of the state commission. These may include health services, mental health treatment, drug and alcohol treatment, and services for children with developmental disabilities. Services provided by the Department of Education could not be transferred to the local level.
- Mandated services at the local level include:
 - Pre and postnatal screening, assessment and referral for high risk children and families, home visits, and health care.
 - Crisis nurseries.
 - Services to children newborn-18 and their families.
- \$5.2 million would be appropriated from the general fund for additional planning and administrative staff for state and local commissions; \$1.3 million for the state commission, and \$3.9 million for the local commissions.

MAJOR UNRESOLVED ISSUES

- 1) The bill is not clear whether adoptions, foster care, and entitlement programs such as Title XIX, mental health, public health, or other state operated services can or should be transferred to the local level.
- 2) The bill suggests that services can be transferred to local commissions on a county by county basis without establishing a minimum level of service to be provided in each county. Consequently, in some counties a particular service (e.g., mental health) may be administered by the state commission through the local commissions and in other counties the service will be administered by a DHR office or division. State level policy development, standards, accountability, and equity in services availability may suffer under this arrangement.
- 3) The system outlined in the bill has located planning and administration of some children and family services in the state office, some in DHR and some through local commissions. The bill makes few provisions for coordinating these services at the local level.
- 4) The bill jeopardizes \$80-100 million in federal child welfare, foster care, adoption, Medicaid, and mental health funding by divesting a single state agency of planning, funding, and operational responsibility.
- 5) While the bill does state that local commissions should be responsible for policy development and staff responsible for management tasks, there is no provision to prevent local commissions from devoting large amounts of time to resource allocation decisions.
- 6) In child abuse cases, the roles of CPS staff and law enforcement officers are not clear. In particular, the bill does not define who is responsible for ensuring the safety of the child when child abuse or neglect is alleged. It is also not clear who is responsible for providing services for the child and family, the State Office for Services for Children and Families or programs funded by the local commission.
- 7) The bill creates a system which is underfunded and therefore sets up competition for limited funding between preventive programs and services to the existing population of children in need of treatment.
- 8) The bill establishes new service mandates for local commissions without providing any new program funds.
- 9) No criteria are provided for the development of funding distribution formulas by the state commission.
- 10) The bill establishes a framework that allows transfer of state programs to the local level, but does not address whether legal liability rests with the state or local jurisdictions.
- 11) The bill does not address the fiscal requirements involved when state employees are transferred to the local level, such as those experienced with community corrections programs.

SUBJECT: ALERT -- Lottery and Other County Funds

The House continues moving quickly in a number of directions adverse to county interests, including:

1. Repealing the 3% video lottery funds for gambling addiction and 3% for gaming law enforcement.
2. Using original lottery dollars to protect State agency programs shifted from the State General Fund while funding all core economic development programs, including regional strategies, from video lottery receipts which are currently under court challenge. All programs focused on economic development would be placed at risk because of this approach.
3. Offsetting regional strategies funding with the 2.5% video lottery proceeds counties receive for economic development.
4. Taking county cigarette and liquor revenues (HB 3652) and putting them in the State General Fund.

Please contact your House members immediately (try to get through to them personally) and tell them you need their support to retain video lottery money you are already receiving, to provide \$16.0 million funding for regional strategies from regular lottery proceeds, and retain all your liquor and cigarette revenues.

SUBJECT: **Child and Adolescent Health/Mental Health Service Gaps**

There are some very key service gaps for children and adolescents in Oregon even with the current budgets being proposed and the implementation of the Oregon Health Plan. A number of these are identified as Urgent Benchmarks. In all the areas listed, below there are access problems associated with lack of fiscal resources. Waiting lists are one form of access problem. However, they are not always accurate because they are kept for different intervals of time-i.e. 30 or 60 days, and some people refuse to be put on wait lists, or drop out because they have to wait. Geographic or ethnic/cultural access issues require additional fiscal resource allocation to address.

These are unmet needs that local counties have identified as service gaps:

Mental Health Services for Teenage Mothers: Throughout the state there are counties, like Marion, with a high teenage birthrate. Teenage mothers have high percentage of substance abuse, depression and general life coping skills as a parent; and have experienced a high percentage of physical and sexual abuse. They need counseling, life skill development, parent training and referral.

Homeless and Runaway: Of this group, 57 percent are girls. They lack skills training, access to mental health counseling and access to transitional and permanent housing.

Mental Health Services in Schools: Because the current mental health counseling service system focuses on the most disabled children and adolescents, many are not getting early intervention that would prevent further problems. Schools are the logical locale for this early intervention. Mill City and Detroit School Districts in Marion County are seeking such services for their schools. Such activity increases school attendance and increases family support.

Prenatal Care: In Marion County 40 percent of our prenatal services go to undocumented workers. Without good prenatal care the delivery risks increase and the health status of the baby decreases. All is bad for this family. It is costly to the community in the form of additional care to handle problems resulting from lack of care. Currently the OHP will not pay for this care.

Alcohol and Drug Early Intervention in Schools: There is an increase of alcohol and drug prevention/education programs in the schools. However, young children need early intervention in situations where abuse is a problem in their family. This intervention can prevent future.

Mental health treatment for sexual abuse victims: Treatment capacity for victims of sexual abuse is limited and is more restricted for young women. Statistics substantiate that three times as many girls are victims. They need treatment, support and follow-up recovery services.

Mental health treatment for sex offenders: Counseling services are limited. Frequently the siblings of offenders remain untreated. Greater resources need to be directed at family treatment.

Develop positive parenting/early intervention: The earlier a public health program can contact the family with a newborn child the quicker parenting skills, health skills and stress reduction training can begin. All of this leads to a healthier family for young infants and children.

If these gaps can be filled over time, we will build a stronger group of future citizens.
